Condo Fees: Then vs. Now—Amenities and fee changed over time?

When Centennial Station first opened, condo fees, though small, supported a much simpler lifestyle. At the time, the only recreational amenities were an activity room and a hot tub.

Today, our condo fees support a vibrant and active community—one that many residents consider well worth the monthly fee. Residents now enjoy a wide range of amenities, including:

HISTORY OF US

The Buyer's Capital Contribution

Originally, new unit buyers paid a one-time capital contribution of \$400—equivalent to about \$842 today's adjusted dollars. In contrast, today's capital contribution is calculated as nine months of the unit's current monthly fee. That means:

• Studio: $$361 \times 9 = $3,249$

• 1 Bedroom: $$452 \times 9 = $4,068$

• 2 Bedroom: $$499 \times 9 = $4,491$

• Penthouse: $$546 \times 9 = $4,914$

Although this represents a significant increase, these additional funds have not slowed unit sales. More importantly, they provide essential additional resources to preserve and enhance the infrastructure of our community—helping Centennial Station remain a well-maintained and desirable place to live.

Although there has been significant turnover in ownership over the past 30 years, nearly 10% of our current residents remain original owners.

Those originals were among the early settlers who watched Centennial Station grow—building by building, event by event—into the vibrant community it is today.

THE CENTENNIAL LIBRARY IS OPEN FOR MYSTERY LOVERS



This issue, we will review works by Robert B. Parker. As with many great authors, their characters live on after their originator has gone. He was a very prolific mystery/crime writer with well over 50 novels. His character Spenser, a private detective, has a series of 40 novels. These read like the old gangster character/detective stories with short, catchy dialogue. Spenser was so popular that ABC television network created the series called *Spenser for Hire* from 1985 to 1988. Another one of Parker's characters also had a TV run: Jesse Stone, a police chief in Paradise, Massachusetts. Though he struggles with alcohol and a difficult relationship with an ex-wife, he's respected in the police department and (of course) amazing at solving intriguing cases. Since Parker's death, there have been 12 more Jesse Stone novels, written, in turn, by Michael Brandman, Reed Farrel Coleman, and Mike Lupica. These authors have been true to the character. If you have ever seen Jesse Stone on TV, in your mind, you can see and hear **Tom Selleck** as you read the books. There is also a short series of six books on Sunny Randall, a female private detective based in Boston.

Although some of Parker's characters have been picked up by other writers, you will find them on our library shelves under Parker. The titles are prefaced by "Robert B. Parker's" and then the actual title.

One more library thing. Thank you to the people who thoughtfully put the jigsaw puzzle pieces in bags before donating them. It keeps the pieces from falling out. If you cannot do that, try securing the top and bottom of the box with tape (if possible). Thanks for your generosity.

With proper care, a disposal lasts 10–12 years. Quality, usage, and what you put in it make all the difference.

- X Large bones, fruit pits, fibrous veggies (celery, corn husks)
- X Starchy foods (pasta, rice, potato peels they expand)
- X Non-food items (plastic, metal, paper towels)
- X Harsh chemical cleaners (damage disposal & plumbing)


DO's (Keep It Running Smoothly)

- Run **cold water** while grinding (keeps grease from coating parts)
- Use regularly (prevents rust/corrosion)
- Grind **small amounts** at a time (avoids jams)
- Cut large scraps into smaller pieces (reduces strain)
- Clean regularly:
 - o **Baking Soda & Vinegar:** ½ cup baking soda + 1 cup vinegar, fizz 5−10 min, flush with hot water
 - Ice & Rock Salt: 1 cup ice + ½ cup rock salt, grind with cold water to scrape buildup
- Run for a few seconds after grinding to flush particles



PROBLEM: When it comes to planning a safe and secure retirement, long-term care (LTC) remains a confusing and unaddressed challenge to many people's financial security.

Why are people not planning for this critical issue?

- √ Seems remote, far off
- False sense of security

KEY #1:

Long-term care is MORE than just the popular image of an elderly person sitting alone in a nursing

- ✓ Long-Term Care definition: A variety of services designed to meet a person's health and/or personal care needs so that they can live as independently and safely as possible when they can no longer perform everyday activities on their own.
- Activities of Daily Living (ADLs): Bathing, dressing, eating, transferring, toileting, and incontinence
- √ Who will need LTC? As of 2021, someone turning 65 has an almost 70% chance of needing long-term care support. going forward.
- Five LTC settings: Nursing home, at-home, community-based care, independent living, assisted living
- ✓ Cost of LTC per year: National median for one person: \$51,600 to \$105,852

KEY #2:

Relying on Medicare or Medicaid is NOT a plan most people want to rely on for long-term care — and many aren't eligible, anyway.

- Medicare does not pay for LTC, only limited short-term care and skilled nursing.
- Medicaid only pays for LTC for very low-income patients.
- In most states, applicants must only have \$2,000 or less of assets and very limited income.
- Even if you use up your assets, there's a 5-year lookback period you must pass before being eligible; additionally, being eligible still doesn't guarantee LTC. There are bed shortages and waiting lists.

KEY #3:

Given historic problems with long-term care insurance, it's understandable people have avoided making a plan.

- Problems with original LTC insurance ultimately led to skyrocketing premiums, refusal to pay for care, policy cancellations, litigation, and insurance companies getting out of LTC business.
- Regulators since 1993 have enacted a wide range of consumer protections that addressed most of the problems of original LTC insurance, though legacy policies are still causing problems.

KEY #4:

New approaches to planning for long-term care address people's skepticism and provide a wide range of flexible options for people at all stages of financial planning and health.

- Improved traditional LTC insurance
- Hybrid products with LTC benefits such as life insurance or an annuity
- Other strategies to cover LTC costs: Reverse mortgage/home equity line of credit (HELOC); existing life insurance with accelerated benefits; pre-tax savings (traditional IRA or Roth IRA) Health Savings Account (HSA)
- √ You can receive care in your home. Having a plan is important. It doesn't mean it necessarily has to cover ALL. possible costs
