

I am very pleased to welcome all the new residents to Centennial Station. I am also very pleased to say good riddance to the obstacles COVID 19 put in our way.



# THE BOARD OF VOLUNTEERS



A volunteer can be described as a person who freely offers to take part in an enterprise or undertake a task. The key to this definition is freely. For many of the volunteer Board members, this is a job that takes time from their families, evenings and/or even their weekends. If you have ever served on a community's Board of Directors, you will understand the amount of time and effort that goes into preserving the neighborhood and protecting community property values. A House Speaker once said, "All politics is local." With that said, what could be more local than a democracy practiced within the community you live?

While most residents in a condominium know there is a Board whose task it is to protect the interests of individual unit owners and the broader community, residents may not be aware of how the board works, both individually and in concert with the property management company. Primarily, there are three areas of Board responsibility:

- Overseeing communal property maintenance and repairs – To maintain & enhance property values.
- Overseeing financial practices as community fiduciaries
- Enforcement of community rules and regulations

A Board member's job can be challenging. As a board member, the role can be both rewarding and thankless. Residents rarely show their appreciation of the vital work being done by their volunteer Board. Most unit owners give little thought to the fact that having a working board is a REQUIREMENT to remain a viable condominium association. A condo association cannot legally operate without a Board. If owners do not have volunteers to serve on the board, the community faces two outcomes: The property ceases to be a condominium by a vote of the ownership or a court will appoint an individual to run the property in receivership. Both these outcomes greatly effect each unit owner's present and future property values.

Chances are, as you settle in for your evening, volunteers working as the community Board are attending meetings, reviewing the upcoming budget, looking at additional bids, or reviewing pending architectural change applications.

# THE BUILDING REPS



Acting as the communication center for each of our 12 buildings is the Building Rep. Some have been voted in by building unit owners, others volunteered to take on the responsibility. Their primary function is to facilitate communication. They fill the important role of helping residents stay up-to-date on condo information. The posting of community notices to the building billboard is a reliable source of information for the social events. The billboard is also where you will find information on the workings of your Board of Directors. Your Rep. is who unit owners should turn to for information as to understanding the governing condominium guidelines and bylaws.

The Building Reps have also volunteered to take on the leadership of important social aspects of the building. They greet condo owners upon their move in. They explain options available in living in our community. They help new owners to integrate into the community activities. They organizing building social meet and greets.

Lastly, the Building Rep. maintains our safety, by monitoring the building, identifying maintenance, security and/or safety issue within the building. They then follow up remediation with the management office.

Whether their work is visible or behind the scenes, we recognize it as an important part of the structure that supports our communal social wellbeing.



## ACTIVITY ORGANIZER VOLUNTEERS



Social interaction for seniors is an important part of staying happy and healthy! It is shown that staying active reduces depression and helps delay the onset of dementia. Studies show that seniors who stay socially active and engaged, experience a variety of benefits including better cognitive function.

There is a long list of volunteers working behind the scenes. They work to keep a myriad of activities going.
