Forum provides wealth of ideas

It was an eye opening experience to attend my first USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Louisville, KY in September. The forum's theme was "Setting the Pace" and boy was the pace fast and furious — just what you'd expect at the city famous for Churchill

Downs horse track.



This event was a couple thousand enthusiastic, energetic, and sincere fellow Lions who were just as eager to learn and come to know best club practices, explore new ideas, and hear our International Leaders motivate us to grow our membership and

Clubs around the world and in our own communities. This was the primary and constant message given and received for the next three days.

I arrived Wednesday afternoon and the airport was full of fellow Lions from all across the USA, Canada, Europe, Central Asia, Asia, and Australia. My first move was to share a cab with a Lion from Ottawa, Canada and a Lion from central India. The Canadian spoke about her clubs up north and she certainly didn't appreciate the hot muggy weather in KY. The Lion from India was in a silk looking suit and seemed to be comfortable. He spoke about how dry the weather is back home. It was the first Leadership Forum for each of us and none knew what to expect.

The first learning activity was called the speed learning, one of the the most popular sessions at the Forum. Think of it as something like speed dating where you only have a short period of time to exchange ideas. It was a huge room of 12 tables with a Lion leading group discussions about member empowerment, bridging the generation gap, Lions Quest, recognition of members, service project ideas, marketing your club, creative service projects, building and organizing clubs, cyber clubs, and club branches; just to list a few.

My next event was the Strides Walk for Diabetes Awareness event. I got a bright red t-shirt and joined nearly 300 participants for a group photo, before walking the perimeter of the convention center which was about two city blocks square.

An afternoon session was about the Lion Portal

and exploring new digital tools. There was an overview on using the portal and the take away was to have each and every Lion get registered with LI by emailing or calling for help.

Friday started early with the Midwest breakfast hosted by MD 13. The program included plans for the rest of the Forum and IP Fabricio Olivera shared his vision of service. He encouraged every Lion to "make their mark" in the coming year by increasing membership and clubs to serve over one billion people.

I attended a seminar on humanitarian service where several Lions covered the critical needs all around the world and projects empowered by LCIF to change the world, followed by a session on how KY Lions use a LCIF Diabetes Grant to provide free A1c screening with new testing technology that only takes a pin prick and ten minutes.

Luncheon speaker Randy Pierce, a mountain climber and competitive runner who happens to be blind, shared a message about using adversity as a positive catalyst for growth and opportunity.

The afternoon seminar was with 1stVP AP Singh along with other 1VDGs. He shared goals, plans, and actions for the 2025 International Convention in Mexico City next July. He said every Lion's first duty is to grow the association so we can serve more people throughout the world. More members, more service; it's that simple.

Another session was Constitution and Bylaws, an interactive session where Lion John Youney asked questions and he expected you to know the correct answer. If you were wrong, it was a dollar that went to LCIF. If you were right, you got a lapel pin. Let's just say I did both and I learned a lot as well.

Saturday started with a seminar on managing a District. The other morning seminar was a real race to the finish with PIP Brian Sheehan who used his energetic style presenting information that was designed to spark creativity and help participants through the process of starting new clubs or rebuilding the one we have.

The luncheon speaker was IP Fabricio Olivera who was quite forceful about his expectations to achieve 1.5 Lion members worldwide so we can better meet the growing needs of our communities and serve more people than ever before. After lunch, I attended the

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Valley Center Lions goes to the dogs

Valley Center Lions Club often welcomes visitors to our meetings. But the last meeting was the first that a pack of dogs came to see us. But these dogs are really special animals. That is thanks to the Great Plains Search K9's, Incorporated, who are a nationally certified group of Trainers and Handlers located in Wichita.

GPSK9's human volunteers brought four of their canine partners to tell the story of their ability to serve our community, as well as the whole six state area in the central United States.

The GPSK9's are an organization who raise, train, feed & house their dogs and practice with them every day in differing weather, terrain and both urban and rural areas so that they are ready to travel when called upon by police officers and search & rescue organizations. They are a 100% volunteer, nonprofit group funded by out-of-their-own pocket, and donations from individuals and organizations.

GPSK9 trainers and handlers Nadine Conner, Kari Karlskint and K.D. Keim, along with helper Sheryl Karlskint (formerly an employee of the Valley Center Chamber) visited the meeting with four of their search & rescue dogs. We got to meet two of the Belgian Malinois, ("Gizzy" and "Groot"), a Bloodhound ("Slim") and a little firecracker of a Working (shorthaired) Cocker Spaniel named "Pidgeon."

All have had extensive training and experience in finding lost humans with their incredibly sensitive and trained natural senses. They can find the active lost, stationary, possibly injured or deceased folks. Trainer



Nadine Conner demonstrated the ability of "Gizzy" to find a particular target among several similar identical targets placed around the meeting rooom.

Some breeds are trained for ground tracking, and some can locate scents in the air. Some dogs can even track across either still or running water, and can many times find a deceased person under water.

It was an unique, enjoyable and enlightening program for the Lions in attendance, thanks to the Great Plains Search K9's.

Diabetes Awareness Month: Let's fight diabetes

November is "Diabetes Awareness Month." November 14 is Worldwide Diabetes Awareness Day. I would like to encourage each club to have a club project or a club program related to diabetes awareness. Over 245,000 Kansans are diabetic. Many more are walking around undiagnosed.

Diabetes can lead to vision loss, cardiovascular disease, kidney disease, stroke, open wounds, amputation of limbs and even gum disease.

Some of the symptoms are constantly being thirsty, fatigue, dizziness, constant urination and blurred vision. Everyone should have thorough lab workup annually, more often if your doctor requests. Information is available for American Diabetes Association at diabetes.org or LCI. You can order a STRIDES Kit from Stores at LCI with all the information on developing your own STRIDES Event for your community.

Some program suggestions are your local diabetes educator, a pharmacist to talk about the updates and different medications and how they work, your eye doctor to talk about related diseases. Also a good program is Area Agency on Aging. They have Medicare support people trained on all the big changes this next

year. I have a contact name for anyone in southeast Kansas area.

Diabetes Camp Discovery: We have established a line item in the District N budget for camp scholar-ships. The cost of a camper to attend Camp Discovery for one week is \$1600. ADA will help by giving \$800 per scholarship applicant. We will donate \$650 each. The family pays \$150. Camp applications are available in February. Dates for camp for 2025 are not available yet but usually the second week of June. This will be the 50th Anniversary of the camp. There are supposed to be special festivities before camp.

My goal is to raise \$5,000 this year. I challenge each club to donate \$100. You can send your check to District N treasurer Lion Barb Schattak on the memo line write "camp scholarship."

Diabetes is one of the main initiatives of Lions International and our District Governor has made it one of her goals this year to help build awareness. I'm asking each club to make it yours.
