Al apps that can work for your club

Fresh from the USA/Canada Forum back in Sep-



tember; Lions Virtual is Lions Helping Lions. The "AI revolution" is a new innovative training program that dives into two significant, but fairly easy to use, powered apps.

These Lion apps are designed specifically to help Lions grow, rebuild, and

promote their community service throughout your respective area—city, state, country, or even globally if we are to reach the 1.5 million member "mark" within the next couple of challenging years.

Here's what you and your marketing/membership Lions need to explore to start being excited about what could go right.

LionsMaps2Grow is an app tool that can be your go to for all things club related. This can be ideas and suggestions for chartering a new and different kind of club or club branch. It can also help to start rebuilding existing clubs by creating marketing outreach plans or crafting some workable marketing strategies to try.

Map2Grow is here now and it just might be your club's solution to grow in membership and service projects specific to your community's needs and wants. It can potentially take you every step of the way.

LionsMarket2Grow is an app that turns your Lions Portal data of service projects into stupendous content with just a few clicks. I've seen it done on recent Zoom meetings and tutorials are on YouTube. This app will be your tool to generate simple or complex press releases about your club or your service projects or community events and it even has access to local media contacts. You will see that it is relatively easy to "make your mark" by doing better to promote club services after it is reported in the portal.

All this potential is achievable by signing up for a free OpenAI ChatGPT. Be sure to enroll in the FREE 4.0 version now available. You can start using it immediately, but there are daily usage limits. If your club has the funds, there is a PRO plan available for a cost, but it has been suggested that any cost be shared with multiple clubs or districts so more can take advantage of the possibilities and stop being afraid of the what could go wrong or seems to be going wrong now.

Membership growth is the key to our continued success in the district, state, and globally. More members means more service to those in need; potentially 1billion people in need. Our District goal is two new clubs this coming fiscal year and a positive member gain of at least 50 members. The #1 duty as a Lion is to always be growing the Association. There's only one thing greater than being a member of Lions Club and that is helping to build one. We will continue to grow through member retention and new member recruiting, but we also need to charter new clubs because we simply are losing clubs faster than we are chartering new ones.
