Bochatey Foundation holds that many of our society's ills can be repaired and healed by including all subjects in our lives and education. Hillsdale College in Michigan is a very old school that still

teaches history, philosophy, literature, etc. You may not know that recently they have developing similar curricula for k-12 schools and helping establish new schools across the country. During the pandemic it became obvious that these resources were also desperately needed by public school teachers, home schoolers. ESL schoolers, adult ed and a

myriad of other providers. That is the effort we are especially trying to support in a small way.

MarketPlace for Kids

How do fourth graders decide what they want to be when they grow up? Why do they even stay in school if they don't have a vision of someone they want to be like or curiosity to do what interests them? If they've never seen it, how do they know it's available?

MarketPlace for Kids in North Dakota is dedicated to giving them that vision, that curiosity, by traveling to 12 school locations every year and presenting a "Show'n'Tell" of jobs to over 6000 3rd-8th grade students. During the day students are exposed to various STEAM jobs by doing them, guided by people who do the job every day. There are sessions in how to handle your money, safety issues, agriculture, building circuit boards and electrical motors, Navajo communication/culture and development of trade in the area.

MPK also helps the kids build and submit inventions and new business ideas to the "Hall of Great Ideas". It's like SharkTank for preteens. www.marketplaceforkids.org

Breaking Barriers for Incarcerated

In Utah, where the rate of incarcerated citizens is up more than 1000% since 1970, we need a new solution to help incarcerated individuals change their lives. Breaking Barriers has had great success helping such individuals, post incarceration, to get into and stay in the local Community College through certification and job stability. It is an easy answer, but it takes many resources. Keeping a person in Community College who has spent probably years in and out of the justice system requires housing, jobs, food, counseling how to access help, tutoring, attention to learning disabilities or autism, support groups, emotional counseling, daycare and more to stay in class. EmPAWerment Esport

You may think we are ultra conservative, but occasionally we see a risk that is worth taking. This fall I spoke with EmPawerment Esport who is trying to leap into the future of learning and financial aid. While EmPAWerment has a successful ongoing tutor and emotional support program

for local youth in Kansas, they want to try something new and innovative which I'd never heard of before.

Colleges now build competitive E-sport teams (just like hockey and football) who compete with other colleges around the country in digital gaming such as Fortnite, Counter-Strike and Rainbow Six. Illinois State, Loyola, and Boise State are a few who offer E-Sport scholarships to help or completely pay for college tuition. We can't ignore this, but evidently girls are being largely ignored and left behind as candidates for these types of scholarships. Girls don't have the game experience, collaboration, and killer instinct that boys are getting during their preteen and teen years. From the new Director, Dr Kelly: "It's been an amazing year. In August, we kicked off 2 new impactful programs: Diagnostic Service evaluations [which are so lacking in the system] and our Transition Program for 18-21 with Autism [totally unserved]. It gives them the opportunity to engage with various employers via the Neurodiversity Chamber

of Commerce while we increase their skillchest and continue to support behavioral development as they transition into adulthood. We are also partnering with the Chickasaw Nation providing training and resources to their Pediatric Behavioral Health teams serving over 80 Chickasaw families this year." www.fireflyautism.com www.dcndcc.org
