Lions in District 17A and the State have been involved over the years with the Kansas State School for the Blind; after all, the Lions are Knights of the Blind. The club I belong to meets on the campus of KSSB. I wanted to share information with clubs in 17A about some of the ways Lions might sponsor or contribute.

Every Spring the students have a Prom. A Lions club can sponsor a luncheon for Prom or treat the girls to a manicure. Oftentimes outings are planned to help the students navigate the events and happenings in the community or maybe even just a trip to McDonalds. A club can sponsor an outing. Sponsors are needed for on campus clubs such as a Bowling Club or a music club. The end of the academic year brings other opportunities for sponsorship. A club can sponsor a Senior Luncheon or even an end of the school year celebration. Donations of paper towels, baby wipes, or antibacterial wipes are welcome as the school plans for the June Summer school program. Students learn life skills, the classroom would benefit from a large movable TV to help with instructions. Students would also benefit from interaction with farm animals or even animals from the jungle. forest or ocean. This might be a good opportunity to expose students to animals they do not normally encounter.

LCIF Challenge

As Multiple District 17 LCIF Coordinator, I'm issuing a challenge to Kansas Lions. One of the State LCIF goals this year is to increase the number of individual Lions making personal recurring LCIF donations. Hopefully, my challenge will help us meet this goal. The challenge for first time recurring donors, not current recurring donors. I made a similar challenge at the Mid-Winter Rally, and we've already presented a MJF to the winner.

The challenge is for Lions to pledge a recurring donation to LCIF for a minimum of 2 years. Preferably, these will be monthly or quarterly donations. For those that make the pledge before or during the State Convention in late May, I will put your names in a drawing. There will be 2 winners drawn at the convention. I will match the winners' total first year donations and will send them to LCIF in your name. For example, if you pledge \$5/month for two years, your total 2-year donation will be \$120 and your first year's total will be \$60. I will match your total of \$60 for the first year with a lump sum \$60 donation. If you pledge \$100/month, your 2-year total would be \$2,400 and your fist year total would be \$1,200.

In the latter case, that would qualify you immediately for a Melvin Jones Fellow/Progressive MJF. Based on your desires, I will submit you immediately for a MJF/PMJF and put the balance of \$200 into your credit balance. Your donations in the second year will qualify you for a PMJF. I hope all of you who pledge will let your recurring donations continue past the second year, but that is your choice. I will help you complete and submit the recurring donation pledge.

Please call me or email if you have questions. Again, you can start your recurring donations immediately, but winners for my lump sum donations will not be determined until the State Convention.
