**Parking Protocols** 

Have you ever pulled into a parking space (at a building that you do not live in) and had someone approach you and say "You can't park here"? Have you ever observed a vehicle in a handicap space with neither a "hang tag" or handicap license plate? Well, in case you're unsure of our guidelines, here is a brief recap of some of the parking rules:

Handicap Parking-All vehicles using a Handicap Space must have a valid/current "hang tag" displayed in the front windshield OR a current handicap license plate.

There are no assigned spaces. (You may park at **any** building in a valid space) If you are away for an extended period of time, park away from the immediate front of the building. Do not back into spaces. Make sure that your vehicle has a current inspection sticker and is in operable condition. If you have more than one vehicle, only one is permitted to be parked adjacent to the front of the building. Service work, major repair work and car washing is not allowed anywhere unless it is emergency work such as a flat tire or battery jump. (Additional rules can be found in Vehicle Parking Rules, August 6 2024, Centennial Station Rules & Regulations)

If you observe a violation, take a cell phone photo of the license plate and please report it to the office and provide as much information as possible so that there can be follow up.

# **COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE**

#### GENERAL MEETING TO REVIEW THE PROPOSED BUDGET



On Thursday, October 10, 2024, the Centennial Governing Board called a general meeting to review the proposed budget for 2025. Marty Rosenzweig, the Treasurer, led the discussion and addressed residents' questions. It was announced that HOA payments for 2025 would increase by 11% compared to the 2024 rates. This raise was attributed to several factors, primarily inflation, a significant increase in insurance premiums from the condominium carrier, and a proposed installation of a new cellular/IP system by Oliver Fire Protection and Security in each unit. This Oliver upgrade aims to enhance security reliability and ensure 100% monitoring of smoke detectors and security devices in all condominium units. The additional monitoring cost, estimated at \$12.00 per month, is included in the 11% HOA increase. For many residents, the new installation may allow for the elimination of landlines, potentially saving \$20 to \$30 per month, which could significantly offset the total HOA increase.

# 4 unforgettable ways to experience castles in Bucks County

Explore the architecture as you learn the history, sip some wine and even take home a souvenir!



Built between 1908-1912, Fonthill Castle was the home of Henry Chapman Mercer (1856-1930). Archaeologist, anthropologist, ceramicist, scholar and antiquarian, Mercer built Fonthill Castle both as his home and as a showplace for his collection of tiles and prints. The first of three Mercer buildings in Doylestown, Fonthill Castle served as a showplace for Mercer's famed Moravian tiles that were produced during the American Arts & Crafts Movement. Designed by Mercer, the building is an eclectic mix of Medieval, Gothic, and Byzantine architectural styles, and is significant as an early example of poured reinforced concrete.

Sand Castle Winery, nestled on the banks of the Delaware River in Bucks County is the purveyor of fine wines of a long and noble heritage. Its founders, the brothers Joseph and Paul Maxian, were born and raised in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, a region renowned for viticulture even before Celtic tribes roamed its hillsides or the Romans began to rule the world. The Maxians claimed their birthright, a centuries old wine making art – and are proud to introduce in America superior quality, classic wines descended from the finest European wine making traditions. Today, Sand Castle wines are made in much the same way as that of their predecessors in the Old World. The vinifera grapes and the noble vines of Europe are all grown directly on the estate and cared for just as they were thousands of years ago. Once pressed, the wine is aged and bottled on premises. The result? While this painstaking attention to quality limits the winery's production, the wines are unlike any others you have tasted.





**Glencairn** is a castle-like mansion in <u>Bryn Athyn, Pennsylvania</u>, that was home to the Pitcairn family for more than 40 years. The history of world religions comes to life through this museum's extensive collection of art and artifacts from different cultures and time periods. Glencairn was once the home of Raymond and Mildred Pitcairn. It was built between 1928 and 1939. Glencairn became a museum after the death of

*TileWorks* is a working History Museum and Contemporary Pottery. Originally built by Henry Mercer, the leading artistic tile maker in the American Arts and Crafts Movement. Book a tour to see the tiles being made using Mercer's historic methods. Visit the eclectic gift shop where tiles are available for gifts, souvenirs, and installations. **The Moravian Pottery & Tile Works** (MPTW) is a history museum which is located in <a href="Doylestown">Doylestown</a>, <a href="Pennsylvania">Pennsylvania</a>. It is owned by the <a href="County of Bucks">County of Bucks</a>, and operated by TileWorks of Bucks County, a 501c3 non-profit organization.

The museum was individually listed on the <u>National Register of Historic</u> <u>Places</u> in 1972, and was later included in a <u>National Historic Landmark</u> <u>District</u> along with the <u>Mercer Museum</u> and <u>Fonthill</u>. These three structures are the only cast-in-place <u>concrete</u> structures built by Mercer. [2]



## HISTORY OF US

#### PART 1- THE CONSTRUCTION

Tennet High School first opened its doors in 1955; however, structural issues plagued the building, leading to its demolition in 1973. A year later, in 1974, a new facility was constructed across the street, where the school still stands today. Despite hopes for longevity, history repeated itself when the new structure also faced significant structural problems, necessitating an extensive reconstruction in 2011.





The demolition of the original Tennet High School in 1973 left behind a sprawling 16-acre lot—an open space filled with both potential and challenges. The township faced a crucial decision: while the vacant land could serve as a valuable asset to expand the tax base, conventional residential development risked overwhelming the new school with an influx of students. Additionally, the property's institutional zoning—dating back to the school's original construction in 1955—prohibited commercial ventures.

Various proposals were considered, including a nursing home, but it was Schaefer Co. Builders who offered a solution that addressed the township's concerns. They proposed a novel concept for Pennsylvania in 1988: a 55+ planned community featuring 400 housing units. This innovative idea, inspired by similar developments that began in Florida in the 1960s, would generate tax revenue without increasing the number of school-aged residents.



On November 30, 1988, Schaefer Co. Builders purchased the 16-acre lot for \$3,115,000. Construction of the senior living community began in 1990, starting with Building 12, which was notably constructed on the foundation of the old school. Several remnants of the original school remain today in building 12 and can be identified wherever you see red brickwork. The Faber office, was repurposed from the girls' locker room. The old school boiler room,

(now lying beneath the restaurant), the activity hallway, exercise room, card room, library, billiard room, and management office, were all built on the original school's concrete slab, while the walls and roof were newly constructed.



Over the years, the development steadily expanded. Building 12 and 7 were completed in 1991, with early residents often occupying units in 7 while awaiting the completion of their preferred buildings. Construction continued with Building 10 in 1993, Building 4 in 1994, and Building 3 in 1995. Buildings 5 and 9 were added in 1996, followed by Buildings 6, 8, and 1 in 1998. Finally, building 2 was completed in 2000. Unfortunately, building 2 later suffered a fire, rendering it uninhabitable for nearly a year due to water damage. The community pool, a significant amenity, was built in 1995, with a protective dome added in 1997.





During construction, various changes took shape, effecting the final design of the buildings. Building 7, for example, features decorative pediments around its windows—an architectural detail deemed too costly for the rest of the development. In a surprising twist, an original owner in Building 5 didn't realize his unit included a full basement until after moving in. Could this oversight have played a role in the decision to incorporate full basements condos in Buildings 9, and 11?


Ever wondered why Building 8 has so many parking spaces? It turns out the structure was initially designed as a four-story building but was scaled down to three. The reason? A couple purchasing a penthouse in Building 9 wanted to preserve their unobstructed view.

Throughout the construction process, Schaefer Co. Builders offered residents a unique opportunity to personalize their own units, resulting in an architectural landscape where no two residences in Centennial are exactly alike. Residents could tweak anything in their condo BUT the kitchen or bathrooms because of the location of the pipes! Bedrooms and closet size and locations were redesigned, entry doors repositioned, and rooms expanded or downsized to suit individual preferences.

Despite the project's promising trajectory, Schaefer Co. Builders ultimately faced financial difficulties and declared bankruptcy before completing the final phase of development. The last 20 units, located in Building 11, were finished after the company's closure, marking the completion of the ambitious project.



## THE CENTENNIAL LIBRARY IS OPEN FOR MYSTERY LOVERS



Trent. I discovered that this character's creator, Karin Slaughter, is one of the authors on our library shelves. The show is about dyslexic special agent Will Trent and his partner Faith Mitchell. Still having memories of spending many years in the foster system, Will has a few hang-ups. Being from Georgia it is natural that many of Ms. Slaughter's books take place there. She has written two series with continuing characters (Will Trent: 15 books, Grant County: 6 books) and other stand-alone novels (approximately 10). We do not have all of these books, but we do have several. Along with the Will Trent stories another of her books 'Pieces of Her', was adapted as a short series on Netflix.

Some of her books have been printed in more than 20 languages and she has been nominated for more than 25 awards in and outside the U.S.

#### **KEY #1:**
