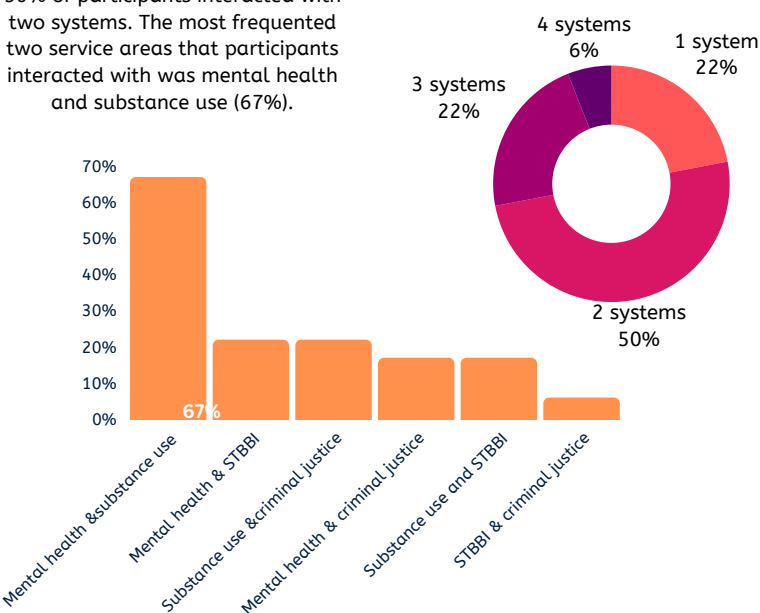

Accessed Service

>> The most accessed service was mental health. 17 out of the 18 participants had interacted with services related to mental health.



50% of participants interacted with two systems. The most frequented two service areas that participants interacted with was mental health and substance use (67%).

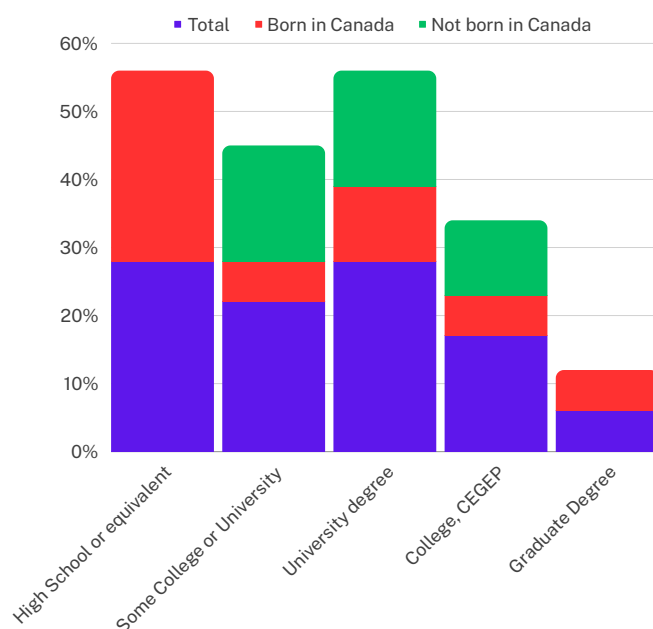
Service system interactions

>> Participants interacted with two or more systems out of the four service areas. The two most service frequented was mental health and substance use.

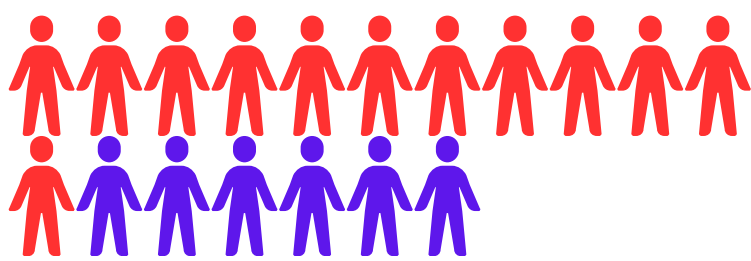

Education

>> 28% had completed university degree, certificate or diploma. 17% of participants in this category were not born in Canada.



12 out of 18 participants were in part-time employment.

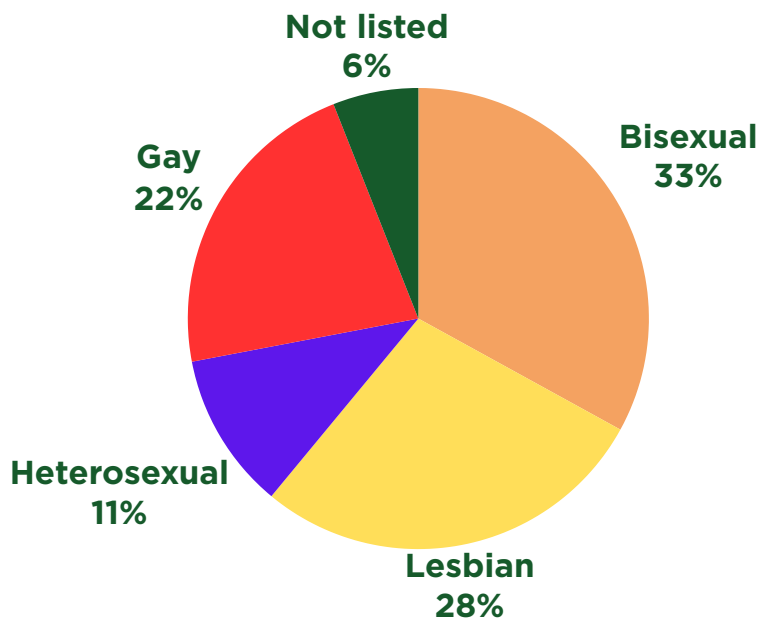
Employment

>> 89% participants had some form of employment. However only 6% were in full-time employment.

Gender and Sexual Orientation

>> 28% of participants expressed their gender identity to be non-binary. Majority of ACBs (22%) born outside Canada identified the most as non-binary.
