This led to her seventeen years as a dynamic member of the Jamul Dulzura Union School District Board, serving as a delegate to the California School Board's Association Delegate Assembly where she was named President, quite an honor for San Diego and especially Jamul! Dianne worked tirelessly in our Jamul community and became quite an expert on land use and CEQA! She has just completed her seventh term (that's 28 years!) as District 2's elected member of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors, where she has been instrumental in making extraordinary changes for the betterment of our community, all of District 2, and throughout San Diego County.

Serving as Supervisor of the largest district in San Diego County has been a challenge that Dianne accepted and achieved an amazing number of accomplishments! From her leadership towards increased wildfire safety, as well as her care and concern for those impacted, to protecting the environment through her leadership on land-use issues, and her continued support for the education of our populace through the creation of many new libraries, especially in the back country, coupled with her belief in the importance of physical activity as demonstrated in the number of ballfields built with her support, have all led to a stronger East County! As Dianne Jacob prepares to wrap up twenty eight years of incredible public service on the San Diego County Board of Supervisors, I recall the first time I had the pleasure of meeting her. In the fall of 1972, my old 1957 Volkswagen Beetle ran out of gas in front of the Jacob's beautiful Deerhorn Valley home. I was on my way to my class at Grossmont College and I was running late. Feeling a bit desperate, I walked up Dianne and Paul's driveway. Hoping to use their telephone to make a rescue call to my mom Bev Larson, I was greeted by their two handsome Doberman Pinschers. Smiling, Dianne walked across Paul's famously well groomed lawn to see what all the fuss was about. She welcomed me warmly and she was genuinely glad to assist. After telling her I was on my way to class, Dianne asked me about my education goals and she told me about her years of classroom teaching whilst gathering her gas can and filling my tank. She insisted that I accept all of the fuel so I would not have to stop again and be late. She refused to let me pay her for the gas. I drove away grateful for her generosity, her "pay it forward attitude" and was (and still am) inspired by her genuine kindness and care for others. I knew then that she was not only an abundantly kind human but she was passionate about education and committed to the success of her neighbors.

Dianne's support for public education became front and center again when she ran for a seat on the Jamul Dulzura School Board. After serving on the board for many years, she was then nominated and elected to serve as the state's President of the California School Boards Association. Her work resulted in the development of effective policies to advance the education and well-being of Jamul Dulzura students and million's of the state's schoolage children. While serving as California School Boards Association President, she was an essential voice for public education. Her leadership continues to inspire school board members to be knowledgeable leaders, extraordinary governance practitioners and ardent advocates for all students. Dianne's work as an education advocate left an indelible mark on the Jamul Dulzura School District. Her belief in high standards and "getting more bang for the buck" led to impactful district-wide improvements. In time, all Jamul-Dulzura Schools received California's highest honors including the California Distinguished School Award and Oak Grove Middle School received the National Blue Ribbon Award multiple times. These achievements are a rare accomplishment for any school district.

Following her lead and commitment to the safety of our community, every Deerhorn Valley resident who could, raised their hand to be trained to serve as a volunteer firefighter. Finally, the DVFA raised enough funds to purchase a used fire truck for DV's exclusive use. Dianne and Paul sacrificed the use of their own steel barn for the fire truck. Years later, the Jacobs generously donated a large portion of their beautiful property for a permanent fire station. Dianne wasn't done, she was determined not to stop fighting until a regional fire response system was created to protect the backcountry.

She was elected to the County Board of Supervisors in 1992 and has served for 28 years. Dianne has spent much of her twenty eight years continuously working to ensure there were resources available for fire protection in San Diego's unincorporated communities. Because she never gave up, San Diego has an immense multi-funded regional, coordinated fire system for the backcountry. Rural communities in San Diego County now have fully staffed fire houses in each community with professional state of the art equipment and highly skilled fire fighters on site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Her advocacy for youth as County Supervisor and also as the Chair of the San Diego Board of Supervisors has been both remarkable and invaluable. Dianne also made it her mission to provide county funding to ensure youth athletics would thrive in District 2. Without her leadership, countless youth and community recreation projects would not exist.

Without her advocacy and coordination with our local planning group, Jamul would not have its marvelous youth sports fields. One of the first projects Dianne supported in Jamul was a collaboration with JDUSD to provide a fitness circuit for students and the community. These collaborative projects ensured Jamul Little League and Jamul Soccer have extraordinary places to play and a place for the community to exercise and enjoy. Besides its sports fields, our recreational areas were enhanced with sidewalks, irrigated landscaping, handicapped parking access, gates, fencing, back stops, dug outs ;restrooms and a snack bar.. In 2015, Oak Grove Middle School (OGMS) received approval for a beautiful running track. Students and the community of Jamul will benefit from Dianne's unifying vision, heart, leadership and dedication for generations to come.

It is not surprising this extraordinary woman has held an elective position longer than anyone in San Diego Government history.Dianne, we cannot possibly thank you enough for your phenomenally inspiring leadership and unparalleled public service. Your incredible devotion to your community is appreciated more than you may ever know. Jamul would not be the same without you. You are so loved and appreciated by this community. Congratulations to you Dianne!

Welcome 2021

These many months of lockdown have made me really appreciate what we have here in Deerhorn Valley. The Antler continued under Dot Adams until the 2007 Harris Fire. For most of that following year, DV'ers were apart— many without homes or country mailboxes. We shared news at the Fire Station/Recovery Center, and a new website was created for those with computers. Times may have changed, but we're still a community that stays connected.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS, COUNTRY STYLE — Don't you just marvel at the holiday decorations that appear this time of year? I've headed down many a dirt road to a home at the end of the trail and found lights and holiday joy. Seems that out here there's no urge to be the biggest and the brightest—or have a big audience.



most of us, those numbers come with a multitude of feelings, most of which are not pleasant. My 2020 had a little icing on the cake, or maybe better said, "a little salt in the wound". In September of 2019, as I was applying my after shower lotion, I felt a grape sized lump in my right breast that I hadn't noticed before. I called my doctor the next day and asked if I was ok to wait the 2 months until my scheduled mammogram. His reply: "no, I'd like to see you right away". Within a week I was told I had breast cancer,


was assigned my professional "team" and the rollercoaster ride began. I'm fortunate to be a Scripps MD Anderson patient as their cancer center is unmatched.

But there was another "team" who has been just as important, for reasons both mental and physical. This team consists of friends and family, without whom, this journey would have been much tougher and I'm so very grateful for each and every one of them. One member of this team is Tina. I have known Tina for 27 years, we met as neighbors and quickly became friends as our children were the same age, they attended the same preschool and we had a wonderful group of parents from that school with whom we socialized. As life would have it, we lost touch through the years and aside from the occasional "hello" or passing at Target, didn't see each other much.

As soon as Tina heard the news about my diagnosis, she reached out. She took me to lunch; brought me a beautiful gift basket filled with goodies (in a Hawaiian bucket of course!), offered to give me rides to appointments and wanted to get me healthy and strong. I haven't exercised since high school and being on the naturally thin side, avoided it like the plague (knowing full well that thin and tone are not the same thing!) She kept on me, but we needed to wait for me to heal from my mastectomy as well as get permission from my surgeon.

Well, we finally got the OK and dove right in in September. I was really nervous as I didn't want to do any damage but she designed a plan that was perfect for me. We took it slow and if I felt any discomfort, we made immediate changes. She was so patient with me and my lack of knowledge on how to use these pieces of equipment. Between her diet plan (geared towards developing muscle by eating protein and the proper foods as well as telling me what to avoid) and the 2 days a week work out plan, I started to notice a change. Simple things like getting out of the bath and walking back from my mailbox had become difficult and I was thrilled to be able to do them again without feeling like I was 95 years old! I would look in the mirror in her studio and see definition in my arms and legs, I couldn't believe it! I am so thankful to her for helping me to feel a way that I never thought possible. I couldn't have done it without her and will forever be indebted.

I leave you with this: I highly recommend Tina and her plan, you can do it! I've seen all ages coming and going, she will create a plan that suits you. Secondly, ladies, do not rely on your mammogram. Keep checking your girls or have that special someone do it for you!

Serving East County on the Board of Supervisors for nearly three decades has been one of the greatest honors of my life.

When I was first sworn as Supervisor in 1993, I promised to challenge the status quo and shake things up. I wanted a county government that put people first-and I was willing to fight for it.





A Note from Greater San Diego Academy Director, Ms. Bowes & Assistant Director, Ms. D'Augusta

Many of us are spending our extra time at home on hobbies, old and new. Hobbies can offer us a time and space to get away from the stress of everyday life. They can also be an opportunity to learn and grow as a person. Some hobbies can even contribute to school achievement for our children.

For young children, hobbies that allow them to practice their fine motor skills can make a huge difference in their ability to communicate in a written form. When students practice their fine motor skills, teachers see an improvement in handwriting and even math since much of math involves the physical organization and placement of numbers. Making jewelry, whether it's with actual gems and jewelry thread or beads and pipe cleaners, can be fun and provide the students with a product to keep. Crafting of any kind allows students to practice cutting, pasting, and placing materials with a purpose. Sorting games allow students to move items that are appropriately sized for their age (from toy cars down to small beans) and offers practice in matching, sorting, and patternmaking that Kindergarten students work on mastering. Previous generations benefitted from the games Operation and Mouse Trap as they require steady hands to win and appeal to slightly older children. These games have made guite the comeback recently.

Older students gain self-confidence with many hobbies that are geared toward them. When a student starts to draw or paint and continues to practice and improve, they can compare older and newer work to see their own gains and growth. Likewise, singing, playing an instrument, knitting, cooking, and other artistic endeavors generate products that provide hard evidence of improvement and this is a powerful thing. Additionally, older students can develop responsibility when their hobbies involve caring for a pet, plant, or garden. Having another living thing rely on the student's care can be a rewarding and truly educational experience.

Don't overlook your hobbies as those that can be shared with your children. When your child sees your passion for a particular activity, they might assume that passion. Plus, it is another opportunity to have a shared experience with your child. Even more impactful, could be starting a new hobby with your child so that you can learn it together.

Some hobbies come and go which is fine as changing hobbies can offer a variety of experiences and exposure. With the benefits of hobbies including stress reduction, physical well-being, practicing creativity, time management skills, and expanding knowledge among other things, they can truly be advantageous for all ages.

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The 'Widow Maker' and other hand-me-down apparatus

When I came aboard the Jamul Volunteer Fire Dept around 1982 our apparatus consisted entirely of 'retired' equipment from other fire departments from around the state...

The engine at the Main Station, where the Casino is now on highway 94, was a 'vintage'1956 Crown diesel pumper that featured 'open air' seating for the rear seat crew. It was a 'cantankerous' stick shift and as I remember only three drivers could master it.

Also residing at the Main Station was a water tanker made from a cab over fuel truck and our 'Rescue' rig that had seen it's better days as a 1970's International work truck...

More about the 'Rescue' truck later...

The Pepsi truck earned it's 'widow maker' reputation when it lost it's brakes on highway 94 near the now Steel Canyon High school and proceeded pretty much on it's own down to the steel bridge near the County Operations center... That was before the new concrete bridge was built and the ride must have been 'harrowing' as that old steel bridge was just barely wide enough for two cars... Fireman John Reese had been heading for fuel at Jamacha Junction where we fueled all our trucks back then.

The Rescue truck is where we carried personnel extrication gear such as our Hi lift jack for prying car doors open and a chain saw like device with metal cutting carborundum blade for cutting cars apart when people were pinned inside....

It's a wonder more accident victims did not have heart attacks from the sparks flying form that blade as we cut the roof off a crushed passenger car with people inside. Later we would spend \$7,000 from pancake breakfasts and donations for a state of the art Hurst 'Jaws of Life' rescue too that replaced all of the above personnel extrication gear.

We had two other 1970's vintage engines; one at Chief John Baker's Quonset hut on Lawson Valley Road and the other at an unmanned barn on Lyons Valley road in front of Indian Hills Camp...

7213 was the radio call sign for that engine. It had replaced and ancient open cab rig that I used to ride on the back of when I became a rookie Fire Fighter in 1982...

By the time we got the 1975 International replacement I was driving and was to experience my own 'Widow maker' stories....

The first incident was while responding to a call in the middle of the night with Medics 'Curly' Dan Bell and Bob Lindsey; going through the gears (4 speed with two speed axel) and just about a half mile from the station on Lyons Valley Rd. *the gear shifter came right out of the floor*... If this had happened while going down Skyline with a full tank of water I might not

have gotten to experience the second 'widow maker' story....

One fine Christmas eve around 1988 we were trying to douse a cabin fire down in the bottom of Lawson Valley and my job was to haul water from the elementary School about 4 miles away... On my last trip going down that curvy road in the dark the air brakes began to fade away each time I pumped them... The brake pedal was on the floor about half way to the fire so I just kept it in gear and used a dirt bank to stop at the fire scene.. Chief Frank Favro RIP, was not too happy with me for scratching up the old paint.

Eventually all this 'vintage' equipment was replaced with brand new apparatus with grants obtained by our last and final Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Bill Bagnell.


That's my story and I'm stickn' to it...


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
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

NEW PROGRAM OFFERS BACKUP PLAN TO REACH RESIDENTS IN DISTRESS Michelle Clock, SD County Fire

Imagine you are having chest pains, or you've taken a serious fall inside your home. What if you called 911 but were too incapacitated to let emergency responders in the door? The responders would have to knock down your door, eating up precious time and causing costly damage. There is another easier way now available. San Diego County Fire is offering free lock boxes, known as residential KnoxBoxes, to qualifying residents. Inside these boxes, a spare house key can be stored. The KnoxBoxes are only accessible by emergency responders. County Fire will install one just outside the front door for quick access as part of its new Residential KnoxBox Program.

Jamul resident, Gail Edwards, 79, is glad to have a KnoxBox after the scare she had last year. The retired psychologist and grandmother had slipped and fallen. Within days, her condition left her unable to walk to the car to get medical treatment luckily, with a phone by her bed, she was able to call for help and meet first responders. She was taken to a hospital and spent a few nights there with a broken pelvis. What if she hadn't been able to reach her front door?

To qualify, residents must:

- Live in San Diego County Fire, Ramona Municipal Water District, or Deer Springs Fire Protection District coverage areas
- Be any of the following: at least 62 years old, have a disability, or need assistance with one or more Major Life Activity

The new program is among the first of its kind in the region. It is part of County Fire's growing focus on helping residents get ahead of risk.

"For older folks with chronic health conditions or in need of help with basic activities, KnoxBoxes can be a lifesaver,' said District 2 Supervisor Dianne Jacob. "These devices can also provide some peace of mind in a region where wildfire is a year-round threat.
