## **Crossroads**

#### From our Minister—

This has been a hard month for our community and for our country. We continue to deal with mounting COVID deaths, as well as an infection rate that remains out of control. At the same time, we continue to deal with the fallout from a presidential election that was contested by outgoing President Trump, as well as political leaders and citizens who bought into his lies about stolen votes and rigged processes. (There has been no credible evidence brought forward that substantiates any of these claims.) Rhetoric has been heightened on both sides, to the point that on Wednesday, January 6, the Capitol building was overrun by domestic terrorists, people who have been radicalized right here in our own country to believe that the violent overthrow of the government is the only way to deal with the outcome of a fair and rigorous democratic process.

I don't know whether you have had this experience or not; for much of the weekend after the insurrection, I spent time glued to social media, until I emerged on Sunday night feeling as though I were stuck in an echo chamber. Rightly, there have been voices calling the events of January 3rd treason, and calling for mass arrests and prosecutions. Rightly, there have been voices calling for justice. Rightly, there have been voices crying out in anger against the perpetrators, who threatened the lives of members of Congress and the media.

But by Sunday night, I found myself buying into the anger and losing sight of the humanity of those involved. It is easy, in situations where opinions are so polarized, to demonize the people on the other side of the issue. It is easy to call for retribution, to de-humanize those who committed these crimes, to lash out in hatred and set aside love. It's easy to think that in situations like this, love is not called for - after all, where is the love in fascist uprisings like what we saw on the 6th?

The answer is - the love is found in God. For God created all of us - even the hate-filled among us. And thankfully, it is not up to us to determine who God will forgive, any more than it was up to Jonah. Like Jonah, we may be afraid of God's mercy for our enemies. But God's forgiveness is extended to all. God's mercy is for all God's creatures. God's love is truly universal - no matter the circumstances.

The only way forward for us as a people is to remember this, and to practice following God's example in our love and mercy. Yes, accountability is needed. Yes, justice must be served. Yes, we must move forward through this painful time; we cannot just sweep it under the rug. But it is imperative that we remember that even those people who chose to storm the Capitol, to try to overthrow the government and subvert an election process are still beloved by God.

If you are struggling with this like I am, like so many of us are - I recommend Archbishop Desmond Tutu's book, No Future Without Forgiveness. In this book, he details the work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in the wake of apartheid, when the government and people of South Africa chose to confront their national sins head-on, rather than sweeping them under the carpet. The goal of this commission was to name the sin of apartheid, as well as the specific crimes of specific actors either in, or supported by, the government, in an effort to grieve the sin of apartheid and heal the nation, allowing the country to move forward in unity.

Archbishop Tutu's role in this commission and the writing of this book show us a way forward through the trauma, to reparation, healing, and ultimately, reconciliation. I pray we are able to find our way forward as well.

#### SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR CHURCH BUILDING USAGE AT ALL SAINTS LUTHERAN CHURCH

All groups should follow the guidelines below to best prevent the spread of illness. We ask that if you need assistance with any of these procedures, you contact church administration (council members) to determine adjustments. Council members contact information can be obtained from the church secretary.

Please be aware that we are following current county heath guidelines. Some of these procedures may change should those guidelines change. We reserve the right to refuse entrance by groups if these procedures are not followed. Our church body has many older and vulnerable members, We err on the side of caution to keep everyone healthy.

- 1) Prior to any meeting or gathering, wipe down any and all surfaces you may or think you may be touching. We hope to continue having wipes available for use, but as a group, you should bring some just in case our supply is low.
- No shared food or drink will be permitted at this time.
- 3) A mask is required for everyone indoors. Gloves are optional.
- 5) We fully recommend the six-foot social distance protocol. Current community guidelines state no more than 10 people inside our building at any one time, due to the upsurge in COVID cases. Please follow these occupancy guidelines until further notice.
- 6) Please do NOT use the drinking fountain.
- 7) Take attendance of those attending your gathering and leave in the church office. If the office is closed, please leave on the table when you leave. Provide contact information for at least one person in the group, in case we need to reach out to the group.
- 8) Wipe down all surfaces used, including the bathrooms and door handles of the front door, before and after use.

We want to be as welcoming as possible. Please understand that we do not have an on-staff janitor, but rely on the goodness of one person to maintain the cleanliness of our building. Your assistance in cleaning before and after will help us keep you and others safe during this time. Questions can be directed to any council person.

## **City Lights, Country Life**

The summer of 1956 saw my father remain on the farm to make things ready for its sale. My mother finished up her schooling to receive her bachelor's degree in education and I stayed with her. As I mentioned previously, Mother stayed in a boarding house with about 6 other women, but we all got along quite well.

By staying all summer, I was able to attend summer school which was a joy and delight. First, instead of having at most 3 or 4 kids in my grade level there were 15-20 eager 6th graders to comingle with. Most of the kids were children or grandchildren of someone who taught or worked for the college and our teachers, were elementary school teachers who just loved to teach.

These kids challenged me to keep up with them and I relished the challenge. Our major study that summer was to find out as much as we could about South America and to

inform our classmates of our findings at the end of the summer term. We divided up in groups of two or three and were given a country to learn about. We learned about the geography, culture, and history of the country we were assigned.

This was not only a great learning exercise but taught me how to research and present my findings in oral and written form. It also required me and my teammates to spend a lot of time in the library which kept me out of mother's hair.

My group's country was Chile and we first convinced our classmates that it really wasn't chilly in Chile except of course in the mountains. I also learned that Brazil was larger in area than the entire continental U.S. (of course this was before Alaska became the 49th state) and that Argentina was undergoing a lot of political unrest at the time.

Our teachers, supplemented our study with films about the continent, and brought in some native clothing. At the end of the term, we took a bus trip to KC to visit the zoo and, attended a fiesta at the Guadalupe Center. Believe it or not I had never been to a zoo and certainly had never visited the Guadalupe Center.

In July, Mother put on her cap and gown and at the age of 45 was one the

oldest and yet most deserving graduates. She immediately started interviewing for a position and within a few weeks found a teaching job in one of the fastest growing suburbs, in Kansas City. My parents than purchased a lot and found a builder to build their first house.

Adios, and Vaya con dios to all, and may the groundhog bring us good news for the days that lay ahead.
