Who knows at this point.

I can't recall Penny ever receiving heartworm treatment or the FHO surgery that she was said to need in her post. And after a year, Penny is unaccounted for, no updates, nothing. The usual for this "rescue".

It's no coincidence that the puppies taken in from Louisiana were adopted fairly quickly but the adult dogs, Penny being one, still sit and wait. All the while multiple new, small dogs, puppies and even kittens have been brought into the program, treated for their medical needs and adopted.

Why don't the pit bulls and large dogs matter?

This is just one more example of the sick, twisted things that happen in the world of rescue. The things that somehow have become "the norm" or acceptable because of the over population problem.

Penny is a 3 years old female, with an adorable white and beautiful brindle coat. She is good with other dogs and full of love to give! Her temp foster reports that she does well with dogs off all sizes. She is a vocal player, but not aggressive at all. The beautiful girl is also crate trained and house broken.

Unfortunately, Penny is heartworm positive and so needs FHO (hip) surgery

she already has, so we need to get her scheduled for surgery soon. Proper aftercare for FHO is critical to ensure that Penny makes a full recovery. Penny also needs to undergo heartworm treatment.
