


"We Buy Houses" Scams target seniors

For mortgage scammers, deed thieves and property flippers, this is the Golden Age.

You have probably seen a "We Buy Ugly Houses" or "Sell your Home for Cash" sign. Companies like these usually give a price for the home that is far below fair market value. They find and target homeowners who may have had utility notice of shut offs or bank foreclosure notices. For some folks, it is worth it to get rid of their home quickly. But some companies hold high pressure seminars or visit the homeowner unannounced. Then, that scammer strong-arms you into signing over your home to them for a price that isn't fair. To get you to agree to the lower price, the scammer may tell you that the real estate market is weak, tell you that your home is worth less than it actually is, falsely tell you that your home will be lost to foreclosure, or tell you that you would have to engage in major repairs before a realtor would list the property for you.

How to Protect Yourself Against Scams

How can you tell between a scam and a legitimate business opportunity? How can you decrease your odds of being scammed?

- Be wary of uninvited door-to-door salespeople. Not all that come knocking are scammers, but you are often put on the spot for an answer. Tell the person to come back on another day, after you can do some research, talk about it to others, and fully understand their offer.
- Never tell anyone your personal information unless you know they are from a reputable business and the information is necessary to carry out a business transaction that you initiated.
- Do your research! With the internet at your hands, you can look up customer reviews and visit websites such as the Better Business Bureau or Trust Pilot. Ensure the company has a good reputation and that their product or service is legit.
- Talk to loved ones about your decision. See if they have any insight on that particular product or service.

Conclusion

• Seniors are susceptible to foreclosure and home help scams in particular. This is because most seniors have lived in their homes for quite a while and so they have amassed equity. Also, many seniors are on a fixed budget, so they may be equity rich but cash poor. This might lead them to consider how to access their equity or lead them to make a quick decision. And finally, some seniors have declined mental health that detracts from their full understanding of the arrangement or situation.



Tips to Protect Seniors...Don't be Scammed!

U S Postal Service Warns Not To Use Their Blue Mailboxes-The USPS is now warning would-be mailers that the blue boxes might not be the best option. USPS explained that the collection bins have become hot spots for criminals looking to steal identities or checks, especially after the last collection of the day or during Sundays and federal holidays." So what should customers do? The most secure way to send mail is through the local Post Office retail counter. If that is not feasible, the next safest way is to use the inside collection slots that deposit mail directly into the Post Office.

Fake Lottery-Seniors get a call saying they've won millions of dollars and need to pay administrative fees or taxes to receive money.

Grandparent Scam-A <u>call or email to the grandparent</u> posing as law enforcement or medical professionals claiming to represent a family member in distress (overdue rent, payment for car repairs, etc.). They might also pose as the "grandchild" directly asking the grandparent to guess who is calling. Scammers ask for money to be wired to pay for medical bills or legal fees.

Tech Support Scam-Scammers claiming to be from legitimate companies demand payment for unnecessary tech support services, or to fix a problem that doesn't exist. Sometimes scammers will create fake websites with a number to call to receive support.

Email/Phishing-A senior receives email messages that appear to be from a legitimate company or institution, asking them to "update" or "verify" their personal information. Scammers also use LinkedIn and other social media networks like Facebook to gather information. They can then use the victim's connections to trick the victim into thinking their contact is messaging them.

Crime Scam-A senior gets a scary phone call saying their name or social security number was used in a crime such as a stolen car or illegal drug purchase.

Social Security Scam-Scammers pretend they represent Social Security Administration (SSA) and need money to adjust a senior's Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA).

IRS Scam-A senior receives a phone call or voice message claiming to be the IRS. The scammer will say that the senior owes taxes and could be sent to jail if they don't receive payment right away.

Medicare Impersonator-Scammers try to steal personal information and identity by calling and asking for information in order to issue the senior a new Medicare card or offer you discounted additional coverage.

False Investment Opportunities-An unsolicited call or email from a financial advisor offering a once-in-a-lifetime investment opportunity. If it's too good to be true, it probably is.



Tips to Prevent a Scam

Refund Scam-Scammers will claim that the senior has been given too much money due to an accounting mistake, and demand the money back.

Don't act quickly-Scams are based on fear and urgency. Always take a little extra time to think it through and evaluate the legitimacy of what you are being asked to do.

Avoid odd payment types-Scammers will often ask you to send them money with a wire transfer, money order, cryptocurrency, payment app, or gift card. Legitimate businesses will accept credit cards. Be suspicious of excuses for alternative forms of payment.

Notice threatening behavior-Often scams are presented as urgent situations requiring immediate action. If you receive threats or hostility for asking questions that's a sign they are a scammer.

Be suspicious of fake caller IDs-Using computer software, scammers can make phone calls and emails that look like they're coming from legitimate companies, government organizations, or your local area code. Often it is best to ignore people that contact you uninitiated. At the very least avoid sharing private information. Looking up the organization's contact information and contacting them yourself is a safer option.

Be cautious of impersonation-Con artists can sometimes pretend to be the government. Before making investments or online payments, be sure that you have confirmed that the organization is a legitimate business by asking for information about the company and checking that they are registered with the <u>Better Business Bureau</u>.

Do not reveal personal information-Con artists can try to get you to provide them with personal information like your Social Security number, account numbers, passwords, credit cards, or other identifying information which can be sold to fraudsters.

Avoid suspicious links-Don't click on links in unsolicited emails, texts, or social media messages.

Ask a friend or family member-Before giving out your credit card number or money, ask a friend or family member if the request or situation seems suspicious—particularly if you've been told by someone you don't know that the person needs help.

Add extra security to your accounts-Many online accounts let you turn on multifactor authentication. You may then need to enter a code that's sent to your phone or email, or that you generate with an app, before accessing your account. Enabling this extra security measure can keep scammers out of your accounts even if they get hold of your username and password.

Call the Hotline-If you feel that you or someone you know may be a victim of elder abuse, there's no need to be ashamed - it can happen to anyone. The faster you report the crime, the better chance you have of minimizing the consequences. Call this 24-hour, toll free, elder abuse hotline at the <u>Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs</u> at (800) 922-2275.

To arm the security portion of your system, before leaving your unit, please make sure all doors and windows are shut. Then enter your 4-digit code (press 2 with Honeywell system). The system will arm and status light change from green to red. When you return home, after entering, please go to your keypad, enter your 4-digit code quickly and (Press 1 for Honeywell system) and the system will disarm and status light will turn green.

Honeywell Keypad: Can use Comcast or Verizon phone line.



If your keypad in your unit looks like this: If panel is beeping showing a trouble or alarm for your smoke detector, please press and hold 1 to silence. Enter your code and two more times to reset the keypad (three times total) Note there must be no alarm or trouble present (example, if there is a power outage your system will be in trouble until the power comes back on. You must wait until the power comes back on to reset the keypad and clear the trouble)

Napco Magnum Alert Keypad: Can use Comcast or Verizon phone line.



If your keypad in your unit looks like this: If panel is beeping showing a trouble or alarm for your smoke detector, please press and hold 9 for 3 seconds to clear the <u>alarm/trouble</u>. Note there must be no alarm or trouble present (example, if there is a power outage your system will be in trouble until the power comes back on. You must wait until the power comes back on to reset the keypad and clear the trouble) If you are still experiencing issues, a combination of your 4-digit code, followed by pressing and holding the 9 will also silence the system.

Moose Z-900 Keypad: Must have Verizon Phone. If using comcast- \$375 system upgrade.



If your keypad in your unit looks like this: If panel is beeping showing a trouble or alarm for your smoke detector, please press the *key located under the 7 to silence the keypad, followed by holding the 7 key for 3 seconds. Note there must be no alarm or trouble present (example, if there is a power outage your system will be in trouble until the power comes back on. You must wait until the power comes back on to reset the keypad and clear the trouble)

The first author is Wilber Smith. Born is Northern Rhodesia (now Zambia) all his books take place in either Africa or touch on it. One of his series, is about ancient Egypt; the glamour and subterfuge of the royal family and their staff and their fight to stay in power (and stay alive). One of the books travels up the Nile to find out why its flow has decreased. He also has 2 series about the Ballentyne and Courtney families through over at least a century. They have gone through the creation of modern Africa, man's hunger for diamonds, and been in wars there and in India. Some of it is a little brutal; but that is history. He has also written standalone books.

Clive Cussler is an American adventure novelist and underwater explorer. His stories take place all over and through many decades. One of his main characters is Dirk Pitt, a director of a government underwater and marine agency (NUMA). Besides being ordered, he gets himself into dangerous and sometimes death-defying situations. Many stories begin centuries in the past with hidden or lost treasures. Then we are brought up-to-date by scientists falling into sinkholes or a foreign entity doing cloak-and-dagger activities or a possible catastrophe. Somewhere in the books Cussler very briefly inserts himself into the story. It is all fun and not so heavy as the Wilbur Smith novels.

Come have some adventure.

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
Why do I need a Power of Attorney?

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Getting Long-Term Care Planning Right: Smart Approaches for People at All Stages

PROBLEM: When it comes to planning a safe and secure retirement, long-term care (LTC) remains a confusing and unaddressed challenge to many people's financial security.

Why are people not planning for this critical issue?

- √ Seems remote, far off
- False sense of security
- Don't want to think about it
- √ Think Medicare/Medicaid will pay for it
- Don't expect to need long-term care
- My family will take care of me
- It's too expensive
- √ I'll just pay for it out of pocket
- √ Questionable value

KEY #1:

Long-term care is MORE than just the popular image of an elderly person sitting alone in a nursing

- ✓ Long-Term Care definition: A variety of services designed to meet a person's health and/or personal care needs so that they can live as independently and safely as possible when they can no longer perform everyday activities on their own.
- Activities of Daily Living (ADLs): Bathing, dressing, eating, transferring, toileting, and incontinence
- √ Who will need LTC? As of 2021, someone turning 65 has an almost 70% chance of needing long-term care support. going forward.
- Five LTC settings: Nursing home, at-home, community-based care, independent living, assisted living
- ✓ Cost of LTC per year: National median for one person: \$51,600 to \$105,852

KEY #2:

Relying on Medicare or Medicaid is NOT a plan most people want to rely on for long-term care — and many aren't eligible, anyway.

- Medicare does not pay for LTC, only limited short-term care and skilled nursing.
- Medicaid only pays for LTC for very low-income patients.
- In most states, applicants must only have \$2,000 or less of assets and very limited income.
- ✓ Even if you use up your assets, there's a 5-year lookback period you must pass before being eligible; additionally, being eligible still doesn't guarantee LTC. There are bed shortages and waiting lists.

KEY #3:

Given historic problems with long-term care insurance, it's understandable people have avoided making a plan.

- Problems with original LTC insurance ultimately led to skyrocketing premiums, refusal to pay for care, policy cancellations, litigation, and insurance companies getting out of LTC business.
- Regulators since 1993 have enacted a wide range of consumer protections that addressed most of the problems of original LTC insurance, though legacy policies are still causing problems.

KEY #4:

New approaches to planning for long-term care address people's skepticism and provide a wide range of flexible options for people at all stages of financial planning and health.

- Improved traditional LTC insurance
- Hybrid products with LTC benefits such as life insurance or an annuity
- Other strategies to cover LTC costs: Reverse mortgage/home equity line of credit (HELOC); existing life insurance with accelerated benefits; pre-tax savings (traditional IRA or Roth IRA) Health Savings Account (HSA)
- √ You can receive care in your home. Having a plan is important. It doesn't mean it necessarily has to cover ALL. possible costs
- 3 questions to keep in mind: 1) Who will provide care? 2) Where do you want the care? 3) How will you pay for care?
