Reflection: Hidden Potentials in Human Choice

Choice is a gift. I love making my own decisions. Free will is such a great gift. It is a participation in the dignity with which God has endowed the human person. Even when circumstances restrict our movement or limit our opportunities, the interior sanctuary of the mind remains free. Within that hidden chamber, thoughts and desires are formed. It is there that creativity and moral discernment take root. Every outward action is first conceived inwardly. The seat of choice is the birthplace of destiny.

Consider saints such as Padre Pio, Saint Mungo, and Saint Margaret of Scotland. Think of that faithful person who once warmed the pews of our parish, or that kind young person you know who lives across the street. Everything you love about them began in their minds and in their choices. They had other options, but they chose to think positively and act on those thoughts. Every day, they chose love over hate, forgiveness over grudges, and kindness over cruelty. They chose to watch their words and turn away from gossip, greed, and selfishness. Holiness is the disciplined exercise of freedom in favour of the good.

Sirach 5:16 says, “If you wish, you can keep the commandments. To behave faithfully is within your power.” Scripture does not deny the reality of temptation and personal struggles. Rather, it affirms something fundamental. That obedience is within the reach of every human person. God has not created us as prisoners of instinct or victims of inevitability. He has entrusted to us genuine freedom. Sirach continues: “He has set before you fire and water; to whichever you choose, stretch out your hand.” The imagery is stark. Fire can warm or destroy; water can refresh or overwhelm. Life and death, blessing and curse, stand before us. With freedom comes responsibility, because every act has consequences. Parents shape the first years of a child’s life through countless daily decisions. A young person, standing at the threshold of adulthood, determines the direction of their future through their choices. Even the seemingly small decisions, to speak kindly, to bridle the tongue, to resist envy, quietly shape character and community.

The word of God reassures us: “He has not commanded anyone to be godless.” God does not entice us into sin, nor does He abandon us to moral confusion. Rather, He grants the grace necessary to choose what is good, true and life-giving. God has placed within the human heart the capacity for wisdom and self-restraint. Freedom, therefore, is not license to follow every impulse. It is the strength to choose what leads to life.

I am grateful today for the gift of free will. Encouraged by the lives of the saints, I will think and act well. *So help me God.* Will you join in this short prayer?
