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

## LOOKING BACK AT SOUND BEACH

Early Settlers

The North Shore Beach area was facing a great change in the late 1920's. The Daily Mirror developed the largest tract or land for George and Florence D'Utassy of more than a thousand acres, which they divided into North Shore Beach and Sound Beach. The Daily Mirror was interested in enlarging its circulation of its newspapers with the advertisements to its million readers of "the charms of a heavily wooded and high cliff section of the North Shore". They offered  $20 \times 200$  feet parcels of land for \$89.50 with terms for payment, plus a subscription to the newspaper. Most people bought an average of five lots with \$12.50 down and monthly payments.

The first real estate agent for the Mirror was Cyrus Manniello at Rocky Point. A short time later, Warren and Arthur Smadbeck, a New York City real estate firm, took over for the Mirror. They established a young local man, Ed Olson, as their representative. Ed opened his office on Broadway at the southeast corner of Prince Road in Rocky Point. He also had a real estate office on Echo Avenue, near Shinnecock Drive, in Sound Beach. Early residents in both Rocky Pont and Sound Beach pitched tents on their property while building.

There is documentation which indicates there were earlier residents in the Sound Beach area before the Daily Mirror developed the land. Thomas Blythe Scott owned over three hundred and thirty acres from Woodhull Landing to North Country Road. Tom Scott, his wife, Augusta May and son, Thomas B. Scott, Jr. lived there and raised horses on a prosperous farm. His will indicates that he had horses, carriages, wagons, harnesses and machinery on his property. Thomas Blythe Scott died in May of 1920.

The 1870 Beers maps indicate that an "*N. Jones*" owned property just south of the "blinker light" on what is now known as Sound Beach Blvd. Several years ago this name sparked my interest to research this further. Who was N. Jones? When researching deeds and wills the name "Noah Jones" came to light. "Noah" – a special name in the Rocky Point area, with Noah Hallock 1<sup>st</sup> establishing his home in 1721 on Hallock Landing, His son, Noah Hallock 2<sup>nd</sup> also lived in Rocky Point. The third generation to carry that name was the Reverend Noah Hallock.

A visit to the Seaview Cemetery at Mt. Sinai Congregational Church revealed the answer to the mystery. Right next to the Reverend Noah Hallock's family grave is the William L. Jones' family plot. Clearly, the tombstone reads "Hetta Jones, daughter of Rev. Noah and Mehitable Hallock. Wife of William L. Jones. Died on September 21, 1817, age 22."

Immediately next to that stands the Noah Jones family plot.

Evidently, Noah Jones was named after his maternal grandfather the Reverend Noah Hallock. There is also evidence in the Hallock Family Cemetery that the Reverend had a son, whom he named Noah, but that boy died at the early age of seven years old, another reason for the name to be perpetuated in the next generation.

The mystery was becoming a challenge. Although the Hallock Genealogy excludes Hetta from the family tree, there is evidence shown in the Rev. Noah Hallock's will (D-218). "I give to my daughter, Hetta, now the wife of William L. Jones, and in case of her death to her children, the sum of one thousand dollars and securing the payment the woodland which I formerly bought of Jefffreey Woodhull being a part of one of the long lots."

Noah H. Jones was born in 1817. He lived just south of the "blinker light" in Sound Beach. He was the son of Hetta Hallock and William H. Jones, who was a famed ship-builder in Port Jefferson . A street bearing the name "Jones Street" stands as a testimony of what he accomplished for the area. The 1883 Port Jefferson Times stated "Capt. William L. Jones, whose

capital and enterprise did much to develop land built up Port Jefferson. He, at one time, owned the whole of what is now a busy portion of the village in Hotel Square."


Noah H. Jones was 21 years old when he married his 18 year old bride, Adelia Hallock. Eleven months before Noah and Adelia's first child was born, land transactions were recorded, evidently upon their marriage. In consideration of their natural love and affection, William Jones deeded 65 acres to his son, Noah, on January 2, 1838 (Liber 30, pg. 78). There is evidence in the census records showing William Jones living what is known as the Sound Beach area today. On that same day, for the sum of \$1,000 they also transferred "one half of the Homestead Farm and outlands which the Widow Rev. Noah Hallock resides." This indicates that the house could have been older and where the Reverend Noah Hallock once lived. In January of 1874 Noah Jones acquired 40 acres of land which extended to the Wading River Road (Route 25A).

Tragedy struck the family on June 20, 1845 when the young 25 year old wife, Adelia, died just three months after their son, Samuel, was born. She left Noah Jones a widow with a young infant and two daughters, Adriana and Gertrude. Young Samuel grew to be a sailor and in 1874 died at sea at age twenty-nine.

The 1880 State census attests to the agriculture produce on Noah Jones' land in Sound Beach. He was now age 63 and he had tilled 50 acres of land and had 25 acres of orchards. His woodlands consisted of an additional 200 acres. It cost him \$50 to repair his fences that year. His farm was quite an active one as it was valued at \$8,000 which was a considerable amount at that time. Six of his acres produced 300 bushels of Indian Corn, 65 bushels of Oats, 30 bushels of Rye and 60 bushels of wheat were harvested from ten other acres, plus 60 bushels of potatoes. He owned 3 "Milch Cows" and there were 4 calves born that year. He churned 200 lbs of butter and his farm housed over 50 poultry and 4 pigs. He had an apple orchard boasting of 25 trees and he cut 25 cords of wood from the forested portion of his land.

Noah H. Jones died on August 21, 1902 at age 85. His second wife, Sophrania, lived to age ninety-four. The Noah Jones house is no longer standing. It is documented in recorded deeds as early as 1837 as well as Federal and State Census Records. However, the Noah Jones property was evident on old maps and easy to identify as the ancient locust trees give evidence to its location. The 1917 Belcher Hyde map indicates that Charles Steele owned the property which consisted of 277 acres and extended to North Country Road Road. The map indicates there was a two story house, a barn and another small building standing at the time.

The current owner, Florence Gilman Jelliffe, was very gracious to explain that her father, Albert Gilman, purchased the property in 1932 and the current house was built in 1939. Florence explained that the front steps of the house were built from bricks found in the original house foundation. As far as old artifacts, she found a nineteenth century coin when the chimney was built. The two giant locust trees still stand regally in front of the property, where Florence remembers as a child, there stood four locust trees. They mark a time long past, where we may appreciate the early settlers who established the land.



This past January 2004, Sound Beach lost a long-time member of the community. Marge Eastburn was 96 when she passed away. Since June 2000, she lived at the Atria assisted living facility in Setauket. Although it was very hard for her to make the decision to leave Sound Beach, she knew in her heart that she was unable to care for herself and her home the way she had for over 30 years. For those of us who knew Marge, we understood how important it was to her to keep her property on St. James Road looking well manicured as well as herself. Anytime you saw Marge she always looked put together. Her hair meticulously pulled back in her signature bun that she usually adorned with an outfitmatching bow. You could also count on her to frequently speak her mind...even when you did not ask for it! She was a feisty

woman who definitely enjoyed a good debate from time to time. Marge lived at 34 St. James Road since 1969 when her home was built. She and her husband John had planned to live out their retirement years there. Sadly, her husband died just 2 weeks after moving in. So for 30 years she lived alone in her house on the bluff. thoroughly enjoyed her view of the Sound and watched many a sunset from her living room windows. She also took great pride in her hands-on approach to maintaining her property. She was certainly not afraid of a hard days work. She was active in senior citizens and would often get together with friends for card games. Marge was blessed with a long and healthy life. Although she will be missed, it is comforting to know that she is now finally back in the arms of her beloved husband John: the one person she always said loved her like no one else.



Another Video Store -Mr, C's - moved into the Echo Ave. complex and Paperclip Stationery was nearby. Today, with all the empty stores in town, why don't enterprising entrepreneur shopkeepers look at our needs and supply them? Then, we will never have to leave town!




### A Very Short Story by a Young Boy About a Very Important Man


