Container Deposit Scheme

Thanks to the community's contributions, the group has saved 8,164 containers from landfill, raising \$816.40. Funds continue to support the group's activities and facilities.

Storage Container

During June 2024 we installed a 40 foot container storage unit at the rear of the Hall - thanks to Reis Hamilton and the office of Dr Monique Ryan, Member for Kooyong for facilitating the grant to make this possible.

First Aid Training

In June leaders completed a refresher first aid training course, further enhancing safety for both the Scout group and the local community. A special thanks to Gwyn and Leon from [Community First Responders](#) for leading the course and the donation of a cabinet for our AED attached to the outside of our Hall, available for public use. The password to access the AED is "1924" – a nod to the year the Hall was built. We have registered 72 youth and 25 leaders / helpers as of 10th October 2024.

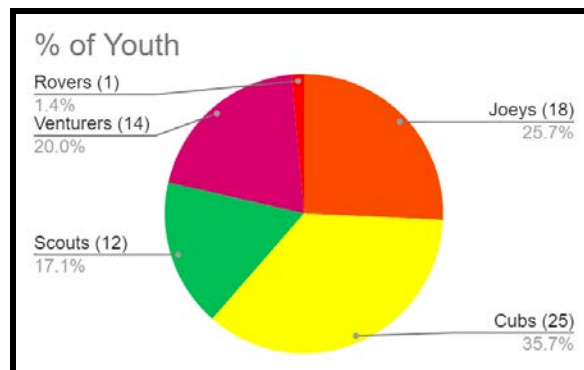

Scout Section Report

Choose your own adventure

1st Canterbury Scouts can take you to a hike in the Tallarook State Forest with 1000 other Scouts one weekend to the cheers and laughter of a packed theatre the next. Adventures can be local using payphones for clues to spend exploring the rolling green hills of New Zealand for a Jamboree. Scouts can develop confidence and leadership skills by organising a simple game and then bring those skills to life when they participate in a Personal Development Course like BSummit. Our program is created by the Unit Council of Scouts with the support of the amazing leaders we have in our Group.

Throughout the year our program is a mix of some key activities that provide the Scouts with a wide variety of opportunities to try and enhance their skills. We expand the range of activities by sharing details of Scout's Victoria's numerous specialist events, including, Climbing, Cycling, Performing Arts, Survival, Paddling etc



There is plenty of room for fun and games and we love it when Scouts introduce a new one, but they certainly do have their favourites.

Each week our Unit Council of Youth members create a fun and exciting program of activities, within the guidance provided by Scouting. There has been an activity for everyone, from practical First Aid and cooking skills, to caving and climbing in Cheltenham! Scouts have used simple tools like rope and timber to create bridges and learnt navigational skills with a compass and a map. Sometimes the best memories are created by just hanging out with friends outdoors.

The creativity of our Scouts and Leaders has no boundaries, and often the Scouts don't even realise they have just learnt a new skill for life as they were having too much fun.

It's easy to teach a Scout basic navigation skills, but they learn just as much (and have more fun) when the night's activity is based on the TV show Hunted! Scouts were dropped around local streets with a map showing Payphones. On reaching the payphone they were provided a phone number for their next clue. All the time they were told not to use MYKI and avoid CCTV! to avoid being found by the Hunters! The night was completed with 4th Kew Scouts who were invited by our Scouts who have formed friendships at Showtime and events like Scout Hike.

In November our Scouts joined the rest of the Group at Bay Park in Mt Martha, camping and participating in fun activities. This camp provides other sections a sneak peak of what Scouts get up to and means for those Cubs about to transition to Scouts they will know some friendly faces when they arrive!

When the days get longer our program often makes the most of the daylight, one of the highlights each year is Bike Maintenance Skills followed by a cycling night. Travelling home via train is always fun too.

In December Sasha, Caitlin, Han and Paxton headed to Mystery Creek Events Centre as part of the Australian Contingent to the 23rd New Zealand Jamboree.

January Holidays were also a chance for Scouts to complete their Adventurous Journey, and this year Oscar and Tess planned and completed with other Scouts a traverse of the Two Bays Walking Track from Cape Schanck to Dromana. Thanks to the Leaders who supported and even dropped in some Tim Tams!

Scouts this year enjoyed Luke's interactive Trivia Night, creative cooking nights, games nights, Karaoke (who knew we had so many great singers?), Rock climbing with the Scout Climbing Team, Annual Waterslide night in Canterbury Gardens, constructing catapults and firing flour bombs, first aid nights just to name a few. We are also pleased that after a great night Bowling, we returned the Trophy to 1st Canterbury to be proudly displayed till next year!

Our program follows the National Achievement Pathways which is Scouting's personal progression framework - used to recognise personal development in the Scout program. Each week Scouts complete a variety of Milestones, Special Interest Areas, and the most exciting Outdoor Adventure Skills. This progress is tracked through the online platform Terrain, Scouts manage their own progress tracking.



If a Scout completes a specific number of activities, Special Interest Areas and a certain level of Outdoor Adventure Skills they can complete the Peak Award for Scouting, known as the "Australian Scout Award". In the last year we have added two more names to the 1st Canterbury Honour Board with Eamon Newell and Oscar Wallis completing all the requirements of the Award.

Some of our current Scouts are not too far from this achievement, keep working towards your goals.



Over Easter several of our Scouts joined Han on her Adventurous Journey. Planned and led by Han, Scouts rode over 120 km in 3 days from Mansfield to Tallarook, camping at Merton Racecourse and in the Yea Caravan Park. The route was spectacular and followed the old railway line all the way, including through the long Cheviot Tunnel. Despite weary legs and some rain on day 2 the Scouts were all smiles and enjoyed being in the beautiful scenery of Central Victoria.

Even more amazing at Easter was the Governor General's Camp – the first of its kind on the lawns of Yarralumla in the ACT. Keira joined with 1st Canterbury Joeys and Cubs for this unique opportunity to participate in a camp that also included an Amazing Race, horseback adventures, mastering the art of archery, and exploring iconic Aussie landmarks like Parliament House, Questacon, and the War Memorial.

Our Scouts continued the annual tradition of Camping at our Hall on ANZAC Eve and then at 5 am, waking, getting into uniform and attending the Surrey Hills Dawn Service. It is great for the local community to see our Scouts at this event as they have done for over 100 years. Listening to the stories of local men and women who participated in war provides a strong link to our community and not a year goes by where someone comes up to Scouts in Uniform to talk about their time in Scouting.

Our weekly program also supports upcoming activities, each May our Scouts participate alongside over 1000 other Scouts in the Victoria Wide Scout Hike event.

In the lead up to the event Scouts will practise and prepare for this amazing event in the Tallarook State Forest. The program will focus on Navigation, First Aid, Lightweight camping and cooking to prepare the Scouts for this weekend of fun.



In 1st Canterbury Leaders from all sections ran an Activity Point. This year for the theme of *Paddle Steamers* we were the Port of Wentworth. Scouts who attended our activity were asked to prepare an act for the traditional "Wentworth's Got Talent". The creativity of the hundreds of Scouts who visited us during the weekend was sensational, considering the walking and lack of sleep many of them put on great smiles and entertainment.

Congratulations to our Scouts who continued a fine tradition of great hiking skills, one of our Patrols has now completed 3 Scout Hikes together were awarded the highest award – Co-Holder and the Pennant hangs proudly on the wall of The Gunyah. Our first-time hikers also kicked off what will become a tradition for them, we are so proud of your achievements.



Scouts have also participated in the annual BSummit Personal Development Course on 2 occasions in the last 12 months. Each event is held at a mystery location with Scouts meeting at Camberwell Railway Station with no idea where they are heading. One graduate, Han enjoyed it so much she now attends as a Youth Mentor for the weekend.

One of the most involved extra activities each year is Camberwell Showtime, now in its 60th year of production (58 Shows). One of only a few Scout Shows that is entirely created, written and performed by Scouts. In 2024 four of our Scouts performed in one of the funniest shows in years – Camp Chaos, Sasha, Caitlin, Kieran (and a Venturer – Angus) returned for their 3rd season and were joined by Kiera, Lily and Caleb for their first performances, all shone on stage this year. They were supported by Showtime life member, Luke Dixon in his 27th Show as part of the Technical Team, and our Leaders Sam Barden and David Egan in the Personnel Team.



Whilst many see one performance of the eight, our Scouts spend many weekends rehearsing and preparing for the brand-new theatre in 2024 – The Round in Nunawading. It was great for them to see so many 1st Canterbury Scouts and their families in attendance this year. In the recent School Holidays, Sasha, Caitlin, Kieran and Angus once again performed the show alongside a new bunch of Scouts from

the Geelong Region in Geelong Showtime. Supporting them again were Luke Dixon, Sarah Haines, Peter Haines and David Egan.

So what did you do in the last school holidays? A quick survey of our Scouts goes something like this,

Han – *I attended Top Gear Scout at the Mafeking Scout Park and learned to drive a car*

Kieran, Sasha, Caitlin – *We went to Geelong and performed in Geelong Showtime*

Kieran, Nick, Han, Phoebe and Caleb – *We went to Clifford Park for a 4 day camp where we got to try Abseiling, Paddle on the Yarra, Cooked dinner in a cardboard box, met new and old friends and watched the Grand Final*

We sure have squeezed a lot into the last year, and it's worth remembering that each night and event is led and assisted by Scouts with our Leaders providing support. This provides each Scout who volunteers to take on the task with some first-hand experience of planning, teaching, leading and learning. During the last year we have observed many of the Scout's step outside of their comfort zone and put their hand up to lead and assist and the results were awesome! We are smaller in numbers currently but continue to welcome new members who hear about all the fun we get up to.



As I close off on the last 12 months of Scouting at 1st Canterbury, I reflect on my first 5 years as a Leader in the Scout Section. I've now seen a full turnover of youth members as they progress through to Venturers but are followed quickly by new and excited Cubs. The growth we see in each youth member is amazing, and I know from my time as a youth member that the confidence and knowledge they gain from Scouting will help them for the rest of their lives. The friendships they make and the memories from all the adventures and activities will last well beyond their time in the Section. As Leaders we love watching their journey and providing them with the support to choose their own adventures.

I would like to thank all the amazing Scout Leaders (Reis Hamilton, Luke Dixon, Toby Rechner, Mark Marriot, Violet Burgess and adult helper Peter Haines) for their time and support over the last year. In addition to our regular Scout activities, our volunteer Leaders have continued to progress their own training, update their First Aid qualifications, and prepare themselves to provide our Scouts with the support and encouragement they need to develop and grow. At the Hall, on a bike ride or a camp or hike our Leaders continue to support our Scouts to achieve their goals, while having fun. We would love you to come and find your passion and join us supporting our Youth Members.

I'd like to acknowledge the work Paul Baulch has done this year and wish him and David Scott well as they prepare to take our Scouts to the 2025 Australian Jamboree in January. An Australian Jamboree is a once in a lifetime opportunity to travel with fellow Scouts from Australia and the World and participate in 10 days of amazing adventures and fun, this year the 26th Australian Jamboree is being held in Maryborough QLD. Activities include a trip to Australia Zoo, A full day of water activities at Hervey Bay, and numerous half day activities designed to give Scouts a chance to try new adventures of their choice. We know from experience the Scouts you welcome home from a Jamboree are different to those that left

10 days earlier, some even come home and offer to cook and wash up! We wish Han, Kieran, Evan, Lily and Caleb all the very best. We know we have prepared you to tackle everything and anything you want to.

Financial Report

We finished the financial year ending 30 June 2024 with a deficit of \$747. This can be attributed to a payment made in June for Jamboree for one of our leaders - leader fees for Jamboree are covered by fundraising activities and we will be doing more towards Jamboree fundraising in the next few months. We had a total bank balance of \$29,115 which was \$290 better than the previous year.

Our revenue collected from your membership fees was \$2,000 lower this year, which is our main source of revenue. Our fundraising activities from the Monster Raffle and Bunnings BBQs raised nearly \$4,000 which is double what we raised last year; well done and thank you to Dee and those involved in fundraising. We also received \$1,500 more in Grants and Donations than we did in FY23, so thank you to Jane and those involved in our grants and donations.

Of course, we hosted the 100th Anniversary of the Scout Hall, which saw some one-off expenses as well as revenue and some of the grant revenue mentioned. Thank you to the City of Boroondara and the Balwyn Rotary Club for their grants which supported this event.

Our expenses this year were largely the same as last year, with no major purchases to account.

We acknowledge and thank our Bankers of choice, Canterbury Community Bank who have also provided us with grant monies which will go towards camping equipment.

Thank you again to our Committee members, leaders, and all involved to make Scouts happen. I volunteered to be on the Committee as my way of participating and giving back. As they say - it takes a village to raise a child - and I'm very pleased to be part of this village.
