#### In Memoriam Geoff Copland 1945-2023

30 year resident of Jamul, Geoff Copland passed away on January 23, 2023 in Colorado. In 2018 he and his wife retired and moved to Colorado Springs. During his time in Jamul he was a Boy Scout leader, active in Jamul Community Church, and a member of The Kiwanis Club of Greater Jamul where he served as president, treasurer, and chief pancake batter mixer. Those of us who knew Geoff during this time remember him fondly.

He was born in 1945 in New Zealand. From a humble sheep farmer beginning, Geoff became a shepherd of people. He attended Bible College of New Zealand and while at College he felt the call to go to Papua New Guinea (PNG) to assist in bible translation.

When they moved to California Geoff entered the Hospice Chaplaincy. He brought comfort to many people as they made their way to eternity. After retirement, Geoff took English as a second language classes and proceeded

to use this new skill continuing to help others. He taught English with Bible materials in Cambodia, Myanmar (Burma) an Nepal. He made several trips back to Myanmar to teach in a small Bible College that former students had started. Before Covid hit, he and a colleague went to Nepal to teach English to a small group of translators working on oral Bible story translation. He was so disappointed to not be able to return due to travel restrictions.

While in Colorado he continued his good works helping with refugee and foster care families and as a Stephen Minister volunteering with seniors.

Geoff would like to be remembered for his love of family, three sons, and nine grandchildren. He lived a life of service to others and died doing what he loved most: serving God in practical ways.

Services were held on March 4, 2023 at Bethel Lutheran Church Colorado Springs, Colorado.

#### DEERHORN VALLEY ANTLER

MEMORIES OF DEERHORN: During all the storm and wet I found time to rummage through the back closet and pull out a box of 30-year old Deerhom Newsletters.

Back then The Back Country Trader (BCT) had ceased publication. For many years it had featured columns from communities across the backcountry, including Deerhorn Valley. You subscribed and got two issues each month. It was the FaceBook of the 70s and 80s.

Hazel McKinley wrote the Deerhorn Valley News column in the BCT. When we moved here in 1984 she welcomed us: "We have new neighbors. Rob Deason and Kim Hamilton are artists and teachers." We fell in love. With no BCT, resident Sandy Schiefer started up The Antier Newsletter. This was how we shared our goings-on, and we felt like a real community. The Antler (phase I) was distributed for several years. It was a big job, and when volunteers are the heart and soul of any endeavor, it's easy to burn out. Fortunately, there are always new folks who are inspired and become the "do-ers."

In 1987 the Deerhorn Valley Community Association (DVCA) formed. Its initial purpose was to build a combination Fire Station-Community Center. (Spoiler Alert: The community a raised \$40,000 from local residents, then voted overwhelmingly to tax themselves for 12 years in order to secure a \$120,000 loan to complete the Station/ Center and fund its maintenance.) And it needed a newsletter... a way to get the word out about progress on the Station/Center, and how our funds were being spent.

In 1990 my husband, Rob, retired from teaching. He had both the time and talent to start up the newsletter again. He gathered a group of like-minded folks together, and The Deerhom Valley Antler was reborn.

Sadly, the Community Center section where we'd regularly gather together was claimed by CalFire after the 2007 Harris Fire. It was bittersweet to lose the place where so many events and meetings were held. But much of Deerhorn Valley had burned to the ground, and fire safety came first. We searched, and found new ways to come together by holding meetings and events at private properties. Dianne and Paul Jacob were generous with their Red Barn, and group meetings were (and are) held in various living rooms.

So I below are a smattering of articles from those days. While we've changed so much over the years, in many ways we've not changed much at all:





BURGLARY WATCH APRIL 1994 By Rob Deason

Neighbors, be aware that three D.V. residents have had their homes burglarized in the last few months

Unfortunately, living in the country has this drawback. The nature of our surroundings, which we moved here to have, makes us vulnerable to burglars since our homes are generally remote.

I was burglarized ten years ago; there are few experiences as hurtful as arriving to the broken glass and open doors of a home that has been pillaged by thieves. Seeing televisions, VCR's, cameras, cash, gone is disturbing; though they are replaceable. But there is nothing as devastating as knowing that the keepsakes, wedding rings, coin collections, hand-me-down family heirlooms, your special items, are also gone. A person who has been burgled has no better description than that they feel violated; "Is there nothing sacred?" they will ask.

THE BRATTON HOUSE —By Rob Decision In 1868 Napoleon Bratton homestcaded in this valley and established

a cattle ranch. His property extended from south of Deerhorn Rd. to the base of Lyma Peak, approximately 1200 acres. Today on county maps, Deerhorn is still called "Bratton Valley."

Later, Napoleon moved, leaving the prop-erty and the present redwood house—built erry and the present redwood nouse— tour in 1887—to his grandson, Charles Marvin Bratton (pictueof). Charles, who took over the ranch at age 14, lived here in "Bratton Valley," all but one year of his life. 

#### HORSE FUN By Jean Strouf (below is thanks to Google, except for the last entry)

Did you know?

Horses are obligate nasal breathers. This means that they are unable to breathe through their mouth and can only breathe through their nose.

Horses can sleep standing up. They have a "stay" apparatus": a system of tendons and ligaments that allows the horse to lock his legs in position so he can relax without falling over.

Horses have excellent hearing: as a prey animal, it needs to have sensitive hearing to survive. We humans have only 3 muscles to control our ears, whereas horses have 10, allowing them to rotate ears 180 degrees and move independently of one another.

Horses have a nearly 360-degree field of vision, due to position of their eyes. However, they have 2 blind spots: one directly behind them and one directly in front of them.

Horses have lightning-fast reflexes. When they need to fight, they can go from standing still to delivering a powerful kick in just 0.3 seconds, whereas human reaction time is 1.6 seconds.

Foals can walk and run within a few hours after birth.

Horses are highly intelligent animals, and can be taught tasks through positive reinforcement and clicker training, much like dogs.

There are many different colors and patterns of horses, several which determine the breed.

Horses were domesticated about 6000 years ago, and their ancestors probably lived 55 million years ago! Horses are social animals, and are happiest in a herd.

You can estimate a Horse's age by its teeth. Its teeth are continually growing, which is why it needs regular veterinary care to keep teeth filed flat for easy chewing.

Horses can live to be more than 30 years old. Horses in the wild typically live to less than 20 years old. The oldest horse lived to be over 60 years old.

There are over 600 horse breeds, and are all descendants of Arabian and Turkoman horses. The American Quarter Horse is the World's most popular breed. It's the most common horse used by Ranchers in herding cows, and the most common "Rodeo" horse.

The Arabian Horse is the "foundation" of many other "light horse" breeds and usually has one less vertebrae than other breeds.

Horses are Herbivores, and are NOT Carnivores or Omnivores.

The standard measurement for determining the height of a horse is called a HAND. One hand is equal to 4 inches. A Pony is under 14.2 Hands. A Miniature Horse is smaller than a Pony. My horses range from 15.2 Hands to just over 17 Hands. The tallest horse ever measured was 21.25 hands.

Most White horses you see were a darker color at birth. Mike's horse, Charcoal, is mostly white now, although was a definite charcoal color as a 3-year-old.

Horses are not native to North America, and disappeared from this continent more than 11,000 years ago. Our horses are all descendants of European horses/breeds.

A Baby Horse is called a Foal. After a horse is weaned from its dam, it is called a Weanling. A horse is a Filly (Female) or Colt (Male) until it is 4 years old. At 4 years of age, a Filly becomes a Mare, and a Colt becomes a Gelding (if neutered) or a Stallion.

The fastest horse sprint speed ever recorded is 55 MPH, by a Racing Quarter Horse.

Horses can understand and interpret human emotions. Remember this when you are atop a horse and perceive something frightening to you!

Horses can't spend a lot of time on an empty stomach, even 2 or more hours of fasting can cause distress. My horses usually get fed at 4:30 AM, 8 AM-12 PM, and again at 4:30 PM. This helps prevent ulcers.

The average horse weighs about 1000 pounds; my 4 range in weight from 1050-1400 pounds.

An entire new hoof takes 10-12 months to regrow, and is made of Keratin. Dogs love to chew on the fresh cuttings the Ferrier leaves.

Horses have 4 natural "gaits": Walk, Trot, Canter and Gallop. Some breeds (often lumped into a class called "gaited") have an additional gait between the Trot and Canter, which can be the most comfortable gait for riders.

Horses know just where they are putting their feet, especially when they are stepping on yours! Many horses think this is the exact place for their feet. This is the most important reason to wear hard-toed boots around horses. If you don't, expect to get a broken toe or two.

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
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#### How NOT to Light Your Water Heater Memories of fire runs at Jamul Volunteer Fire Dept 1990-91

As I remember, it was a weekend and I was mixing cement to lay blocks and that darn County Fire voice pager went off:

"Propane explosion... Man in the Pool.... Top of Vista Diego.."

Luckily I had not put water in the mixer yet so I jumped in my truck and made a mad dash to the fire truck barn in Lee Valley at the entrance to Indian Hills Bible Camp.

We Volunteers always had our turnouts\* in our private vehicles as we never knew when or where we would be when we got a call...

Who ever got there first got to drive the stick shift 1975 International Fire truck... That would be me...: ) Medics Bob Lindsey and Dan 'Curley' Bell from Indian Hills jumped in and away we went.

Down Skyline we went with siren and red lights (Code Three) at the breakneck speed of 35 MPH.... When we got to 94 it was a short block to Vista Diego and first gear all the way to the top...

When we got to the address that came over the pager there was no sign of smoke or fire but the house looked a little 'cockeyed' like it had been lifted off the foundation and set back down ever so gently... and I think a small front window has been blown out and the front door was open...

As we entered the home we could hear a man yelling from the back yard... so we ran right thru the house and sure enough... There was a man in the pool... in his 'Speedo' looking quite pink all over...

We helped the man out of the water where he had jumped to cool himself off.

Seems he had been lighting the water heater on his hands and knees in a small room right off the living room when the thing blew up... Hence the 'pink' tone of his skin... I guess he had what you would call 'First degree' burns all over his body like a sunburn... Lucky Fellow...

While Bob and Dan attended to the patient by wrapping him in his own bed sheets and pouring Saline solution over him to get ready for transport, I did a little investigation on my own to see if I could find out how this all happened....

By and by an ambulance from Hartson's arrived.. They had to come from Rancho San Diego in those days...

By now I had noticed that the living room and the little room that housed the water heater in the front of the house now housed the flower beds... Imaging posies now growing in the living room....

The house had been lifted off the foundation and the front wall distorted enough to now bring the flower beds inside.... What a sight.... No other damage, e.g. Fire, was evident but I'll bet they had to get a structural engineer to put it all back together again.

Apparently he had been attempting to light the water heater with a match and did not wait long enough between tries to light it for the burner box to be free of unburned Propane.

BTW... The water heater was not up on an 18' stand as is now the code for gas water heaters....

Remember this: <u>Propage is heavier than air</u> and the floor of the small room had become saturated with Propage and the next time he lit a match...

BOOOOM!... with a force to move a house...

Luckily for him the water heater remained intact as did the gas line running to it... or he would have been 'Toast.' (or Roast)

Lesson Learned: <u>ALWAYS let the area air out before</u> trying to re-light a water heater or any other appliance....

That's my story and I'm stickn' to it..

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
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




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#### Jamul-Dulzura Union School District, Elizabeth Bystedt

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
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## Anderson Alert from San Diego County Supervisor, Joel Anderson

generations, the Jamul Little League Baseball (JLL) non-profit organization has provided its surrounding community with life-long memories, triendships, and a shared love of baseball.

On Saturday, March 4th, 2023, current JLL board members hosted the 42nd annual Opening Day event. The day was made possible by the dedicated community members who facilitated the construction of newly renovated fields.

Several local organizations and public representatives attended Opening Day, including Jamul Kiwanis, County Sheriff's and Fire, and indian Hills Camp. And Jamul-Dutzura Union School District Superintendent Elizabeth Bystedt, who was integral in the approval of the JLL reconstruction project.

County Supervisor Joel Anderson presented a proclamation, declaring it to be "Jamul Little League Day" throughout his district. "Jamul Little League serves as the spirit of the community and provides children with abundant opportunities to stay engaged, promote an active, healthy lifestyle, and develop social and leadership skills," Anderson said. "JLL has remained committed to bringing people together and giving families a safe and fun space to play ball."

Vietnam War Combat Veteran Tom Hollis has coached for JLL for nearly thirty years and assisted in the design and layout of the enhanced fleids.

"[The renovation] is not for anybody other than the kids, that's what this whole project is about," said Hollis. JLL Vice President Mikey Garcia encourages Jamul residents to "come out here whether you have kids or not. Another reason for JLL taking such a big project was to give the community a hub to come to."

The players spent the laughter-filled Opening Day exploring the new facilities. Baseball players Cayden Casey and Conner Adams said their favorite part of being in JLL is having fun with their teammates. They are eager to make more memories together on these new fields. 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
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
