Crossroads

From our Minister—

If you participated in Ash Wednesday service, you heard about the seven signs of ash. They are all symbols that ash has held throughout the history of the world, and particularly throughout the Bible. We are all familiar with these concepts in one way or another in our lives, and in our faith as well.

I invite you to reflect on these symbols as you journey through Lent; perhaps you could walk through each of them each day, or perhaps spend several days sitting with each one, until you are ready to move on to the next.

Here are some words about each one, to guide you on your way, from the book Seven Symbols of Ash by Chris Paavola.

Symbol 1: Ash is a symbol of loss. When we lose a loved one, we lay them in the ground and say goodbye. We know their spirit has departed, and the body that remains will turn into dust. In the book of Genesis, after God makes Adam from the dust of the ground, he tells him, "You will return to the ground, since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return. Consider the words of Ezekiel 27:30: They will raise their voices and cry bitterly over you; they will sprinkle dust on their heads and roll in ashes. Who or what did you lose this year that caused grieving?

Symbol 2: Ash is a symbol of mortality. Just as we remember our loved ones returning to dust, ash reminds us that we will also return to dust. Our mortality is ever present. Consider the words of Isaiah 40:6-8: All people are like grass...the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever. What emotion do you feel as you reflect on your own mortality? Symbol 3: Ash is a symbol of emptiness. We set our hearts on things to fill the void we feel within. There are things in life that promise to satisfy us; but the satisfaction anything on this side of heaven can bring is temporary. Afterwards, we are still hungry for more; we lack the nourishment we find only in Christ. Consider the words of Lamentation 4:5: Those who feasted on delicacies perish in the streets; those who were brought up in purple now embrace ash... What empty things have you chased after?

Symbol 4: Ash is a symbol of weakness. No matter how powerful or beautiful an object may be, when it is burned its power is consumed. An object once full of potential is left powerless and weak. Consider the words of 2 Corinthians 12:10: For the sake of Christ, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong. Where in your life do you feel powerless?

Symbol 5: Ash is a symbol of repentance. Throughout Scripture, when people are made aware of their sin, one of the ways they respond is to cover themselves in ash to demonstrate the humility of their repentance. Consider the words of Job 42:6: *I am in dust and ashes to*

show my repentance. Think about covering yourself in ash to outwardly show your repentance. What emotion do you feel?

SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR CHURCH BUILDING USAGE AT ALL SAINTS LUTHERAN CHURCH

All groups should follow the guidelines below to best prevent the spread of illness. We ask that if you need assistance with any of these procedures, you contact church administration (council members) to determine adjustments. Council members contact information can be obtained from the church secretary.

Please be aware that we are following current county heath guidelines. Some of these procedures may change should those guidelines change. We reserve the right to refuse entrance by groups if these procedures are not followed. Our church body has many older and vulnerable members, We err on the side of caution to keep everyone healthy.

- Prior to any meeting or gathering, wipe down any and all surfaces you may or think you may be touching. We hope to continue having wipes available for use, but as a group, you should bring some just in case our supply is low.
- 2) No shared food or drink will be permitted at this time.
- 3) A mask is required for everyone indoors. Gloves are optional.
- 5) We fully recommend the six-foot social distance protocol. Current community guidelines state no more than 10 people inside our building at any one time, due to the upsurge in COVID cases. Please follow these occupancy guidelines until further notice.
- 6) Please do NOT use the drinking fountain.
- 7) Take attendance of those attending your gathering and leave in the church office. If the office is closed, please leave on the table when you leave. Provide contact information for at least one person in the group, in case we need to reach out to the group.
- 8) Wipe down all surfaces used, including the bathrooms and door handles of the front door, before and after use.

We want to be as welcoming as possible. Please understand that we do not have an on-staff janitor, but rely on the goodness of one person to maintain the cleanliness of our building. Your assistance in cleaning before and after will help us keep you and others safe during this time. Questions can be directed to any council person.





Symbol 6: Ash is a symbol of shame. Like a child hides in their shame when their parent catches them breaking the rules, people through Scripture covered themselves in ash when they were ashamed of their sin. Consider the words of Isaiah 2:10: *Crawl into caves in the rocks. Hide in the dust from the terror of the Lord and the glory of God's majesty.* Even though you feel shame for your sins, how are you given hope through the cross of your baptism and repentance?

Symbol 7: Ash is a symbol of purification. In ancient times, when ash was combined with oils, ash became a cleansing agent: it became soap. Consider the words of Hebrews 9:13-14: The ashes of a sacrifice sprinkled on those who are ceremonially unclean sanctifies them so that they are outwardly clean. How much more will the blood of Christ...cleanse our consciences from acts that lead to death, so that we may serve the living God! Our body reacts based on how we feel. When we're lonely, we slouch. When we're anxious, our shoulders tighten. How does the peace that comes from God's forgiveness change your posture?
