your District Governor for almost four months, I have visited several District Clubs.

During my club visits, I always let them know our District goal for LCIF, that we ask clubs to also give any amount possible, and also asked for individual giving of at least \$1 each. I challenge every member of the District 17 N Cabinet to donate at least \$1 before the end of the Lion year on June 30, 2026.

I also encourage Lions to donate as an investment in the future because many of the fundraising is tax deductible. If we all gave just \$1, that would collectively be almost \$1.5 million. Donations are truly voluntary. No Lion should ever feel pressured to give more than they can afford just to be a Lion or achieve a District or Multi-District goal.

In my District, often I have had the wrong perception that the members and club are ones that have the least resources to donate to LCIF, KLF, Camp Discovery for teen diabetes, etc., but when the "Bag of Bucks" or "Change for Diabetes" jar is passed around, they have been giving the most in donations because of the experiences and tough times they have been through in their own lives.

We need to practice, truly and regularly, recognizing the time and talent that every Lion service volunteer hero provides and acknowledge that it is priceless. I have personally observed that those Lions with money are often in the club leadership and those with little, but want to give a lot, sometimes get overshadowed and coerced to fit in the organization and they very unfortunately sometimes eventually chose to leave.

Donations are important, but Lions can either give or help ask others to give to making a difference around the globe. Every contribution matters. Every Lion in our organization matters as well. It honestly doesn't matter whether it is monetary or you helped flip pancakes at a pancake feed. True generosity is measured by what's in the heart more than measured in money.

No one should ever feel they need to give beyond their means to belong. Our motto is WE SERVE. When we do it together, we are always better. This is what makes our organization and most of all, the clubs, strong with solidarity. No one expects a fellow Lion to give equally, but there is almost always equal sacrifice. So bring your hands, your voices, your new ideas, your presence to the table of giving and know that you are a valued member of the world's largest service organization.

Leader Dog services: more than 'guide dogs'

LEADER DOGS

I sincerely appreciate the opportunity to serve as your District Leader Dog Chairperson for 2025-26. My personal experiences through a series of retinal detachments and related surgeries have helped me to

gain a strong appreciation for those in our communities who go about their daily lives as blind and visually impaired citizens. Fortunately, I have since fully regained my eyesight and encourage you, if not already involved, to give consideration to assisting these citizens whenever possible through the numerous vision related service opportunities provided through the Lions Club organization.

Ever since the Uptown Lions Club of Detroit established in 1938 a school to train guide dogs for people who are blind, Lions Clubs throughout the world have continued to support Leader Dogs For the Blind. Leader Dog has continued to expand over the years beyond the original guide dog training program to offer additional programs and services.

For District 17N, key goals for the 2025-26 District Leader Dog program are to 1) expand the level of awareness of Leader Dog resources and programs across the District, and 2) achieve a level of financial support to Leader Dog by District Lions Clubs equal to or greater than last year's level.

Leader Dog Programs

There are several Leader Dog Programs that could provide additional opportunities for Lions Club members to serve the citizens of their communities.

Teen Summer Camp. The deadline for submitting applications through http://leaderdog.org is April 3, 2026. If you know of a teen in your community 16 to 17 years of age who is legally blind and able to utilize self-care skills including the ability to administer their own medications, consider contacting them to make them aware of this summer camp opportuni-The 2026 summer camp will be held June 21 - 27 at Leader Dog for the Blind's Rochester Hills, MI campus. This is a unique summer camp that combines fun activities with promoting increased independence by exploring mobility options such as learning to use GPS as a travel aid, building friendships with peers facing similar challenges, as well as discovering leadership skills. Although attendance is limited, training, transportation, accommodations, and meals are free to those teens who attend.

Orientation and Mobility Training. The free Orientation and Mobility program is a 7-day residential

program also held at Leader Dog for the Blind's Roch-

ester Hills, MI campus for those who are legally blind and at least 16 years of age. The training provides one-on-one instruction and accelerates the attendee's

learning process in acquiring the skills needed to travel safely using a white cane in indoor and outdoor environments, including transiting around the home, stores, crowds, elevators, street crossings, as well as training on how to use navigational technology where applicable. Applications accepted online at leaderdog.org. Training, accommodations, meals, and transportation are provided free to attendees.

Guide Dog. The free Guide Dog program matches clients with a guide dog that best fits their lifestyle, physical condition, and other considerations, and is available for people who are legally blind, able to care for a dog, have good orientation and mobility skills, and at least 16 years of age. Training is available either on-campus in Rochester Hills, in the client's home environment, or as a combination of both. The Guide Dog program is also available to those who are Deaf/Blind, where the guide dog receives all commands from their handler via hand signals. Guide Dog program applications can be completed online at leader-dog.org, or by calling (888) 777-5332.

The Leader Dog website provides a wealth of information on other organizations serving the blind and visually impaired, including the National Federation for the Blind (NFB). As part of the Free White Cane Program, the NFB offers a free white cane to support individuals who are blind or visually impaired to achieve greater independence and mobility. Requests for a free cane can be completed online at freecane. nfb.org, or by calling (410) 659-9314.

Financial Support of Leader Dog

According to Leader Dog program records, District 17N Lions Clubs donated a total of \$934 during the 2024-25 year. As noted earlier, this year's goal is to provide financial support equal to or greater than last year. Monetary donations can be submitted online at http://give.leaderdog.org. Caps for kids at Children's Mercy

Look at that sharp cap! A child would rather hear "You look cool!" than "I hope your hair grows back!"

Let's make bucket caps for the children at Children's Mercy Hospital. Chemo takes children's hair from

them also. Looking cool can only help them feel better about themselves. It gives children style and individuality.

We have the rules for making caps from the Children's Mercy Hospital volunteer guidelines. All



caps must be made of cotton without any chemicals like starch or Pelon in the brim. No adhesives that could cause an allergic reaction. If the dye on the fabric seems heavy, please wash the fabric before donating. The dye can cause allergic reactions.

The bucket cap style works for boys and girls of all ages. Decorating can be fun too. As long as, the decorations do not go through the caps to their head. Be kind and consider what a child would like for decorations. Let's make them smile! That can be FUN!

A Lion member has an Accupuilt to cut material for the caps out quickly. The bucket cap style works for boys and girls of all ages. The pieces will be cut in units of 10 caps to a gallon bag. The instructions will be included. Each caps is made of eight pieces: four pieces to make the top cap and four pieces to make the lining. The caps are reversible. They are washable and comfortable for their little heads.

Purpose of Faculty Development Institute (FDI): As a train-the-trainer focused institute, the primary purpose is to enhance training delivery skills and training techniques that will increase the quality of training and overall effectiveness of Lions leadership development programs. Accepted applicants will be notified by the Curriculum Coordinator/Registrar. Applicants not selected will have their course fees returned.

FDI Qualifications and Expectations:

- Current active member of a club within the constitutional area.
- Not attended an FDI within the last five (5) years. (International or Local)
- Have an interest in improving training delivery skills.
- In-depth knowledge of Lions' culture, Lions leadership experience, and comfort using PowerPoint is preferred.
- Expectations: Upon acceptance, participants are obligated to the following conditions.
 - Attend all sessions of the 3-day institute.
 - Arrange personal travel to and from the institute.

 - Arrange to be observed and evaluated conducting a local training event within 6 months of attending the FDI. The evaluation will be certified by the GLT MD Coordinator and Council Chair.
