We cared about each other. We comforted each other. May we continue to do so through the long dark days ahead.

World War II Veteran Honored



Francis J. Harff, a WWII veteran and a sailor on the battleship Missouri who witnessed the signing of the Japanese surrender, was honored by his family with the dedication of a flagpole in his name which now graces the lawn in front of the SBPOA clubhouse on Malba Drive. More than 60 people attended the ceremony on July 14. His family, including his wife, Kathryn,

daughters Robin Redman and Dawn Fehr, son-in law Steve Redman, and granddaughter Bonnie Fehr felt that the most fitting memorial to Harff, who died on New Years Day 2000, would be a flag flying over the grounds of the Clubhouse, because he not only believed in the American flag and patriotism but was also a 'people person' and a great believer in community spirit.
