### SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR CHURCH BUILDING USAGE AT ALL SAINTS LUTHERAN CHURCH

All groups should follow the guidelines below to best prevent the spread of illness. We ask that if you need assistance with any of these procedures, you contact church administration (council members) to determine adjustments. Council members contact information can be obtained from the church secretary.

Please be aware that we are following current county heath guidelines. Some of these procedures may change should those guidelines change. We reserve the right to refuse entrance by groups if these procedures are not followed. Our church body has many older and vulnerable members, We err on the side of caution to keep everyone healthy.

- 1) Prior to any meeting or gathering, wipe down any and all surfaces you may or think you may be touching. We hope to continue having wipes available for use, but as a group, you should bring some just in case our supply is low.
- 2) No shared food or drink will be permitted at this time.
- 3) A mask is required for everyone. Gloves are optional.
- 5) We fully recommend the six-foot social distance protocol. Our fellowship area is 639 square feet. Our sanctuary is 972 square feet. Using the guidelines established, that allows for 10 people to safely accommodate the fellowship area and 27 people to use the sanctuary area. Please follow these occupancy guidelines. With the tables set up in the fellowship area, the actual occupancy limits are slightly lower, to allow for the 6 foot distance between people.
- 6) Please do NOT use the drinking fountain.
- 7) Take attendance of those attending your gathering and leave in the church office. If the office is closed, please leave on the table when you leave. Provide contact information for at least one person in the group, in case we need to reach out to the group.
- 8) Wipe down all surfaces used, including the bathrooms and door handles of the front door, before and after use.

We want to be as welcoming as possible. Please understand that we do not have an on-staff janitor, but rely on the goodness of one person to maintain the cleanliness of our building. Your assistance in cleaning before and after will help us keep you and others safe during this time. Questions can be directed to any council person.

#### Blue Springs Community Services League Update

The following is a recap of the  $1^{st}$  six months of 2020 and our response to helping our neighbor with food items that have been delivered to the Blue Springs Community Service League each month

- In January we delivered 57 food items and 10 personal items to the League.
- In February we delivered 145 food items (believe youth collected cans of soup.
- In March we delivered 65 food items and 2 personal items.
- In April there was no delivery to the league.
- In May we delivered 24 items to the league.
- ♦ In June we delivered 58 food items and 5 school supplies to the league.
- ♦ A total of 349 food items.

192 food items less than the same period in 2019.

- For the month of July 2020 109 food items where taken to the Blue Springs Community Service League.
- For the month of August we delivered 59 food items.

The league depends us, the people to help serve the people who are hurting. Food is going out of the league as fast as it is coming in. The need continues to be ongoing and growing. More people and families are finding it hard to make ends meet.

If you can find it at all in your heart to help your neighbor, All Saints Lutheran Church is open Monday to Friday, 9 to 12 every week for your donation.

## City Lights, Country Life

As the hot summer of 1954 slowly matriculated into fall, my Mother and I began our new but separate adventures. Mother's teaching position changed, and I would be riding the bus to the school in town.

Conventional thinking would say, I should be glad to be free of my mother's control, and to have finally cut the apron strings, but quite the opposite was true. Over the last few years, especially the times when my Father was working in Kansas City, we became good friends. As I grew older, I was able to assist with the daily chores of milking the cows, feeding the hogs, and spending quality time with the chickens, feeding them and collecting their eggs.

In previous years, to make the lonely trips to and from school palatable, we would turn on the radio and sing along with such classics as "How Much is that Doggie in the Window", and "You Are My Sunshine".

Although we lived only about a mile from the town school, the only time we came into town was to collect our mail at the post office, (no RFD), or to go to the General Store for items needed to keep the farm going. Seldom did I come in contact with other children.

Riding the bus to a new school, was a new experience for me and also made me the new kid in school. It didn't help that I was the youngest and smallest kid in fourth grade.

I won't go into a litany of negative experiences that awaited me at my new school, but it was very unpleasant. One incident I will relate, actually took

place in the school room.

The teacher let the students grade each other's spelling words. Because I sat in front of one, and behind the other, of my two main adversaries, I graded one or the other's papers. They forced me, shall we say, to give them much better grades than they deserved. The teacher caught on, but they determined I had told on them, so the bullying carried onto the playground. Toward the end of school, the teacher would keep me in during recess,

and I helped doing odd tasks for her, for which I was quite grateful.

The only other positive thing I remember was that every day after lunch, the teacher would read a chapter from a Hardy Brothers book. The class of about twenty, which was about two-thirds male, really enjoyed these stories; not sure about the girls.
