BACK TO SCHOOL

George Merz a long time resident of Jamul wrote many entertaining stories in the Jamul Shopper about growing up in Jamul. Following are excerpts from his writings with the theme "Back to School"

"When I began attending the first grade in 1931 the desks were adjustable with the smaller ones in the front of the room and graduating to the rear. It was always a thrill the first day of school to move to a larger desk.

Our major subjects were arithmetic, reading, writging, history and geography. Our teacher believed arithmetic wes the most benefical training we could receive. We spent at least two hours per day studying arithmetic, mostly on practical subjects including volumes of tanks, reservoirs and ponds. Land measurements of all shapes and sizes. Purchase of supplies and sale of farm and ranch products including profit and loss statements and gain and loss percentages. This was very valuable training for me, some that is again encountered in higher education. If learning was easy, we were not allowed to make fun of the students that had problems.

The San Diego Union newspaper provided a page in the Sunday edition for stories submitted by students of San Diego County Schools. Every Monday morning the students in the upper grades would write an article about an experience they had during the weekend. The paper was delivered by mail so we didn't see the Sunday paper until Monday. We first looked to see if our story had been printed. What a thrill it was to see it in the newspaper.

When I started school we had no electricity and the only water was from a cistern, which was an underground storage area cut out of the rock and the water was cool. even when the weather was not. The water was collected from rain water off the roof. Occasionally someone would see a dead rat or squirrel in the water so we could not use the water until the cistern was cleaned and it collected new water from the rain. During that time water was carried from the neighbor to the North. Each student had a tin cup for drinking. Oh the "good ole days".

By the time of my graduation in 1938, the enrollment had gradually increased to 22 in all eight grades. There were four in my graduating class. Enrollment records from the time the school first started were stored in the school. My teacher seemed to enjoy showing me notations where members of my family had been punished!

Memories of Jamul Volunteer Fire Department Well, That's a Deep Subject By Dave Beekman

This story I vividly remember as it was documented by a TV Crew from the old TV Show Rescue 911.... And we saw it on TV about three months later...

Seems were having a Saturday training at the main station on Hiway 94; now a fine Butler Steel building... a far cry from our old 'pole barn' and double wide trailer...

We were told to come to training in our Dress Blues so it could have been training by an outside agency like Red Cross on our newly purchased heart Defibulator... Not sure...

There were about 25 Volunteers in attendance and about half way through the training we got a call on our pagers:... "Man in a well... Montiel Truck Trail... Near Loveland Reservoir."

Luckily we had a full crew for each of our 2 New Pierce fire trucks and the Rescue. So off we went up 94 to Jefferson to Lyons Valley and up Skyline turning left on Lawson Valley road and another 2-3 miles to Montiel TT. Montiel was only half paved in those days and when it turned to dirt we still had a mile or so to go to the ranch bordering Loveland Reservoir...

When we got to the ranch we learned that a man had been trying to retrieve his water well pump from a 'hand dug' well that had had a wooden cover that had rotted out over the years and he had fallen through... the hand dug well was about 8 feet in diameter and 50 feet deep as we threw a rope down there and paced it off on the ground when we brought it up... Sure enough there was man down there moaning in pain as he had broken his back in the fall... we could see him down there only with a flashlight as he was 50 feet down.

Luckily two of our Volunteers had just come back from Heavy Rescue School and were able to rig a rescue hoist using a nearby Oak tree as they had learned in rescue school. I believe Lynn Alps was one of the fellows... not sure about the other...

We had called Life Flight upon confirming we had an injured man down there as we were sure he would need to be transported to the Hospital as soon as we got him out of his predicament. Live Flight arrived about the time Fire Fighter Alps was lowered down to the victim. Much to our surprise Life Flight had brought along a TV Film Crew who was looking for some 'action' to document that day. Good thing we had our 'dress' uniforms on and not our street clothes we usually responded in to such events.

By and by FF Alps got the patient into a back restraint device called a "Ked Sled" and we began the process of raising the injured man to the top... This was an 'all hands' event as the so called "Z rig" (a combination of ropes and pulleys) was strictly man powered...

And up he came... 'Cussing a Blue Streak' as the pain must have been excruciating. By and by we got the patient onto a backboard and hauled him off to the waiting Helicopter.

I heard that some weeks later he came by the station to thank us for his 'rescue.'

Oh. Did I mention that the TV program that we saw a few months later contained no cuss'n? I guess they had edited that all out but I have to say the Jamul Volunteer Fire Dept sure looked good in those dress blues. That's my story and I'm stick'n to it. dB

DEERHORN VALLEY ANTLER

Fifty years ago, in 1975, Deerhorn organized its Volunteer Fire Department—**DVVFD**. Local Volunteers responded to medical, road, and fire emergencies. They joined, trained, were on-call, and usually first-on scene. They held our hands, kept us calm, and administered emergency first aide as needed. Volunteers were truly our life line—and supporting the DVVFD brought us all together.

By 1987 we wanted a **permanent fire station** for our community. **Paul and Dianne Jacob** offered their Brown Barn to house the equipment, while the **DVVFD Ladies' Auxiliary** held pot-lucks, BBQs, and Pancake Breakfasts to raise funds for our volunteers and equipment. They were great get-togethers. But they could only raise funds to support firefighters. And so the DVCA formed in 1987 to spearhead fundraising for a permanent station & community center.

Paul and Dianne Jacob donated an adjacent parcel of land. DV'ers contributed \$40,000 in donations and pledges, and fundraisers were

ongoing. By 1988 the Rural Protection Fire District (RFPD) assigned brand-new **Engine-22** to Deerhorn to join an our old 1975 Ford Attack Pumper.

In 1990 we taxed ourselves (imagine!) to form a Community Service Zone to collect and disperse fire funds. We soon broke ground on the new station, and construction



began. We added a beautiful big commercial kitchen for community events, and lots of outdoor seating. All with community funds. Chief Don Payne Fire Station was dedicated in 1993. A dream realized.

WE LOSE A COMMUNITY CENTER, BUT...

The Harris Fire in 2007 destroyed nearly half our community and normal life came to a grinding halt. Recovery and rebuilding took years. CalFire took over full-time operation of the fire station. We took the good with the bad. LOST: One Community Center. GAINED: A full-time fire station with professional firefighters and equipment.

E-22 STILL MAKING HISTORY! —Mike McDonald, CA Fire Museum

Tony Hicks and 10 other proud DV'ers rode on Engine 22 in the San Diego St. Patrick's Day Parade last March.

Engine #22 was a 1987 Ford-Pierce (Type-1/Triple Combination Pumper) and assigned new to the original Deerhorn Valley Fire Station built by the community on land donated by Paul & Diane Jacob. It faithfully served there for over 20 years until San Diego Rural Fire was taken over by the San Diego County Fire Authority administered by Cal-Fire after the Harris Fire.

headed the restoration that resulted in its current like new condition. The colorful logo the "DVCA" uses today was developed for that ceremony and then gifted to the community.

YOUR COMMUNITY NEEDS YOU!

We've moved through so many changes— in earlier days we focused on our quest for a Fire Station and Community Center. We survived the Harris Fire, rebuilt, and got through Lockdown and Pandemic. Now there are some things we'd love to bring back, and YOU are the most important part!

We've learned how to meet without a fire station. Neighbors step up to open their properties for various events: McKinley's Field, Bradford Ranch, Jacob's Barn, McNeil's Field, Hazpaca Ranch, VechieOso Winery, and Deerhorn Vineyards for starters. Folks have offered their homes for Steering Committee meetings. We've needed to be bit more creative— but it's working.

There are voices out there who would love to have some groups to share with again: Riders, Hikers, Native Plant Lovers, Gardening, etc. Updating and republishing the Old DV Cookbook is a project in waiting.

Riding your horse in 100-degree temperatures is never good...for you or your horse. But you can get out early enough to Hollenbeck Canyon (Parking Lot SR94 and Honey Springs) as early as dawn. We've found temperatures as low as 65 at the beginning of the ride, and with only a short 1-hour loop ride, we're back at the trailer still under 80 degrees. We've each paid the \$32 Annual Land Pass, and it is well worth it.

The Jamul-Dulzura Community Planning Group (JDCPG) is ALWAYS up to something big in our community, and they need more community input! Recently, JDCPG helped to organize the (Rural) County Planning Groups into a cohesive voice: the Association of Planning Groups. Now, the APG has a seat on SANDAG, and will hopefully soon be a voting member. This could mean more money for local roads.

Of course, the biggest current agenda item for JDCPG is the Jamul Indian Land Transfer Act, HR6443, sponsored by Rep. Darrell Issa and Sen. Alex Padilla. Four parcels including the Barrett House and the Simpson Farms Subdivision would come off our tax rolls. This act would bypass the Federally recognized process to transfer land that normally engages the local community and the County Board of Supervisors to resolve conflicts involving land use and ensuring public safety. Why does Jamul always get treated as the poor stepchild? More involvement and local voices are needed. Ignoring the issues and "letting them play out as they will" won't increase your well-being. Check the Shopper's calendar and notices by the JDCPG; You can make a Real difference.

Hopefully, in the coming months, I will alert you in advance to Community Events, Please, make a point to get involved with this wonderful community.

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



County of San Diego E-News Climate Action News - Butterfly Habitat Guide

As an integral component of our ecosystem, butterflies rely on native plants for food, shelter, and reproduction. By selecting the appropriate plants and cultivating a hospitable environment, residents can play a significant role in supporting local butterfly and wildlife species and promoting biodiversity. Together, we can create a network of thriving butterfly habitats throughout San Diego County, contributing to the long-term health and resilience of our local ecosystems. The County of San Diego is in the process of creating the Butterflies Habitat Conservation Plan and the Native Landscape Program.

Both of these pursuits are on a regional scale and go hand in hand with creating diverse conservation within the San Diego County region. This guide provides information on host species that can be planted to create habitat for several butterfly species found in San Diego County. Additional butterflies and their host plants can be found using the California Butterflies and Native Host Plants database provided by the California Native Plant Society.
