District 17A has a 50/50 PCC Beverly Nichols Reading Action Program.


If your club purchases \$100.00 worth of books, the District will purchase \$100.00 worth of books for your club (or any dollar amount).

Quarterly KU Eye Lions Vision Clinics

KU Eye Lions Club is made up of KU Eye physicians, residents and staff. Together, we hold quarterly free vision clinics for those who are uninsured and cannot otherwise afford eyecare, as identified by other Lion Clubs or agencies/healthcare



providers. For those who qualify and on a caseby-case basis, we also provide free or discounted surgeries at our KU Eye Surgery & Laser Center, which is an ambulatory surgery center.

In an effort to address our limited financial resources and increasing patient demand for services, we do ask that folks go through/check with Kansas City Free Eye Clinic, Safety Net Clinics, and Metro Care (Missouri) and Wy Jo Care (Kansas) before referring to us directly. We assist with their clients/patients as well, through our regular clinics. Other agencies that may be able to assist and/or are resources include Cover KC, Community Health Council of Wyandotte County, EyeCare America, eAudiobooks through the Johnson County Library, Helen Keller Services and the Assisted Living Research Institute site. Many of our ophthalmologists also volunteer with Operation Sight, which is another resource for help with cataracts.

We gratefully accept tax deductible 501c3 donations to further our efforts at helping the underserved population receive the vision care they need! You can easily donate through PayPal.

Important Update Kansas Lions Band Camp May 26-30, 2026

Lions it is time to start contacting potential band students to attend the Kansas Lions Band camp next summer at HCC. The Band Committee will have more information available at a later date. Information will be sent directly to the Clubs. However, due to the increase in overall costs of the five-day camp, an increase in cost per student has been approved by the Band Committee. Cost of attending the camp next summer has been **increased to \$300.00** per student. Even with this increase, the Kansas Lions Band camp is still below the average of other camps in Kansas. In 2003, the cost per student was \$225.00, then raised to \$250.00 in 2012.

The Band Committee is reviewing the on-line application process, looking at ways to improve the overall process. Students will be directed to make contact with their sponsoring club if they are seeking financial assistance.

Global Service Team Coordinator

- 1. A separate memo was sent to all Cabinet members and to club Presidents and Secretaries outlining overall service guidance for this year. Here is an extract of items for the immediate future.
- 2. The main purpose of this article is to provide information about Mental Health and encourage service related to that. Before I get into specifics, there are two items for consideration:
- a. International President A. P. Singh is asking that we help amplify Lions International global impact during the following designated weeks:
- (1) Mental Health and Well-Being (October 4-12, 2025)
- (2) Hunger (January 3-11, 2026)
- (3) Environment (April 18-26, 2026)
- b. The Club Excellence Award for 2025-2026 has a change to the Service criterion that indicates that clubs must have related activities during these three weeks and report them online in the Lion Portal.

As we approach each of the three service weeks, we will highlight ideas to encourage participation through newsletter articles and mass media. To lead up to the first service week, DG Irene is having a special speaker at the first Cabinet meeting to talk about Mental Health.

- 3. Lions International has eight global causes and four special initiatives. One of the newest initiatives is mental health. Lions are shining a light on mental health and well-being by raising awareness, serving their communities, and advocating for positive change. Mental health is made up of a variety of factors, including our emotional, physical, psychological, and social well-being. To best address the need for improved mental health, we must first understand the facts and challenges surrounding mental health. Here are some facts from the LI website:
- a. 25% increase in rates of anxiety and depression since 2020.
- b. 1 in 7 youths aged 10-19 experience mental health conditions, though many are unrecognized and untreated.
- c. 14% of adults aged 60+ live with a mental health disorder. Loneliness and social isolation are key risk factors.

- d. 20 countries still criminalize attempted suicide, and stigma and discrimination remain against those with mental health conditions worldwide.
- 4. So, what can we as clubs do to support this new initiative?

First, tell your clubs that this is one of the four new LI initiatives and give them a brief synopsis on what that means.

Then find a mental health provider in your community and invite him/her to give a program at your club. Ask how you can promote education, awareness, and advocacy resources in your community.

Find a mental health related activity you can participate in during the International President's Mental Health and Well-Being week (October 4-12, 2025).

Applications will not be necessary for the 2025-2026 award cycle. Awards will be distributed by Lions International to clubs that meet the updated criteria and eligibility requirements.

Club Excellence Award criteria

The Club Excellence Award acknowledges the dedication and legacy of service within individual clubs

MEMBERSHIP

- Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members, whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- Or sponsor a new Lions club.

SERVICE

- Report a minimum of four service activities to Lions International.
- Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International Weeks of Service



LEADERSHIP

- Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the Lions Learning Center.
- The club president for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
- A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between July 1 December 31 of the current Lion year.

DONATIONS

 Contributed to LCIF a minimum of the club's membership total on June 30th of the previous Lion year (2024-2025), multiplied by US\$20.

The winning poster at the District will then be forwarded to the state competition. The young artists with the top three posters selected at the District judging will be invited to the District Convention on April 4, where their artwork will be displayed.
