Wow! It's already November and what an amazing year it has been so far. Lions have been active in their local communities doing what Lions do best.

Here is something for our local clubs to consider:



#### **District and Club Community Impact Grants**

Did you know that clubs that donate to LCIF at a qualifying level can get a club community impact grant? If club donations are less than the qualifying level, credits can be aggregated up to the district, together with credits for donations to LCIF from other clubs in the district to help the district qualify for a District Community Impact Grant. When the grant is approved, the district has one year to complete the project. All communities in the district can help identify a community project that benefits their community and with the help of the district Lions can make an impact in a local community.

### Lions can you help to identify a community project that will impact the community you serve?

Grants require LCIF approval and only donations to the Empowering Service Fund (unrestricted) are eligible. Qualifying districts and clubs can use earned credits for local projects by submitting a DCG application. Applications submitted by districts must be signed by the current district governor and be certified via resolution by the current district cabinet. Projects receiving DCG funding shall be clearly identified as being made possible by Lions and LCIF through appropriate recognition, signs, and public relations activities.

#### Grant examples:

- Support humanitarian projects that enhance community welfare and showcase Lions' impact.
- Fund health initiatives, such as wellness programs or playground equipment.
- Develop community engagement activities that foster collaboration between Lions and local organizations.

It's okay to think outside the box, shake things up, and do something new! Have you asked your newest members what they would like to do?

At the end of September I had pancakes with the Louisburg Lions. In early October I helped roll brats with the Overland Park Host Lions. It was back to pancakes with the Leawood Lions then off to Baldwin City to help make funnel cakes! I have assisted the Shawnee Lions and the Overland Park Host Lions with vision screenings.

- 1. DG Irene Haws wants to remind us that "We Serve". Everything else exists to support that.
- 2. Reminder that International President A. P. Singh is asking that we help amplify Lions International global impact during the following designated weeks:
- a. Mental Health and Well-Being (October 4-12, 2025). As of Nov. 1, In the Lion portal, 6 clubs reported an activity during this week: Assaria, Easton, Lansing, Miami County Traveling, Overland Park host, Shawnee, and Topeka Sunflower. (Topeka Lions Journey for Sight & Mental Wellness 5K was added after this report was made)
- b. Hunger (January 3-11, 2026)
- c. Environment (April 18-26) which aligns with Earth Day and would be an excellent time for our district-wide Service Project for the Kansas River.
- 3. As of October 26th, 30 clubs (44%) have inputted service projects in the Lion Portal. 173 activities with 43,578 people served. 4,405 volunteer hours reported.
- 4. Breakout of activities reported:
  - 6 Childhood Cancer
  - 2 Diabetes
  - 4 Disaster Relief
  - 18 Environment
  - 30 Hunger
  - 46 Humanitarian
  - 42 Vision
  - 22 Youth
  - 4 Administration
- 5. For district-wide functions, DG Irene's guidance is to have a service project at the District Convention and all Cabinet Meetings. She encourages us to share service ideas among clubs (Zone meetings?). She also encourages us to market our service projects, particularly new projects in the community, by promoting what Lions are doing and inviting others to volunteer and help. Her monthly newsletter will feature service projects, so I ask you to input your projects in the Lions Portal and/or send me short blurbs with photos after each project. I will edit them and send to the newsletter editor.
- 6. Reminder that in DG Irene's goals submitted to LCI, she included the following about service: "To increase the impact and relevance of service in my district, raise awareness of club service, and attract prospective members during my district governor term, I commit to work with my team to actively contribute to global impact and increase the percentage of Lion and Leo clubs reporting service.
- Our team will focus on the following two global causes: Environmental and Hunger.
- Our team will ensure 90% of Lion and Leo clubs in our district report service.

She is committed to ensuring that I, as GST District Coordinator, promotes the importance of timely planning and reporting of service."

As we continue to serve this fiscal year under the leadership of International President A.P. Singh, whose theme "Lead to Serve and Serve to Lead" and District Governor Irene's inspiring vision "Chart Your Course," we are collectively setting a strong direction for District 17A. In my role as Global Leadership Team (GLT) Chair, Leadership Development Team (LDT) Chair, and New Voices – Women in Lions Chair, my focus remains on cultivating capable leaders and driving measurable, sustainable results as follows:

- **1. Lions Portal Hands-On Training**: held on **August 30, 2025**, this session engaged Lions from multiple 17A clubs in an interactive, practical training on navigating and applying the **Lions Portal** platform to strengthen administrative efficiency and club operations.
- **2.** Leadership Resource Spotlight distributed to all 17A club officers: *Strengthening Leadership with the Club President/First Vice President* a concise, one-page hub featuring master links to essential leadership tools, governance guides, best practices, and FAQs. The resource also includes an **E-book on leadership and governance** to further support club success.
- 3. Club Officer Training Opportunities: club officers (Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Zone Chairs) continue to enhance their leadership skills through the Lions Portal and Learning Path. The Spring 2025 Club Officer Training Video is available on our 17A website, and a dedicated inperson training session is scheduled for May 2026 to equip officers with advanced leadership and management tools.
- **4. Guiding Lions Virtual Training:** scheduled for **January 2026 (date TBD)**, this district-wide virtual training will empower Lions serving as **Guiding Lions**, reinforcing mentorship and supporting clubs in development, retention, and rebuilding efforts.
- 5. New Voices / Women in Lions Symposium: planned for March 7, 2026, this global-minded symposium will highlight the impact of women in leadership and service. It is expected to be one of the largest celebrations of women in Lions, amplifying stories of empowerment, inclusion, and innovation across continents. Stay tuned for registration details!

#### Leadership Development & New Voices - Women in Lions


