Small town, small Lions Club, but big hearts and community spirit. Nestled in Anderson County, between US Highway 75 and US Highway 169 is the small town of Westphalia, Kansas. The 2020 census reported a population of 128. Westphalia is the home of the Westphalia Lions Club, which chartered in April 1969.

The club is led by President Olivia Lehmann, boasts a membership of 18 Lions, each of them dedicated to making a difference in the community. Throughout the year, the members play a vital role in supporting the community.

One can almost set a calendar by the various events and projects spearheaded by this remarkable group of Lions. Each spring, the Lions host an Easter Egg Hunt for the town's children. A fun filled event that is not only directed at the young children, but is also a highlight for the local families. The fun continued in mid-June this past summer with a fishing derby. 18 local children participated, with each of them receiving a prize and a free lunch at noon.

Each year at the start of a new school year, the Lions host a "Back to School Night" to prepare students and families for the upcoming school year. The event provides school supplies, treats, and encouragement for a successful year ahead. As fall continues, the Lions prepare for Halloween. Lions provide candy to all the elementary school students, after church services, and follow that up with hosting the community "Trunk-or-Treat" event.

Of course, the Christmas season soon follows and the Lions prepare for the various services they provide. In December 2023 the club held its first tree lighting ceremony in the city park. The event was a huge success and is being discussed if the club will make this an annual event.

In December, the Lions also provide candy to the children in the

community and fruit baskets to the community's elderly and shut-in residents.

Dedicated and determined, the Westphalia Lions Club members are making a difference in the community. Their efforts are focused on helping people of all ages, the young to the elderly. From honoring their veterans by maintaining the Veterans Memorial, providing scholarships to high school students pursuing further education, making donations to various organizations outside of the community, and so many

more projects undertaken, reflects the highest values of Lions Clubs International and being a Lion.
