We have a strict vaccination program that we follow yearly to insure that our cattle have the very best care at all times. The cattle are measured and vaccinated twice a year and that data is put into a very honest and trustworthy program where we are 100% honest and trustworthy with everything we do on the ranch. In the summer we purchase hay to last us for the winter months as the cattle do not have access to grazing in the winter months because of the bone chilling temperatures and annual snowfall being about 300 inches. The C&C cattle are housed inside in the winter months and have free choice of water, hay, and most importantly free choice of minerals! Our cattle have access to a few different mineral types that they need to stay healthy throughout the whole year.



In Western New York where we live and raise cattle, the soil is very low in Selenium. Selenium is very important when raising cattle as it helps cattle grow and helps them fight off early calf-hood diseases like Scours and other lethal bacterial infections. Most farmers and ranchers

question to them is, "Do your cattle have access to minerals at all times?" Many of them will tell me that they do not have minerals out with their cattle because the grain that they feed them has all of the minerals that the cattle need. This is one of the main reasons why I do these newsletters and send them to all of our clients and close cattle friends.



Salt is probably the most important mineral for cattle and other livestock alike. Cattle love salt and salt to them is like sugar to us. Many people believe it is unhealthy to give cattle and other livestock salt because they think it dries them out. But this is not the case at all. Salt, just like people, makes livestock thirsty and makes their mouths tart. Having free range cattle on pasture they aren't really getting a lot of salt from the grass as they would from the grains they eat in the winter months. That is for our case anyways. Many people will turn their cattle out on pasture and wonder why they don't gain weight or why they are shooting liquid manure out their back sides. Well that is where the salt comes into play. Cattle get fat on salt because of the amounts of water they are drinking, water fills cattle up and they retain the water in their bodies making them gain weight and look better. Also, when cattle are turned out on rich, fresh green grass in the spring, they tend to have a squirting problem from behind them. That is common. How to help is to give them salt. Salt will harden cattle's manure up so it doesn't look like a bomb went off behind them. Your cattle will thank you for fixing this embarrassing problem!
