Glen Elder Lions restore Lady Liberty's crown

In the spirit of “where there’s a need, there’s a Lion,” Glen Elder Lions charter member Roy Winkel repaired the crown on the Glen Elder Statue of Liberty. The statue is 75 years old and all the rays on her crown had broken off. Lady Liberty is now ready to celebrate America’s 250th birthday.

The Glen Elder statute is one of about 25 across the state (source: tourofhonor.com). The 8-foot replicas of the Statue of Liberty were installed in the early 1950s by Boys Scouts of America in recognition of the organization’s 40th anniversary.

According to a 2007 article in *Scouting Magazine*, 200 of the replica statues were made and distributed across the United States.

From *Scouting Magazine*: “Jack P. Whitaker, a Kansas City businessman and commissioner for the local Boy Scout council, originated the project after seeing a dedication of a Statue of Liberty replica made of chicken wire and concrete in Spirit Lake, Iowa.

“Whitaker paid \$3,500 to have an original mold made for the smaller Statues of Liberty. Then the Friedley-Voshardt Company in Chicago made the stamped-copper replicas. Each statue included more than 40 sheets of copper, about the thickness of a nickel, with a wooden frame on the inside.”

State Fair screening serves 2,075

International President A. P. Singh's motto "Lead to Serve-Serve to Lead" worked well at the 2025 Kansas State Fair. The Kansas Lions Sight Foundation (KLSF) lead the way of service by providing health screenings for any fairgoer that would stop and talk to us.

Nursing students from four area colleges provided blood pressure and blood sugar screening. Volunteer Lions lead the way in service by providing vision screening for adults and children. There were many opportunities for Lions to *Serve to Lead* in all of the Lions Clubs that volunteered.

We had some new experiences this year as it rained on the first and fourth days, causing all of the parking lots to be closed for three days. The Fair provided shuttle service to and from the Hutchinson Sports Arena parking lot for these three days, but it seemed to us this arrangement limited attendance for these days.

The statistics for the project were 2,075 clients served.

The individual areas were:

- Blood Pressure: total screened—1,151
229 referred with high or low pressures.
- Blood Sugar: total screened—1,010
215 with high or low levels
- Adult Visual Acuity: total screened—387
0 referrals
- Adult Field of Vision: total screened—375
31 referrals (one with tunnel vision and she did not know it)
- SPOT screening (children): total screened—602
59 referrals (One 18 month old child had severe astigmatism (out of focus vision) and the parents did not know it.)

Thanks to 120 nursing students and their instructors for helping with the blood pressure and blood sugar screenings. They were from Cloud County Com-

munity College, Kansas Wesleyan College, Hutchinson Community College-McPherson Campus and Bethel College.

There were 110 Lions that volunteered over the 10



days of the fair. There is no way the KLSF could carry out this excellent community service project without the support of these volunteers.

Several positives came from this project: Lion Vern was walking past a booth for Tracy Mann with his Lions vest on and the person in the booth stopped him and ask what the Lions were doing at the Fair—a perfect opportunity to explain KLSF's purpose.

Then she said "I am indebted to the Lions because when I was in seventh grade my family could not afford glasses for me and the local Lions Club bought them for me. Then it was easier for me to do my school work. THANK YOU! Lion Vern for what you are doing."

Lion Vern talked to three prospective members and gave applications to two. After each shift the Lions organization was shared with the nursing students and an invitation was extended asking them to join a Lions Club.

We initiated a new program this year to let anyone know where eyeglasses collection boxes were located. Twenty-eight Lions clubs gave us their box locations and we compiled that information onto a flyer we handed out, along with a description as to how donated eyeglasses are processed and used.

A special thanks goes to the Bel Aire Lions Club for transporting our equipment and materials to and from the Fair, and to Lion Jackie O'Neal for scheduling all of the Lions volunteers and to Lion Dr. Steve Cauble for his expert advice and to PCC Randy St Aubyn for his daily support and transportation efforts.

KU Eye Lions provide vision care clinics

KU Eye Lions Club is made up of KU eye physicians, residents and staff. Together, we hold quarterly free vision clinics for those who are uninsured and cannot otherwise afford eyecare, as identified by other Lion Clubs or agencies/healthcare providers.

For those who qualify and on a case-by-case basis, we provide free or discounted surgeries at our KU Eye Surgery & Laser Center, which is an ambulatory surgery center.

In an effort to address limited financial resources and increasing patient demand for services, we do ask that

folks go through/check with local resources in their area.

Other agencies that may be able to assist include EyeCare America, Helen Keller Services and the Assisted Living Research Institute. Many of our ophthalmologists also volunteer with Operation Sight, which is another resource for help with cataracts.

2026 Band Camp Update

Lions it is time to start contacting potential band students to attend the Kansas Lions Band camp next summer at HCC. The Band Committee will have more information available at a later date. Information will be sent directly to the Clubs. However, due to the increase in overall costs of the five-day camp, an increase in cost per student has been approved by the Band Committee. Cost of attending the camp next summer has been **increased to \$300** per student. Even with this increase, the Kansas Lions Band camp is still below the average of other camps in Kansas. In 2003, the cost per student was \$225, then raised to \$250 in 2012.

The Band Committee is reviewing the online application process, looking at ways to improve the overall process. Students will be directed to make contact with their sponsoring club if they are seeking financial assistance. Payment to attend the camp needs to be sent to PID Hans Neidhardt, MD 17 Treasurer.



New Year, New Opportunities for Lions

A new year of providing service to people of the world is off to a great start.

Lions, what allows us to have such an impact around the world? The simple answer is our Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Since being established in 1968, LCIF has awarded over \$1.3 billion dollars through 22,000 grants. Your generous donations are the key to the success of our foundation. During 2024-2025, MD-17 Lions donated \$154.7 thousand dollars. In the first quarter of this year, Kansas Lions have donated nearly \$20,000. At the recent LCIF Coordinator training session, MD 17 goal was set at just over \$130,000, with a “stretch” goal of \$205,000. The final figures from last year show that MD-17 Lions are up to the challenge and with everyone’s help, we will meet the challenge.

Wishing Big for Childhood Cancer Patients. When Finley Holland was eight months old, a doctor discovered a tumor in her cheek. Her parents, Lions Tony and Stacy, began the grim routine so many families face when their children are sick. Appointment after appointment, they struggled to keep Finley entertained and distracted before an uncomfortable procedure or needle prick. They found that games and books helped. Anything to keep her distracted. “The Lions took my wish list and got every single one checked off.” “Play is a great distraction for kids,” says Jaime Libes, Finley’s oncologist. “It takes their minds off the needle that is about to come or the medicine that is about to make them feel sick.”

The key fact to remember, LCIF is your foundation and your generous donations will allow Lions to continue making positive impacts in providing needs of service. As a final thought, let's close with a quote from Maya Angelou, “*I’ve learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel.*”

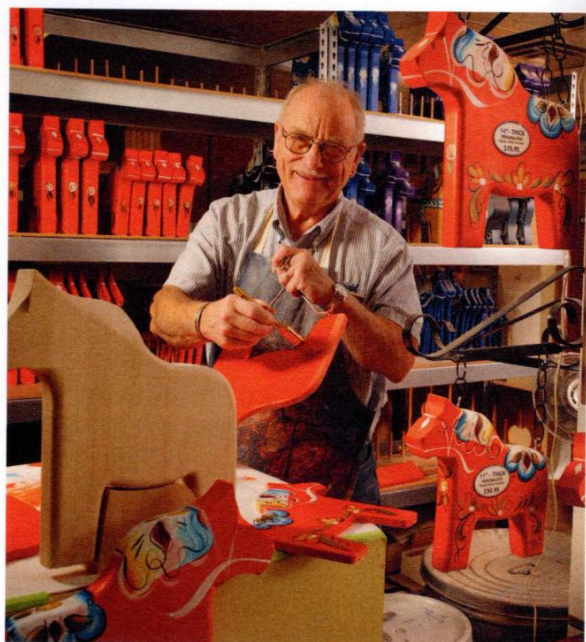
