During Lent, ASLC will be collecting shoes. All types and sizes of shoes, slippers, and boots are welcome donations. The four churches we share Lenten meals and services with are joining in this project. Collection will continue through the month, due to the "stay at home" community mandate. Bags of shoes will then be taken to a storage unit, where they will be processed.



We will deliver the bags of shoes to the storage unit on either Friday or Saturday mornings (to be determined by those that wish to help.) We are looking for a few strong folks to volunteer to help with lifting and hauling. We anticipate that we will need to drop off weekly, due to the expected collection.

Shoes will be prepared on Tuesday afternoons during Creative Friends. Anyone is welcome to join us for this part of the process. We will tie shoes together or rubber band those without ties, and bag in groups of twenty. Shoes brought from the other churches will already be processed. We will deliver to the storage area.

Confined to your home for two or more weeks? The children are bored, then restless, then squabbling. Your spouse is home from work, furloughed- or even laid off. Your boss told you to pack up your work and do it from home. Easy to say, maybe harder to do. "We are all in this together," our leader said. Perhaps. For how long? Scientists give their best guesses, and you cover your ears. Six weeks or longer? All this due to a microscopic malicious virus, something we can't see to fight, but fight it off we must. Stories haunt us of the last great world wide, pandemic infection , influenza, which occurred one hundred years ago. Overall death count ranged from 35 million to 60 million; the latter figure is more likely.

So what should we do? We stock up on canned goods. Get out the recipe book to make cookies and Grandma's meat loaf. Take the dust mop and rag to the far corners of our house to gather up the accumulation since last we attacked it in 20 --what?
