Kansas Lions mourn native son PIP Bill Wunder

Lions Clubs International has lost one of its past presidents and Kansas Lions has lost one of its most distinguished leaders. Dr. William "Bill" Harrison Wunder, beloved and admired by his family, friends and colleagues, passed away on Aug. 10, 2017 at age 87.

He was president of Lions Clubs International in 1995-96.


Dr. Wunder was born on Dec. 2, 1929 on the family farm near Rush Center, Kan. After graduating from LaCrosse High School, he attended Kansas Wesleyan briefly before moving to Kansas State Teachers College, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in business in 1952. Upon graduation, he worked for sever-

al companies in Kansas before receiving his commission in the U.S. Army in 1959, following seven years in the U.S. Army Reserves.

A Vietnam War veteran, Dr. Wunder retired as a Colonel after serving nearly 23 years in the Army. His duty assignments included three years in Germany, three years in Italy, one year in Vietnam, and assignments at Headquarters, Department of Army and later, the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He also served on the faculty of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College.

While in the military, he also attained his Master of Science degree in management from the University of Arizona, and following his military service he

attained his Doctor of Philosophy degree in education from Kansas State University.

As a young boy, Dr. Wunder loved to read the Bible and enjoyed Sunday school, and what he learned early in life was reflected at all times in how he lived his life and how he approached the next chapter in his life. Committed to developing others and serving those in need, Dr. Wunder spent the next 30 years or so in higher education and in multiple leadership roles with Lions Clubs International.

Dr. Wunder was a Professor of Business and Chair of the Division of Business, Technology and Leadership within the Graduate School at Friends University, and was a Director of both the Executive MBA and MBA Programs for Friends during his tenure there. He was also a former president of Marymount College in Kansas.

Simultaneous to his work in higher education, Dr. Wunder worked tirelessly for Lions Clubs International, starting at the local club level and ultimately being elected as President of Lions Clubs International for the 1995-96 year. During that year alone, he and his wife Dorothy visited 85 countries in all parts of the world and had meetings with a number of Heads of State.

During 1996-97, he served as Chairman of the Lions Clubs International Foundation. Building on work started with the Peoples Republic of China during his year as President and CEO, Dr. Wunder was able to form a partnership between the Peoples Republic of China and Lions Clubs International Foundation that resulted in 1.75 million cataract surgeries in China. He also worked with former President Jimmy Carter and the Carter Center Foundation to undertake a joint humanitarian service project in Sudan, in

northeast Africa, to significantly reduce river blindness in that country.

Dr. Wunder was a former chairman of the Kansas Commission for National and Community Service and was involved in several professional organizations and his church. He received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Emporia State University and the Outstanding Alumni Award from the U.S. Army War College.

Despite the many accomplishments and achievements in his remarkable life, Dr. Wunder remained true to his rural Kansas roots. He had a strong work ethic, was true to his faith and was selfless in what always seemed like an unlimited capacity to help others.

PIP Wunder always remembered his Kansas Lions and following his Immediate Past President year, he immediately started a fundraising effort to obtain a permanent home for the Kansas Lions State Office. Kansas Lions had been renting office space in an unsafe place in Wichita for several years. In 18 months, he raised enough funds to purchase the current beautiful building, at a much reduced price, and also furnish it. It is through his efforts that Kansas Lions have a beautiful State Office at 231 S. Tyler in Wichita.

Dr. Wunder was much loved and will be greatly missed by Dorothy, his wife of 62 years; their children and grandchildren, and many other relatives and countless friends around the world. He lived a full and rich life and has now gone home to be with God, where he will continue to be with us in spirit.

A memorial service for Dr. Wunder was held at Ascension Lutheran Church Aug. 19 in Wichita, followed by a private burial in Mitchell County. Memorial donations may be made to the Kansas Lions Foundation – Bill and Dorothy Wunder Fellowship or to the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

Eyeglass recycling: thousands of chances for new sight

We drove to Hutchinson Correctional Facility on Friday, Oct. 27 to deliver supplies and load their finished glasses. They are packed 500 pairs per large shipper box. We met District K Governor Randy St. Aubyn there and also received some glasses that had been collected in his district.

Next we drove to Wichita and the State Office storage room, which was loaded with the glasses that area clubs had dropped off there in the past month. We loaded the Winfield Correctional Facility glasses (large shipper boxes) that PDG Tim Hays of Arkansas City had transported for us. This saved the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation many miles and hours of driving. Thank you, Lion Tim.

We then drove on to McPherson to attend the Second State Council meeting. We collected many containers of glasses from all parts of the state and we had a FULL load coming home Sunday morning to Scranton. I did deliver nine large boxes of “useable eyeglass cases” to Lion Jim Huenegarde at the council meeting. He has an outlet for them at the Arc Store in Hays.

After sorting this load, we had 15 banana boxes full (6,000 pairs) of good, useable glasses; five banana boxes

of colored (dark) glasses (approximately 1,000 pairs); two banana boxes full of parts and pieces, broken glasses and salvage items; and 10 large shipper boxes of prison finished glasses that will be sent to Indiana in the future.

We also had four barrels of trash/packing material and eyeglass cases that could not be used. This will be sent to the landfill, north of Topeka. All cardboard boxes are knocked down flat and transported to the Osage County Recycle Center at Lyndon.

We have had several inquiries from area clubs and organizations that do mission trips to South America and other Third World countries. Those are still in the planning stages. We will furnish glasses for them to take if their plans materialize.

Mid-Winter Rally Saturday seminar

Tallgrass prairie once covered 170 million acres of North America. However, most of this prairie has been turned into productive farmland. Today, less than 4 percent of the original acreage remains. The Kansas Flint Hills and the Osage Hills of northern Oklahoma are the last substantial contiguous stand of tallgrass prairie in North America.


A representative from the Flint Hills Discovery Center in Manhattan will lead a special seminar Saturday morning at Mid-Winter Rally to help Lions understand the importance of sustaining this endangered ecosystem and to share the beauty of this area.

Kansas State University History Professor Jim Sherow explained the Flint Hills this way: "It is one of the most endangered ecosystems on the

face of the planet. If we learn how to sustain a human-grass relationship that gave rise to the tallgrass prairies, then we've learned how to sustain a living ecosystem. If we learn how to do that, perhaps we can also extend that lesson to the earth itself."

Plan to attend this seminar Saturday morning and educate or re-educate yourself about the tallgrass prairie and this area of Kansas. After this presentation, participants should better understand the value of burning the prairie each spring and the lessons learned from Native Americans.

The Flint Hills Discovery Center is a heritage and science center located in Manhattan dedicated to celebrating, exploring and inspiring people to care for the Flint Hills of Kansas.

“Power of We” is evident in that way.



Fredonia working to restore city's lighted holiday star

On Dec. 23, 1955, the **Fredonia Lions Club** turned on the lights to the new rotating star on Fredonia's South Mound. This project was made possible by local machinist & blacksmith extraordinaire Loren Ludlum, who is credited with its construction. Two separate lighting circuits allowed the structure to have a lighted rotating star from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day and a lighted cross during the Lenten season.

In 2007, the motor allowing rotation was no longer repairable and the prevailing opinion was that the star would need to remain stationary until the motor could be completely rebuilt. After some 50 years of relatively maintenance-free operation, wear and exposure to the elements of nature caused problems. In 2008-09, much work and expense was invested into maintaining the light installation, but the star has not moved since.

During an inspection by Lions club members in early 2017, it was discovered that the entire structure has deteriorated to the point that it is not feasible to perform further repairs, including re-

pairing the framework, which has extensive rust.

A new design has been donated by TCI Fabrication & Industrial Services, including a red-white-and-blue American flag that will be added to the lighted star and cross displays. New LED lighting will be used and framework will be designed to current industrial standards, with 180 degree rotation for the star. Plans are also being designed to include rotating cameras atop the structure so that Fredonians near and far can see their hometown online.

Fredonia Lions have been seeking donations for the project. The goal is approximately \$40,000.

"Every donor gets us closer to saving a local landmark that can be seen from Highway 400 and is such a nostalgic sight in our hometown," the Lions club noted in its funding appeal.

Any funds raised above the amount

needed will stay in a fund for future repairs and upgrades to local parks.

Sunflower Lions celebrate White Cane Safety Day

The **Topeka Sunflower Lions Club** was at the Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library on Sunday, Oct. 15 to recognize White Cane Safety Day. Lions passed out small white canes to children and an informational sheet, with a white cane taped to it, to adults visiting the library that day.

The information was well received, with at least one person saying, “I learned something new today after reading the flyer.” The club’s efforts also were publicized in an article in the Topeka Capital-Journal.

Kansas adopted the Kansas White Cane Law in 1969. The law was amended in 2002 to expand access rights for guide and service dogs and their partners.

“The white cane is not just a tool that can be used to achieve independence; it is also a symbol of the blind citi-

zens in our society,” said Philip Strong, an advocate for pedestrian safety at the American Council of the Blind.

Introduction of the white cane in the United States is attributed to Lions Clubs International. In 1930, a Lion watched as a blind man attempted to make his way across a busy street using a black cane. Realizing the cane was barely visible, the Lion decided to paint it white.

In 1931, LCI began a national program promoting use of white canes by the blind. The first White Cane Ordinance was passed in 1930 in Illinois, granting blind pedestrians protections and the right-of-way while carrying a white cane.

A joint Congressional resolution was signed into law in 1963 proclaiming Oct. 15 as White Cane Safety Day.

Special guest will be International Director Sam Lindsey Jr. of Texas. ID Lindsey is a chief financial officer from Hilltop Lakes, Texas.



Now is time to be excited about 2018 Lions Band

What is the key to success? Preparation, preparation, and of course, more preparation. It is easy to put off something until a later date and time. But to do so might place the desired outcome into jeopardy.

Lions continues to communicate with Dr. John Taylor at Friends University, who is in the process of getting his team together for the 2018 Kansas Lions Band. His budget and several other key parts to making the 2018 camp a success have been discussed. Additionally, contact has been made with Dr. Perez at Baker University to start the logistics for 2019. He is very excited to have the Kansas Lions Band camp return to Baker. His youthfulness and interaction with the 2016 students was remarkable. The committee is looking forward to working with the Baker staff.

The cost for State Band camp will remain at \$250 per student. Two key factors allow us to stay at this cost. Dr. Taylor's budget has been the same for several camps and Lions has been approved to use USD 206 school buses again next summer. First Student bus company was contacted as a backup. They would charge Lions approximately \$4,500.

After the recent mass shooting in Las Vegas, we reached out to our past band students who are on Facebook to see if they thought that we should continue to plan for an International Band trip to that city for the 2018 LCI Convention and whether students would support such a trip. The

response was a resounding "YES." Therefore, coordination with the various travel agencies has been ongoing.

The Band Committee decided to use Educational Tours, Inc., which has supported the band for several years, including on our Chicago trip last summer. Assuming we can get a sufficient number of students, the International Band trip to Las Vegas will encompass seven days (five nights in Las Vegas) via motor coach bus. The Band Committee has reviewed the pricing of the proposed trip and has set the cost of the International Band trip at \$1,300 per student. International Band students will receive a \$400 discount from the Kansas Lions Band Foundation (KLBF). Therefore, the cost of the International Band trip would only be \$900 per student. Total overall cost to attend both State and International Band will be \$1,150, which includes the KLBF discount.

The International Convention is only eight months away. The band program needs your support and help now by recruiting students. Flyers were to go out in late November or early December and information will be posted on the State Lions website.


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GLT-D Recognition
