





SECTOR SEVEN ZONE

As an expansion of its parent company, Pro Moto Billet, Sector Seven was born out of the same reason—to build parts lacking in that industry. So, we suppose, even when you're talking business, "with age comes a cage," and these UTV parts are about 30 to 50 percent of the sales these days. Whether their customers were corning from the dirt bike world as existing customers or brand-new ones, the quality of craftsmanship and made-in-the-USA philosophy are helping build up the brand.

As for Sector Seven parts, this Pro R has them all starting with those new mirrors. Called Prizm, the new lighted LED mirror also doubles as turn signals, as well as daytime running lights and accent lighting. All colors and rhythms can be controlled by a switch in the dash or a smartphone app. The lighting has separate controls for the long beam facing forward and the flood lights that shoot to the side. Behind that light, the convex mirror lens is independently

adjustable, so once you get your lighting aimed where it should be, you can move the mirror where you need it. Most lighted mirrors on the market are not independently adjustable like this one. By the time you read this, pricing for the new Prizm mirror will be up here: www.sectorseven.zone.

Glance in those mirrors and you will spot the Sector Seven quick-release fire-extinguisher mount at \$271.35. It holds any 3-inch fire extinguisher or other items for quick deployment on the trail, at camp or in the shop. This is the quickest-working fire-extinguisher mount we've ever used. Using one hand, you can remove and replace it in under 3 seconds.

Another unique mount that the guys came up with is their universal accessory mount (\$117.95), which can be used for all kinds of items, such as cube lights or in this case Buggy Whip lighted whips. This mount can stretch for use on any size tubing, and the mounting plate will rotate independently for proper placement of any accessory.

Finally, vision at the rear of the car was improved using Sector Seven's latest product. The backup camera relocation bracket repositions the stock camera at a better angle and removes the black arch that used to show up in the top of the Ride Command screen. We love the fact that Polaris outfits some of their machines with a backup camera, and this \$59.95 product makes it even better.

MORE MADE IN THE USA

If the Sector Seven accessories weren't enough, the eye-popping color scheme of this build really helps it stand out. The cage and stock suspension arms were all powder-coated in a Diablo Candy Red Prizmatic Powder installed by Coatings Plus in Boise, Idaho. The stock wheels and shock springs were powdercoated white to match the wrap. That white wrap covers up a nice set of full doors from TMW, who also fabricated the cage and front winch bumper. Behind that bumper you will find a Warn 5500 winch equipped with a Factor 55 flat link. Finally, the cold Idaho wind was stopped by a clear Double Ott split windshield. All of the accessories listed follow the "Made in the USA" theme of this build.

This is not the first display UTV Sector Seven has built, and it certainly won't be the last. Aside from the quality and usefulness of the products Sector Seven manufactures right here in the U.S., we like that the employees and owners are enthusiasts and enjoy the products, machines and riding areas like the rest of us do.
