

COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE

Representatives from each condo building met in the ballroom to discuss the imperative of establishing building-specific committees. These committees would be tasked with proposing and implementing essential procedures to address emergency situations within their respective buildings. A subsequent meeting will be slated to consolidate the diverse ideas into a comprehensive set of "Best Practices." These guidelines will then undergo a thorough review by the fire marshal and emergency responders to ensure their efficacy and alignment with established protocols.





On April 17, 2024, residents met in the ballroom to learn the outcome of the election held to fill two open board positions. Over the preceding three weeks, residents had the opportunity to cast their votes for the candidates: Frank Faber, Cynthia Kennedy, and Stephen Spadafora. An independent certified public accountant oversaw the ballot counting process, ultimately determining that Frank Faber and Stephen Spadafora had secured the two-year term positions on the board.

Collective Vigilance: The Key to Effective Condo Rules & Regulations

In any condominium community, rules and regulations serve as the foundation for harmonious living. However, these rules are only as effective as their enforcement. While property managers and board members play crucial roles, the true strength of rule compliance lies in the hands of every resident.

Each condo owner and tenant must recognize their responsibility as the "eyes and ears" of the community. This collective vigilance ensures that rules are followed consistently, creating a safer, more pleasant environment for all.

It's important to note that being vigilant doesn't mean becoming confrontational or intrusive. The goal is to maintain a respectful, cooperative atmosphere while ensuring rules are followed.

How to Be an Effective Community Guardian:

- Familiarize yourself with all condo rules and regulations (Obtain and read new rules & regulations pamphlet, which is available in the office)
- Observe and report violations promptly to management office
- Document issues with photos or videos when appropriate
- Approach rule-breakers politely if you feel comfortable doing so
- · Attend community meetings to stay informed and voice concerns

By working together, residents can create a self-regulating community where rules are respected and enforced consistently. This approach not only protects property values but also enhances the quality of life for everyone in the condominium complex.

Remember, a thriving condo community is a collective effort. Your awareness and involvement make a difference.

UNIT INSURANCE MINIMUM COVERAGE RAISED TO \$50,000

The Board held a meeting on August 6 and 7 to review the Association's insurance renewal for the period 8/12/2024 to 8/12/2025. Brian Friel from Brown & Brown presented the changes affecting residents and answered questions. Key points include:

- 1. Insurance costs will increase, impacting next year's HOA fees.
- 2. Unit owners must increase their minimum unit coverage from \$25,000 to \$50,000.



CONDO TALK TOPICS - FLOOD STOP

Water heaters are a common household appliance that often goes unnoticed until a problem arises. As they age, water heaters can develop leaks due to corrosion, posing a risk of flooding and significant damage to homes. The FloodStop device provides a solution by automatically shutting off the water supply to the heater and sounding an alarm upon detecting a leak through its sensors. This swift response helps prevent further damage, allowing other household fixtures and appliances to remain operational.

The FloodStop unit operates on either battery power (4 AA batteries) or electricity with a battery backup for situations of power loss. It emits a beeping noise to indicate low or missing batteries. While FloodStop doesn't prevent leaks, it effectively minimizes overall damage by preventing the heater from refilling when properly installed and maintained (with annual battery changes).

It is crucial to have a licensed plumber install the device, and the unit comes with a 1-year Manufacturer's Warranty. For more in-depth information, including videos, visit www.getfloodstop.com.

The establishment provides takeout options, is wheelchair accessible, serves alcohol, takes reservations, and offers table service. With its inviting Pleasant Pub atmosphere and reasonable prices, it caters to a broad spectrum of tastes—from those craving snacks or pizza to those in the mood for a full-fledged dinner. The staff is efficient and exceptionally accommodating, ensuring ample portions with each serving. Additionally, individual checks are available upon request for larger groups.

If you're in search of a place for breakfast, brunch, or lunch, consider giving Turning Point in Warrington a try. Although I hadn't visited before, I was on the lookout for a local spot to grab a quick meal with out-of-town visitors before their trip to the airport. A Google search led me to Turning Point, a franchise with multiple locations in the area, including Dresher, Newtown, and Blue Bell.

The restaurant offers a spacious setting with a mix of booths and tables. It's advisable to call ahead, especially on weekends and holidays, as they don't take reservations. The menu is diverse, featuring options from omelets and waffles to paninis and club sandwiches. Whether you're into "healthy" choices like vegan dishes or indulgent treats like the Strawberry Cheesecake French Toast, there's something for everyone, ensuring no one leaves hungry. The beverage selection is noteworthy, with standouts like the "Heavenly Hot Chocolate" (available in four varieties) and the French Press Coffee (offering six varieties in light, medium, and dark roast). I enjoyed the Grande Huevo Rancheros and found the Lemon Blueberry pancakes, especially with the power grain substitution, to be a winning choice. I look forward to returning to explore more options on the menu.
