1. <u>"Twister" program (October Business Meeting, October 27th):</u>

Therese will show us how to make a wall hanging like the one she made.

• **NOTE: For those who bought the book:

The following corrections need to be made to the book "Let's Twist."

Page 9 (Pinwheel Party Quilt) Under Materials Fabric A should be 1 1/8yd. Not 7/8 yd

Page 21 Under Materials: Fabric A should be 4 yds. (not 3 yds as written) Under Cutting: 21 - 3" strips (not the 11 as written)

- Also note that the instructions with the Lil Twister Tool state that you will use 24 5" squares – <u>Therese's version requires a square so you should use 36 5" squares</u>:
- <u>Learning to use the TWISTER tool.</u> For the Halloween table topper Therese displayed at the last meeting, you need:
- 5" squares of assorted fabric (Therese used 8)
 Cut three 3 ¹/₂"
 X WOF stripes for a border.
- Bring your TWISTER tool and a piece of batting or flannel (IMPORTANT!)
- Rotary cutter and mat
- <u>Small</u> template: If you plan to use the small template and make a table topper like the one Therese showed at the Sept. program night, you need to cut 36 5" squares of assorted fabric. Dark and light seem to work the best. Lay out the squares, 6 x 6. Be sure you do not have the same two fabrics touching. When you are pleased with the arrangement, stitch the squares together to form a large square. Add a 3½" border on all four sides. Press well. Bring to the meeting.
- Large template: For those of you who bought the large template tool, you need:
- Small quilt: At least 4 or 6 10" squares (just to learn the technique). Use an assortment of dark and light fabric. Add a $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " border on all 4 sides.
- Larger quilt: If you plan to make a quilt, you can use a set of "Layer Cake" squares. You will need 36 10" squares, or more for a larger quilt.
- Bring your TWISTER tool and a piece of batting or flannel (IMPORTANT!)
- Rotary cutter and mat
- **BEFORE the meeting**, prepare the base. Lay out your squares in a pleasing arrangement. Do not have the same fabric squares next to each other. Stitch together to form a large square. Press well. Add a 6 ½" wide border to all four sides.
- If you were not at the meeting to purchase a TWISTER tool, call or email Therese for ordering. The small one is \$10 and the large one is \$20. Or, you can purchase from a quilt shop or order on line.

3. Our Library:

For designing your own blocks or for determining yardage for block-of-the-month squares we have a book in the library that will be helpful to you. I have included the page for Right triangles as an example. Our library contains a wealth of knowledge so take advantage of it. We heartily thank Kathy K for sorting, cataloging and maintaining our library!

4. <u>Tip of the Month:</u> (Thanks Therese for forwarding Jinny Beyer's tip)

Understanding color value and what is light, medium and dark is something I'm having a bit of a problem with. Can this be learned or is that eye for color a "God-given gift"? *Linda Williams, South Florida*

Jinny's Answer Great question, Linda! And it's one that I often hear when I'm lecturing on color.

Determining the value of a fabric – where it falls on a light-dark scale – is very important in quiltmaking. It's key to shading fabrics and one my color secrets: to create a glow in my quilts, I like to put a very light fabric right next to a very dark one.

But it's not always easy to determine whether a fabric is light, medium or dark. What do those terms really mean? So, let's look at an example.




Here are eight fabrics in teals, blues and purples. The last fabric is black. All of them have smallscale patterns. It should be fairly easy to pick out the lightest (#3) and either #7 or #8 is the darkest. But what about all those "middle" colors? What order do they go in? Color can "trick" us. So, until your eyes become more experienced (and they do with practice), I recommend that you look at your fabrics in black and white. There are several ways to do this.

- 1. Use your computer or printer. Scan the fabrics you're using or take a picture. If you have a computer program that lets you remove the color and display in black and white (or, more accurately, "grayscale"), convert the photo. Otherwise, simply print the photo to your printer, changing the print options to print in grayscale.
- 2. Use a photocopier. Take your fabrics to the office or a library and make a photocopy. When I converted our sample strip of fabrics to grayscale, here was the result:



Now it becomes much easier to sort the fabrics from lightest to darkest. (Remember, this isn't color shading, it's shading by value!)




Also, keep in mind that value is relative – depending on your selection of fabrics, a medium fabric might be the lightest (or darkest) in another selection. In the example above, 4 is definitely a medium. But if your selection of fabrics is the three below, it's now the lightest!
