

## In Loving Memory & Jack Burns





Jack Burns was born in 1937 in National City, CA. He grew up in National City and Chula Vista. He was the oldest of 6 kids. His father was a diesel mechanic his whole life. Hanging out with his Dad at the truck yard is what gave him the love for trucking. He was driving trucks from an early age of 15. Driving trucks was the only occupation he ever had.

He met his bride Eva when he was 19 and she was 14. Her family was not too happy about the relationship at first. But grew to love Jack like a Son. They were married just a few years later and immediately started their family. Jack Jr., Jeannie and Jimmy. He worked very hard to support his family driving out of town all week. Eva stayed home to take care of the kids. They bought their first home in Chula Vista. Jack always loved the Country and finally convinced his wife to move to Jamul. That was in 1972. When Jamul really was in the middle of nowhere.

Jack and his brother-in-law started a hay and feed company called B & O hay and cattle. They ran it out of the property in Jamul. They re-located to the intersection of Highway 94 and Highway 54 on the same property of a fruit stand. They both worked their day jobs and hauled hay at night and weekends. When the owners of the fruit stand decided to retire, Jack took the opportunity to buy the fruit stand too. Eva and all the kids worked at the hay store and fruit stand while Jack hauled hay during the day and went to LA to get fruit and produce at night. Jack still had a dream to be a large fleet owner. Hay and fruit was not what was in his blood. He eventually gave up both and focused on building his trucking empire.

With the support of his wife and children, he drove his own truck and added to his fleet one truck at a time. Burns & Sons Trucking Inc. was born. Jack, Eva and the kids ran the company along with some wonderful employees. The Company grew to be the largest construction trucking hauler in San Diego. Eva retired in the early 90's and turned everything over to Jack and the other employees. They have many employees that have been with the company 30 and 40 years. Jack un-officially retired in 2000. When Jack and Eva were not traveling, Jack came to the yard and office every day to check on things and give his input into daily operations. He was there just days before his passing. Counting trucks and asking why they weren't all working. He never missed anything.

Jack loved to party. His house parties became famous in Jamul. Always had a band as he loved music and loved to entertain people. His favorite food at his parties was pork and beef cooked in the ground. These parties would bring crowds of over 500 people. Jack loved every minute of them. Jack and Eva also hosted many Jamul fund raisers at their home. It was very important for him to give back to the Community he loved so much.

All 3 of his children moved to Jamul to raise their own children. Jack's Grandchildren went to the same school his own kids went to. Although by the time the Grandkids attended school there were 3 schools not just 1. Having all his Grandkids live so close brought the Grandkids to Jack and Eva's home often. Nothing brought Jack more joy than his family.

Jack went very peacefully on the night of March 14th 2019. He was listening to his favorite blues music and was surrounded by his loving family. He lived an amazing life and was loved so very much by so many.

Jack is survived by his beautiful Bride of 60 years, Eva. His sisters, Connie and Patty. His 3 children, Jack Jr, Jeannie and Jim. His Grandchildren, John, Melissa, Elizabeth, Joshua, Stephen, Amanda, Dakota, Janel, Jolene and Brandon. His Great Grandchildren, JJ, (who is actually John Jackson Burns VI) Quinn, Jameson, Alannah, Finley, Thomas, SJ, JR, Ellie Mae, Benjamin, Ava, Joel, Lola and Jett. He also has 2 more on the way courtesy of Elizabeth and Dakota. He was very excited about the 2 new additions to the family. #### In Memoriam

Ken"Mr. Jamul" Rupe

October 24, 1940-March 16, 2019



Ken Rupe also known as Mr. Jamul, was born and raised in Glasgow, Kentucky. He was one of ten children and began working from an early age selling candies to factory workers. Later he earned his own paper route for the Glasgow Daily Times. Which he kept until joining the Navy following graduation from Glasgow High School in 1959.

Ken was assigned to be a photographer and journalist in the US Navy and was stationed at NAS Miramar in San Diego, California, where he was privileged to interview and photograph some of the first American Astronauts. Following his honorable discharge from the US Navy, Ken worked as newspaper reporter for The Sentinel where he started covering local politics, human interest stories. Ken

moved on to start his own marketing firm where he proudly ran political campaign for some of the first African-American men and women in San Diego politics. Not long after joining an advertising agency in La Jolla, Ken met his artist wife Mona Mills at an adult art class in La Mesa, they married four days later in Las Vegas. The two soon started a family and moved to Jamul in 1974 where Ken became a Real Estate Agent with Brotherton Realty. The pair purchased and subdivided land on Honey Springs Road in order to finance the building of their home, where Mona still lives. Ken later moved on to work at Century 21 Real Estate in Jamul and then after obtaining his Real Estate Broker's License in 1982, opened his own office, Country Properties.

Ken specialized in vacant land in the backcountry, personally "tromping the corner" of all parcels with his buyers so that they knew exactly what they were buying and no one could ever take advantage of them. Ken sold much land in Jamul several times over, through the years and was dubbed "Mr Jamul" in the early 80's. He really embodied his love of Jamul over the years, often taking unpopular stances in order to protect the open spaces and the resident's right to "quiet enjoyment" of their land.

Ken loved his horses, and he loved to ride with his children and neighbors around Jamul. Ken also loved to sing, son of a preacher, Ken was always singing and he was a member of the Lamb's Players musical Theatre group during the 1960's. Ken sang Karaoke with gusto at many east county bars and restaurants over the years - having his own regular gig at the Charcoal House in La Mesa among others. His favorite songs were always the energetic country songs such as "Boot Scooting Boogie" and "Prop Me Up By The Jukebox When I Die."

Ken was a driven, independent, courageous and generous man and he did not qualm at offending people when he felt strongly abut something, which was fairly often. He was brilliant in so many ways being able to fix and build almost anything, and able to solve complex real estate problems for his clients and friends. Like many of us, however, he was human, and was unable to solve some of his own problems in the end.

Ken lived and died in the place he loved the most, Lyons Creek, Jamul. He has taught many of us valuable lessons about living life with passion and purpose, and getting out there and "kicking ass and taking names." Which we should all continue to do in his honor.

Ken is survived by his daughters Mona Rupe (Tulsa, OK) and Kendra Atkinson (Glasgow, KY) and his two granddaughters Fiona and Juliet. He is survived by his ex-wife and friend, Mona Mills, and step-daughter Anna Mills (Jamul CA) and three of his nine siblings, Eula, Doris Ann and Becky and numerous relatives in Glasgow, KY. Memorial services will be held in Glasgow, KY this summer.

#### WOW ... WHAT A MEMORABLE SPRING!

It is still amazing how much green we've seen this spring— almost as if we were touched by a bit of the Irish. Those who think San Diego has no seasons have never lived in our backcountry. Poppies pop. Lupine is lush. San Diego sunflowers dot the hillsides, wild lilac turns blue and purple, and wild mustard comes up... well, everywhere.

If you like cooking with wild **SPRING GREENS**, there is plenty of choice this year. Stinging Nettle makes a deliciously wonderful soup and pesto. Miner's Lettuce is America's contribution to green (European) salads. Even the wild mustard, topped with butter and lemon juice, is a rustic delicacy.



A favorite green at our place is **MINER'S LETTUCE**. It hides under the oaks where it's shady and moist—a small, green, cup-shaped leaf atop a long stem. Its tiny flower grows right in the middle of the cup, and it makes wonderful addition to any green salad. Mild but savory. And of course... mega healthy!

Right now the **MANZANILLA** is in bloom. The English next wildfire is a team effort. name is Chamomile, and sometimes Pineapple Weed Most of Deerhorn is accessed

because its little yellow "flowers" look a bit like miniature pineapples. Manzanilla is more common name here in the Southwest—if you

crush its flower, you'll get a scent something like apple, or 'manzanas." Add fresh flowers to salads, or dry them for tea. The leaves are fine, but it's the flowers that are super-packed with healthful nutrients. It's a great bedtime soother for sleep, eases digestion, and with a tad of honey or lemon, it's quite tasty. When I lived in Colombia, I drank it daily as a comfort brew for any upset—colds, flu, homesickness, or boyfriend woes. Recommended!

he first alerted me to the value of Stinging Nettle. I was complaining about how much had grown around our place after the Harris Fire. He proceeded to let me know it was great for the soil (a nitrogen-fixer), and incredibly delicious in soups. So for the last decade, I make Stinging Nettle Soup as soon as the leaves are big enough to pick (with gloves). Butter, potatoes, onions, broth, salt

and pepper are the basics. Top with some condiments and fresh crema or sour

#### STINGING NETTLE SOUP

- 1/2 cup butter
- 3 cups sliced onions (2-3 medium)
- 3 cups potatoes in chunks (3-4 medium)
- 3 cups chicken stock
- 2-3 oz nettles leaves (salad bowl full)
- Small bunch of chives, snipped
- Salt and freshly ground pepper
- Top up with cream, chives, cilantro,
- cheese, bacon... Go Wild.

virtually all the sting in the leaves is gone. Blanche them in hot water if you're being extra careful. **NOTE:** Stinging nettles are NOT the same as the big purple nettles that are so hard to get rid of. Two entirely different plants.

FIRE SEASON IS COMING... The other side of a magnificent spring is the added fuel it provides for wildfires. The invasive cheat grass is already browning. Once upon a time, native grasses covered our backcountry. Though still flammable, they held their moisture far longer into the hot summer months. Cheat grass, on the other hand, grows fast and furious. One day it's too green to cut, and then it seems to dry out overnight.

DEFENSIBLE SPACE is not just for your own home- it is also part of your

responsibility to community and neighbors. Surviving the next wildfire is a team effort. Most of Deerhorn is accessed via private (dirt) roads, so the County provides no

maintenance or brushing. As you look at your own roadside, think about your

neighbors who may need to evacuate past your home. When grasses and fuels line the side of a road, cars may not be able to get through. So



If it's turning brown, mow grasses and fuel down.

we all need to make sure we don't endanger evacuating neighbors. Please clear to the edge of your road and help provide a safer route for emergencies and evacuations. That's the law, but more importantly, that's being a good neighbor.

**POWERLINK GRANTS** were awarded last month. To date I've heard from only a handful of Deerhorn residents, but all received full funding (\$2,327). Unfortunately grants are still going to Central Alpine and other areas originally excluded from the program. This has diluted the funds (not enough to go around) and greatly discouraged many highest-risk residents from even applying. Sadly, there is no community input in the process, and members of the Grant Committee are apparently focused more on their own jurisdictions (Alpine, etc.) rather than areas that face the greatest danger. Funding for only 1,509 highest-risk homes is now spread over more than 16,000 homes. So fewer people apply, and we remain a community at highest risk from fires started by— or allowed to grow— because of the presence of overhead Powerlink lines immediately to our east.

**GIRL SCOUTS CLAIM IGGY'S ITALIAN GROTTO**— On April 26-28, the *Sandra Ignosci Ranchito* again hosted Jamul Girl Scout Troop #2736 for its yearly campout. This year the troop is working on outside cooking with local foods. I am actually writing this before the event takes place, and I can't wait for the scent of grilled Chicken Alfredo, penne pasta, antipasto and more to waft over my way. I will definitely need to make an excuse to visit. **Elena Lane** neighbors, **Luis and Rosa Chavez**, help set up the (fire-safe) cooking grill, and typically Luis is tagged for a morning hayride. (He's a professional bus driver and chauffeur— how great is that!) The troop dubbed this year's campsite as *Iggy's Italian Grotto*—just one more example of a wonderful and homegrown Deerhorn Community event.





Dianne's Desk

News & Notes from County Supervisor Dianne Jacob

Making Communities healthier: The County is taking big steps to bolster services for those dealing with mental illness and substance addictions. Supervisor Kristin Gaspar, Sheriff Bill Gore, District Attorney Summer Stephan and I recently received initial Board of Supervisors support to create crisis stabilization centers and to explore expanding PERT, our Psychiatric Emergency Response Teams, into schools. These initiatives are part of a broader effort to radically transform the local delivery of care into a coordinated system that puts the needs of people, not programs, first.

Not a dumping ground: I continue to work closely with residents to fight the placement of sexually violent predators in our community. I've asked the state attorney general to investigate the disproportionate placement of these serial rapists and molesters in rural East County. Ten of the 13 predators released in our county have been placed in the Jacumba/Campo/Boulevard area. In their attempt to quietly house these monsters in SD County, state prison and hospital officials are exploiting small communities that lack resources and clout to challenge these placements.

**Power of choice:** The Board of Supervisors recently agreed to develop options for launching a community choice energy program. The vote opens the door to real competition in the energy market and aims to provide ratepayers with the freedom of choice. The board will be briefed on the development of the program over the next few months, with a detailed proposal expected to reach us in October.





## Life's Memories in Jamul

### Memories of working on Rancho Jamul for Mr. George Daley

Last time I described some of my working memories while working on Rancho Jamul. By coincidence, I had the same room in the bunk house that my father had when he was working for Spreckles Sugar Company when they owned the ranch. More about this in later issues.

Mr. Daley always enjoyed riding horseback on Sundays and participating in any necessary work with the cattle. Sometimes he would invite friends to participate. My job was to get the horses ready, eat breakfast with him, and ride with them. We would all return for a delicious Sunday dinner at his house. I especially enjoyed the days when he didn't have guests. He would reminisce about growing up on his father's ranch North of Escondido, hauling freight with 8 big horses and eventually starting the contracting business.

Mr. Daley had an open account at the Dulzura Café. It was always a thrill, if I was working near Dulzura, to go to the Dulzura Café for lunch. I would tie my horse to the fence east of the café, and charge a big steak to Mr. Daley. If there were any kids around, they always were awed seeing a "real cowboy."

This was before television, in the evening we would listen to radio programs, such as Amos & Andy, Jotom Down Store, Lone Ranger and others or listen to western songs by Eddie Arnold, Little Jimmy Dickens and others. Some evenings I would play a card game with the farm workers called Pitch. I have forgotten how to play the game.

There were several cafes between Casa de Oro and Barrett Junction on Hwy 94. They all had dance floors and Juke boxes. On weekends, some even had a Western band. Everybody along Hwy 94 knew my yellow 1936 Ford Coupe. Also on the weekends, lots of people from San Diego would come out to the country.

I would roam up and down the highway until I found something interesting. I might go as far as Tecate, if

I didn't find something interesting close to Jamul. But that is another story.

As I approached 18 years old I became concerned that I would need to register for the draft. My father told me that if I didn't join the serviced I would regret it for the rest of my life. This proved to be very good advice.

Mr. Daley offered to apply for a deferment so I could continue to work for him, however, I decided I wanted to go into the US Army Air Corp Cadet Program and become a pilot. One of the requirements besides passing the examination was to provide letters of recommendation from three local businessmen. Mr. Daley offered to obtain the letters for me. The letters were from Daley Corporation and three very prominent corporations in San Diego at that time, H.G. Fenton Materials, Western Salt Company, and Hazard Contracting. I still have copies of the letters. Next time, my entering the U.S. Army Air Corps in World War II. The U.S. Air Force was not established until 1948.






