

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



Letter from the President of the Board:

It is my pleasure to welcome all the new residents to Centennial Station.

We have hopefully seen the end of winter by now. We got away with a minimal amount of snow and ice. We look forward to seeing the green come back and flowers pop up.

Your Executive Board Members continue to work hard at proactively taking care of this wonderful community.

Bud Johnstin, your Vice President; Marty Rosenzweig, your Treasurer; Frank Faber, your Secretary; Eileen Darcy, Member at Large, and I studied one of the hardest problems, we face here at Centennial. That problem is safety of both our residents and their property.

We had several autos being broken into and catalytic converter's being stolen. After conversations with the police force, we decided that we needed an overhaul of the 30+ years outside, lighting systems. We started a replacement program by building 11's driveway, the front of buildings, 9 and 8, the building 5's trash area and parking lot. We started building 4 and part of building 2. This was phase 1 and we reviewed the rest of the community and the lighting will be addressed shortly. We will continue changing out the lighting fixtures as quickly as possible considering the supply chain availability.

The safety of our residents is an everyday essential. We need your cooperation in keeping everybody safe. To accomplish this do not give your key, your building code, or hold open doors for non-residents. We're talking about delivery persons, solicitors, or any other non-familiar person that you might encounter.

Every year we make mention of the need to follow the rules and regulations and by-laws of Centennial Station. At the time of your closing, you were provided with these rules and regulations. These are part of condominium life.

Please understand that it's not a choice of which rules and regulations each person wants to follow. Everybody must follow all the rules and regulations. If you find that these do not meet your individual requirements, then notify Michelle Burke in the management office and she can discuss this with you and if necessary, with the board. Please remember don't make contrary decisions on your own.



On arriving in Philadelphia, Hilde used her skill as a seamstress to find work in the sweatshops in and around the Market Street garment district.

Hilde became an expert seamstress and tailor. The pictures below, are testaments to her skills ranging from made to order creations of blouses, women suits to wedding dresses. Hilde's creative artistry is also seen in the beautiful needlepoints that decorate her condo. She continues to do tailoring for her friends at Centennial and 5 Ponds.



In Addition, Hilde loves growing flowers and plants. She takes care of the plants that brighten up our indoor pool area. You will often see Hilde doing laps in our pool in the morning. She is a lovely Lady with so many talents.


Klaus has delighted and enchanted many of his family and neighbors who have come to marvel at the miniature world ensconced in his basement wonderland.















Many of the books that we have in the library are about mysteries, murder and/or mayhem. This is a genre that I have always enjoyed. We have a large collection for several authors e.g., James Patterson, Danielle Steele, Jonathan and Faye Kellerman and Janet Evanovich. These are just a few of the writers who seem to specialize in these types of stories. James Patterson frequently partners with other authors, and they each have their own series of characters and situations. The Kellermans sometimes write together, but more often they have their own series with a continuing set of main characters. Jonathan's is a psychologist named Dr. Delaware who, of course, consults with the police. Faye Kellerman, his wife, has a police detective who is married to an orthodox Jewish woman and has converted. It makes for an interesting combination. There really isn't any religion in the stories; it's just for background. The main focus of the stories is on the crime; be it kidnapping, theft, or murder. Janet Evanovich's star character is a female bounty hunter whose assistant is a former prostitute with a big personality. A lot of funny situations occur during her investigations. Danielle Steele has a combination of mystery and romance. For those who like some gore and technical medical descriptions, Patricia Cornwell and Kathy Reichs have main characters who are medical examiners. Reichs' books were the idea for the old TV show Bones.

These are just a few of the authors in our library. There are many more to choose from. Come discover them.
















THEATER NIGHTS AT THE STATION





Technically, no. Practically speaking, why wouldn't you prepare one? A Will is a document that determines how your estate is distributed after your death. Most people will leave everything to a surviving spouse and/or to children but there are other factors to consider. Many people assume that their surviving spouse will inherit everything, but this is not necessarily the case. There is also a misconception that if you do not have a Will, the "State" takes everything. Again, this is not the case. Most states, including Pennsylvania have provisions for how an estate is distributed if someone dies without a Will. Also, if you are a part of a blended family and there are children not of that marriage, the distribution of the assets will be different. Also, you may designate beneficiaries with IRA's or other investment accounts which will pass "outside" of the Will and will supersede the language in the Will.

By preparing a Will you are able to appoint the Personal Representative of your Estate (the Executor or Executrix) who will be the person who handles your affairs after you have passed away. Without you specifically making this appointment, things can get a bit complicated (and messy) since it now may become a race to the Courthouse or a dispute among family members, all of whom will claim to have a greater right to handle your estate. Not having your wishes down on paper may also preclude gifts to grandchildren, donations to charity or even specific bequests such as family heirlooms or jewelry to that favorite niece or nephew (not to mention, who gets the dog?). There are some people out there who clearly can get by without drafting a Will. This may work very well in a fairly uncomplicated family situation, but it seems like a better idea to take a little bit of time to make sure your thoughts are put down on paper and to avoid potential problems.





KEY #1:

KEY #3:

Given historic problems with long-term care insurance, it's understandable people have avoided making a plan.

- Problems with original LTC insurance ultimately led to skyrocketing premiums, refusal to pay for care, policy cancellations, litigation, and insurance companies getting out of LTC business.
- Regulators since 1993 have enacted a wide range of consumer protections that addressed most of the problems of original LTC insurance, though legacy policies are still causing problems.

KEY #4:

New approaches to planning for long-term care address people's skepticism and provide a wide range of flexible options for people at all stages of financial planning and health.

- Improved traditional LTC insurance
- Hybrid products with LTC benefits such as life insurance or an annuity
