Time for reflection and exploration

As the calendar year winds down and a new year is embraced, people tend to take stock and make resolutions for the upcoming year. Future opportunities and threats to our wellbeing are easily identified. As humans, we tend to focus on our weaknesses and have difficulty identifying our strengths – our value, but both are necessary for an honest reflection. After our lists are prepared, we plan how to overcome the threats and our weaknesses to maximize opportunities utilizing our strengths. This process seems like a personal SWOT analysis.



It's easy for us to apply the principles of SWOT analysis to our personal journeys, but we resist applying the process to our Lions clubs. Why?

The process is HUGE and overwhelming, sometimes paralyzing the club. Club members have many drains on their time and this process appears daunting. Taking an in-depth honest look at our club requires members to take risks. Also needed is an environment of non-judgement – every member's concern needs to be voiced; every idea is considered.

Wisdom suggests that all big tasks need to be broken down into smaller manageable pieces. Could

that principle be applied to this analysis? Clubs could take 15 minutes at a meeting to address one of the elements of SWOT. The acronym is a good guide to approach the process. Start with club strengths and then contrast them with club weaknesses. Next identify opportunities within your community and then the threats to the club.

After completion of the SWOT – **the reflection** – all the inputs are compiled and shared with club members. Next step – **the exploration** – planning to seize opportunities and overcome the threats/weaknesses through the strength of your club.

The plan can be approached in the same manner. Take one opportunity at each meeting and form a plan. This process has the potential to explore new service projects, encourage membership growth, and expand club operational traditions. Enjoy the journey to a stronger vibrant club!

District elections set for February convention

The new year is here and it is time to prepare for our annual District elections, to be held during the District Convention on February 28 in Goddard.

We will have the District Governor, First Vice-District Governor and Second-Vice District Governor up for election.

Each of those positions requires you to have served as a Club President and Zone Chair, as well as a Vice District Governor for the Governor position.

You must submit a letter announcing your candidacy as well as a letter of recommendation from your home club to Nominations Chair Doug Gatewood at doug.gatew@gmail.com.

In order to be on the ballot you must have your information turned in by February 21 for ALL offices and foundation positions.

Also on the ballot on Feb. 28:

Kansas Lions Band Foundation: two positions 2026-2028 (2 year term). Completing their terms and going off are PCC Harry Stockwell and PDG Stuart Tolle.

Kansas Lions Foundation: one Position 2026-2029 (3 year term). Completing her term and going off is PCC Helen LeBlanc.

****Kansas Lions Foundation One Position**** 2026-2027 (one year). Completion of unexpired term creat-

ed by the resignation of Don Sefers (2024-2027).

Kansas Lions Sight Foundation: two positions 2026-2029 (three year term). Completing their terms and going off are PDG Gene Allen and Lion Ginny Caldwell.

****Kansas Lions Sight Foundation One Position**** 2026-2027 (one year). Remainder of unexpired term created by the resignation of Don Sefers (2024-27).

Per bylaws, appointments to open Foundation positions may be made only until annual conventions at which time those positions will be filled by election.

Currently serving in those seats left open by the resignation of Don Sefers are Lion Jon Freund on KLF and Lion Scott Helmke on KLSF.

Please submit a letter announcing your intent to seek any of these foundation positions to doug.gatew@gmail.com before February 21, 2026. No letter of recommendation is required for a foundation position.

PDG Chris Bauer will be handling credentialing and elections so please remember to go straight to the credentials table when you register so you will be able to vote on Saturday. Delegate forms will be published in the February district newsletter.

Five amendments proposed for District Constitution

Delegates at the District 17N convention will have the opportunity to vote on five amendments to the District 17N Constitution.

Voting will take place during the Convention meeting on Saturday, February 28. Delegate forms will be published in the February district newsletter.

Amendment 1—Current Wording

“His/her” in 59 locations replace with “Their” and “He/she” in 14 locations replace with “They”

Rational: LCI has made this change in the standard district constitution and by-laws.

Amendment 2—From Current Wording of the 17-N's MISSION STATEMENT

TO EMPOWER volunteers to serve their communities, meet humanitarian needs, encourage peace and promote international understanding through Lions clubs.

Change wording to match LCI's MISSION STATEMENT Wording

TO EMPOWER Lions clubs, volunteers and

partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian service and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding.

Amendment 3—Delete wording in italics

ARTICLE III: Section 8. GLOBAL EXTENSION TEAM COORDINATOR (*if the position is utilized during the district governor's term*).

Rational: The GET position was originally optional.

Amendment 4—LCI's wording update on this position adds wording in italics

ARTICLE III: Section 11. LEO/ LEO-LION CABINET LIAISON (OPTIONAL). The district governor, in consultation with the district Leo chair, may choose to appoint a Leo or a Leo-Lion to serve a one-year term in an official non-voting capacity.

Constitutional amendments

The Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison shall represent the interests and perspectives of Leos and Leo-Lions and facilitate communication and connection between Leos and Lions. In areas with a Leo district, the role shall be filled by a Leo-Lion or Leo, who is a current or past Leo district president, vice-president, secretary, or treasurer *unless otherwise approved by the Membership Development Committee*. In areas where no Leo district has been formed, the role shall be filled by a Leo or a Leo-Lion who is a current or former Leo club president *unless otherwise approved by the Membership Development Committee*.

Amendment 5—Current wording

ARTICLE IV: Section 2. DISTRICT GLOBAL ACTION TEAM. Chaired by the district governor and includes the GMT district coordinator, GST district coordinator and GLT district coordinator.

LCI adds the district global extension coordinator

ARTICLE IV: Section 2. DISTRICT GLOBAL ACTION TEAM. Chaired by the district governor and includes the district global membership coordinator, district global service coordinator, district global leadership coordinator and district global extension coordinator and is supported by the district marketing chairperson.

Rationale: This role was officially added to the standard district organizational chart around June 2022 and became a mandatory requirement for the 2025-2026 Lions year.

Lions International has gone paperless

Club dues statements will no longer be mailed. Club secretaries and treasurers will need to log into the Lion Portal and navigate to My Club - Club Statements to check the club's balance and make payments.

Reviewing and paying your club's balance regularly helps keep your club in good standing.

For questions regarding your club's statement, please contact Membership Billing at membershipbilling@lionsclubs.org.

Club presidents and secretaries, it is important to review your club's roster at least monthly. By reviewing the club's roster, you are ensuring that it is up-to-date, and your club avoids being billed for inactive members. Log into the Lion Portal reporting system to update.

The December membership blues

Looking at the December 26 My Lion Global Dashboard for Lions Membership for District 17N, there was a considerable, sharp drop in membership.

The highest figure for this year was in May where the total number was 1,388 members. On December 26, the membership totaled 1,310. Eighty-seven members have been dropped during 2025 Lions year with 44 new members added. This has resulted in a -43 or a -3.28% net growth so far this Lions year. The District had been holding its own until November where there was a slight downward trend of 1,351.

Probably the most glaring problem is that clubs might be dropping non-paying members before the December 31 deadline. They may have been carrying to where they cannot afford before they are charged. Also, the District

lost clubs that carried at least ten members on their rolls. The other factors have members moving from that community, death, possible dissatisfaction, and again non-payment of dues.

If the will is there, this can be built back to an upward swing. Clubs and their members will need to recruit new members and find ways to retain the members they have. The Global Extension Team for the District will need help from members and their clubs to find and form potential new clubs. Remember, the more that is lost in membership, the quality of the service provided by Lions will suffer.
