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Come to Wichita in June to celebrate the end of another year of Lions service. The 99th annual convention of Kansas Lions is Friday and Saturday, June 1 and 2, at the Doubletree by Hilton Hotel at Wichita Eisenhower Airport.

Plan for two full days of fellowship and fun, useful information you can take back to your club and community, a great band concert and more.

With a convention theme focusing on service, clubs are encouraged to bring displays of pictures and memorabilia of service projects from the past year for exhibition in a room adjacent to the hospitality room. Clubs can also send pictures to PDG Dan Funke for inclusion in a video presentation that will play in the exhibit area throughout the convention.

The schedule for the convention has changed this year with all business meetings — the Fourth State Council Meeting, foundation

and committee meetings, and the annual convention business session — held on Friday.

Also new this year is a banner display. Bring your club banner and stand and we will create a colorful display along the hallway of the convention area on Friday and Saturday. On Saturday evening, banners will line the banquet room. Pick up your banner and stand at the conclusion of the banquet.

Saturday morning starts with one of the most-anticipated events of the state convention — the Kansas Lions Band Concert. The 200-plus students from across the state will have rehearsed since earlier in the week at Friends University and will present their 10 a.m. concert at Central Community Church. See the convention book for directions to the church, which is only about two miles from the convention hotel.

After the band concert, Lions will gather at the Doubletree for a luncheon program featuring Jackie Stiles, assistant women's basketball coach at Missouri State University in Springfield, Mo. Stiles, who grew up in the tiny community of Claflin in Barton County, holds a string of sports records and awards from her high school, collegiate and professional basketball career.

Early this year she was diagnosed with ocular melanoma and faced the possibility of losing her eyesight. She will share an inspirational message with Kansas Lions.

Special seminars on Saturday

During the afternoon, Lions can attend three seminars offering skills and inspiration to take back to their home club and community.

In the first afternoon session, Lions will participate in speed dating-style roundtable discussions with facilitators guiding mini sessions on membership, developing club leadership, meaningful service projects, successful fundraising and engaging and retaining younger members.

The second session will feature PIP Scruggs with an update from Lions Clubs International and a question-and-answer session.

The final seminar will focus on using social media to promote and grow your club. Lion Dane Baxa of the Goddard Lions Club and Community Relations Director for Goddard Public Schools and Erin Schulte, Marketing and Communications Specialist for Goddard Public Schools, will share tips and resources for the effective use of Facebook and other social media.

If the final seminar inspires you to start a Facebook page for your club or you have questions about the LCI website, the new app My Lion, or other digital communications, Lions and Leos will be onsite with computers ready to offer one-on-one help.

The convention closes on Saturday

evening with a banquet and keynote address by PIP Sid Scruggs. The 2017-2018 District Governors and the 2018-2019 District Governors will be recognized and Presidential Awards will be presented at the end of the evening.

One of the highlights of every Lions' gathering is the hospitality room and you won't be disappointed at this convention. Hospitality room co-chairs Lions Jackie and Gary O'Neal and PCC Helen LeBlanc are planning to have goodies to please any palate.

The Hospitality Room will be located right off the hotel lobby and will be open Thursday evening through the convention, except for meals and the band concert. Stop in for a cup of coffee or a cool glass of iced tea and fellowship with Lions from across the state.

Proposed amendment to MD-17 by-laws on business agenda Friday afternoon

Current wording in bold – no changes
Section 2. MULTIPLE DISTRICT COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON.
(Add following to existing wording)

Serve as the Global Action Team Multiple District Chairperson to administer and promote membership growth, leadership development and humanitarian service throughout the multiple district by:

- (1) Ensuring the selection of a qualified Lion leader for the positions of GST multiple district coordinator, GMT multiple district coordinator.
- (2) Ensure regular meetings to discuss and advance initiatives established by the multiple district Global Action Team.
- (3) Collaborate with area leaders and district Global Action Teams

SECTION 9. **GLOBAL SERVICE TEAM (GST)** - It shall be the responsibility of this unit to develop and execute an annual multiple district action plan and monitor progress toward goals. Support districts and offers motivation to reach district goals. The duties of

Global Service Team (GST) shall be as defined in the Multiple District 17 Standard Operating Procedures.

Section 10. **MULTIPLE DISTRICT GLOBAL ACTION TEAM (GAT)**. Chaired by the council chairperson and includes the GMT multiple district coordinator, GST multiple district coordinator and GLT multiple district coordinator. Develops and initiates a coordinated plan to help expand humanitarian service, achieve membership growth, and develop future leaders within the multiple district. The duties of Global Action Team (GAT) shall be as defined in the Multiple District 17 Standard Operating Procedures

Section 11. **LCIF MULTIPLE DISTRICT COORDINATOR.** The LCIF Multiple District Coordinator is appointed by the LCIF chair-person and LCI president to serve for a three-year term. This position serves as an ambassador for Lions Clubs International Foundation and reports directly to LCIF chairperson and LCIF Board of Trustees. His/her duties shall be as defined in the Multiple District 17 Standard Operating Procedures.

Past International President Sid L. Scruggs III, of Vass, N.C., will be the special guest of Kansas Lions at the 2018 State Convention.

He was elected president of The International Association of Lions Clubs at the association's 93rd International Convention, held in Sydney, Australia, June 28-July 2, 2010. Past President Scruggs is a retired military and commercial airline pilot and a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy.

Using as his presidential theme, "A Beacon of Hope," Past President Scruggs made service to others – the core principle of Lions clubs around the world – the focal point of his presidency. He is a member of the Vass Lions Club and has held many offices in the association. In addition, he has presented at the USA/Canada and Europa Leadership forums and served as an instructor for the Lions Clubs International Leadership Institute and the District Governors-elect School.

Special guest speaker at Friday's convention luncheon will be Miss Kansas Krystian Fish of Wichita.

Fish was crowned in Pratt on June 10, 2017. She will talk about her platform "Remove the Labels: Be Unstoppable" which focuses on encouraging people of all abilities to strive to reach their goals.

Fish is a graduate of Butler Community College and Wichita State University, earning a degree in psychology from WSU in 2018. Her career ambition is to work as a special projects director in disability services.

She truly is a multi-talented woman. Her talent at the Miss Kansas Pageant in June 2017 in Pratt was a vocal performance of "They Just Keep Moving the Line." She earned numerous scholastic honors, including an Inter-

national Soroptomist Volunteer of the Year Scholarship, Butler Community College Vocal Activity Scholarship; and she is a Clifford Stone Performing Arts Scholar. She also is a DECA Human Resources State Champion & International Qualifier, was listed on the Dean's Honor Roll and earned a college GPA of 3.5.

Her leadership roles have included Kansas representative for the National League of Cities Conference; Mayor's Youth Council Board member; Fellowship of Christian Athletes President & Collegiate Representative; President of Psychology Club; BCC lead in Barbershop Quartet; BCC Resident Assistant; Northwest High School Principal's Advisory Board; Director of Miss Unstoppable Pageant; Be Unstoppable Campaign Founder; YESS Camp Office Manager and Education Lead.

Her hard work and volunteerism have been honored with numerous awards, including The Arc of Sedgwick County Young Volunteer of the Year; Circle of Friends Spirit of the Circle Award Recipient; Arc's Excellence Award Recipient; Miss Kansas 2017 Quality of Life Winner, Outstanding Stage Presence, Preliminary Swimsuit; Miss Kansas 2016 Outstanding Vocalist, 2nd Runner Up Finalist; NCA All American Dancer; Featured blogger for

Saturday – Jackie Stiles The "Claflin Wonder" and former WNBA star will share her personal journey

Jacqueline Marie Stiles began life as the oldest of four children born in Kansas City, Kan. on Dec. 21,1978 to parents Pat and Pam Stiles. Jackie, as most know her, grew up in Claflin and attended Claflin High School.

It was her athletic accomplishments that made her a household name in Kansas sports. Her achievements are numerous but she is best known for what she did on the basketball court. As a junior in high school, she scored 61 points in 17 minutes of the opening game of the season. By the end of her senior year, she was the leading scorer for boys and girls in Kansas High School history. She also is the state record holder for points in one game, with 71.

She also excelled on the track. During her four years of high school, she won a state record 14 gold medals and was the first to win the 400, 800, 1600 and 3200 meters in one day. She placed in the top three in state cross

country all four years. She also played tennis for the Claflin Wildcats and placed second in the state tournament in three seasons.

At Missouri State, she was known for her spinning jump shots, driving lay ups and 3-pointers. She is the alltime leading scorer in NCAA Division I basketball history with 3,393 points. She had a compelling competitive spirit and stop-on-a-dime quickness. She brought to the court incredible jump shots and moves that defied defenses designed specifically to stop her. Her career at MSU culminated in the 2001 NCAA Tournament, where she led the Lady Bears to a Final Four appearance. In the Sweet Sixteen game, she scored 41 points in an 81-71 shocking victory against top-ranked Duke.

Jackie remains the only woman to score more than 1,000 points in a single season. She procured a number of See STILES on page 9

In addition to his Lions activities, Past President Scruggs served many years as chairperson of the board of directors of the North Carolina Governor Morehead School for the Blind. He also is a life member of the American Airlines Grey Eagles Association and the Naval Academy Alumni Association.

He has been presented with the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the highest award given by the State of North Carolina, by the governor. He is a member of the North Carolina Lions Hall of Fame and in 2010 he was elected to the United States Blind Golf Association Hall of Fame. He has received an honorary doctorate of humanities from World University.

In recognition of his service to the association, Past President Scruggs has received numerous awards, including the Key of Nations Award for sponsoring more than 100 Lions members; numerous Presidential awards; the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association gives to its members, and the Friend of Humanity Award, the highest award given by Lions Clubs International Foundation. He is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow at the Humanitarian Partner level.

Past President Scruggs and his wife, Judy, also a Lion and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have four children, 17 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

"The Mighty" Disability Blog; and founder of the non-profit "Jacob's Voice."

Fish is the lead actress in an educational health video, "Operation Lunch Line" from Kid Power Productions, which has toured in the United States and the United Kingdom eight times. She arranged and directed a rendition of "The Wizard of Oz" that featured 150 students with special needs. She also is a comic book character, "Kate," in Kid Power Comics, a blogger, and a mentor for middle school girls in her local church.

"My favorite things are: Jesus, love for tacos, and iced coffee," Fish says in her official bio.

She has worked as Outreach Services Advocate at GraceMed Health Clinic, Inc.; special education para educator at Woodman Elementary; special projects assistant for Arc of Sedgwick County, and as Miss Unstoppable Director.

awards in her college career, including: being named a three-time Missouri Valley Player of the Year, winning the Wade Trophy for best female basketball player in the nation, and the Broderick cup for college Woman Athlete of the Year in 2001. She also was a first team Verizon Academic All-American and first team Kodak All-American.

She was the fourth pick in the 2001 Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) draft, going to the Portland Fire. She captured the Rookie of the Year title that summer with a scoring average of 14.9 points. She was named to the 2001 WNBA All-Star Team and was named WNBA Player of the Year, averaging 22 points on 54 percent shooting. Jackie played briefly in the Australian league before retiring in 2006 due to injuries incurred from her legendary training regimen.

Her career was one that every player dreams of and she has dedicated herself to helping young athletes around the country achieve their dreams. After her playing career, Jackie started "J.Stiles Total Training," which provides personal training, private basketball instruction, motivational speaking, and sports broadcasting.

In the summer of 2012, Jackie accepted an assistant coaching position with LMU in Los Angeles. In the spring of 2013, Stiles was hired by her alma mater, where she currently is an assistant women's coach.

LCI has announced the speakers for plenary sessions at this year's convention in Las Vegas.


At the 10 a.m.-1 p.m. session on Sunday, July 1, the guest

Your eyeglass donations impact lives around the world

MD-17 Lions continue to support the used eyeglasses program. Here are the latest numbers:

-77 banana boxes of sorted glasses went to Indiana (with approximately 400 pairs per box, that's 30,000 pairs);

-54 large prison shipper boxes received containing 10 small boxes (50 pair per box) of sorted, labeled, glasses each (27,000 pairs);

-20 banana boxes of colored sunglasses (approximately 250 pairs average per box for 5,000 pairs). Most of these dark sunglasses are shipped to countries down near the equator due to their climate conditions;

-9 boxes of salvage glasses (beyond repair) parts & pieces. We have no outlet for single lenses; they are sent to the landfill:

-2 medium size boxes of hearing aids & parts. These are sent to the Indi-

ana Lions Hearing & Speech Center in Indianapolis to be repaired & distributed to folks with hearing problems.

Kansas Lions had a total of 162 containers in this March 17 shipment.

When I get requests from

V O S H groups and others who make annual "mission trips" to Third World nations to assist them with sight-related problems for many of their population, frequently I do not have the exact prescription glasses in my stock that they need. I do rely on the Indiana Lions to supply these needs. It should be mentioned that Indiana Lions have come to the rescue for Kansas many times. They have shipped them to the Kansas Lions groups needing them and also paid for the delivery cost. If you or your group have special eyeglass needs that I cannot fill from the inventory in our barn, contact me and I will give you

the Indiana Lions contact info.

I have received some negative comments about sending Kansas glasses to Indiana. I would be in DEEP TROUBLE if I tried to fill the eyeglass requests only out of my used eyeglass inventory at the recycle barn here in Scranton. The need for used eyeglasses

is GREAT. Currently we have active recycle programs in three of the Kan-

sas correctional facilities, Ellsworth, Hutchinson and Winfield. Once a month I haul supplies to them and then pick up their finished glasses on the return trip back to Scranton. We have some Lions Counter Collection boxes available also.

We do use the storage room at the State Office in Wichita in cases where we have more glasses to haul than we have capacity to handle.

Keep the eyeglass collections as one of your club's major functions. We can use them for folks that cannot afford glasses in Third World nations.

Sight Foundation work reaches into many venues

Audio Reader – Kansas Lions Sight Foundation (KLSF) has made it possible for Audio Reader (AR) to provide 24/7 broadcast of printed publications to thousands of listeners despite budget cuts. The KLSF support has allowed AR to broadcast 8,700 hours of pro-

graming this past year, which included 90 newspapers, 110 magazines, and 200 books. This support also provided the necessary funding for AR's Large Print and Braille Program Guides. KLSF

funding helped AR share programing through the KLSF Satellite Network across Kansas and Missouri along with other audio information services across the nation.

Audio Reader is requesting \$20,000 from the Kansas Lions Sight Founda-

tion to continue to provide services to many who are unable to read conventional print. This amount would cover \$14,000 for one year of satellite transmission, \$1,300 for the Braille Program Guide, \$2,200 for the Large Print

Program Guide, and \$2,500 for subscriptions to numerous publications.

Clause DeVorss Fellowships – To date, 106 of these fellowships have been awarded.

Kansas Eye Bank (KEB) – KEB

partners with Midwest Transplant Network to host regular donor meetings within hospitals across Kansas. These meetings are designed to instruct hospital staff about best practices for organ, tissue, and cornea donation. Total corneas retrieved with intent to trans-

plant in 2017 were 693, providing 231 domestic and 158 international transplants. **KUMC** – The KU Eye Clinic has provided four surgeries in October, November, and December with another one planned in February 2018.

Knights of Sight Pin – We have collected \$1,873.39 and sent out 14 pins since our last meeting.

Sight Week Fundraising – Fundraising since July 1, 2017 has amounted to \$2,293.39. This compares to \$3,153.52 for the same time period in 2016. This committee is attempting to get more clubs involved in a special fundraiser to raise sufficient funds for the KU Eye Clinic.

KanLovKids – There were seven Low Vision Clinics from October to January and six Pediatric Low Vision Collaboration Clinics with several upcoming clinics scheduled. This program has added materials and equip-

ment to aid with low vision evaluations. They are hoping to add a Slit Lamp at the Kansas State School for the Blind to their list of equipment for these evaluations.

Mobile Screening Unit (MSU) – The MSU will be returning to the Kansas State Fair in September 2018 and will again ask the Kansas Lions to volunteer to assist with this Kansas Lions Service project. With Lions Clubs International emphasizing Diabetes Awareness this year it is a great opportunity to schedule the MSU in your community. The KLSF will supply your clubs with the promotional materials to publicize these free screenings offered by the MSU. BC/BS Foundation has acknowledged they will only supply \$10,000 funding for the MSU for the next three years.

Kansas Kid Sight – The screenings report since the state council meeting in October 2017 are: District A: 6 months to 6 years, 3,050 screened with 302 referrals; 7 to 18, 6,540 screened with 629 referrals, and adults, 29 screened with 2 referrals; District K: 6 months to 6 years, 1,684 screened with 107 referrals and other screenings, 1,390 with 80 referrals; and District N (July 1 to Third State Council Meeting) 6 months to 6 years, 1,571 screened, 166 referred; other screenings, 5,565 screened 453 referred. Lion Dr. Anne Nielsen and Lion Sylvia Reinhardt continue to represent the KLSF on the Kansas Vision Summit, sponsored by Envision. Lion Dr. Nielsen is on the Kansas Coalition Task Force Ad Hoc Committee to review the Kansas Vision Screening Guidelines and update them.

Vision Service to Veterans – There are future workshops being planned to provide education and information to veterans and other individuals over 55 challenged with limited vision and hearing. KLSF is working with Lion Robert Hamilton to connect with Lions clubs in the areas where these workshops could be scheduled.


