The Exaltation of the Holy Cross Sunday, 14th of September, 2025.

1st Reading: Num 21:4b-9

If a serpent bit anyone, they would look at the bronze serpent and live.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 78

Never forget the deeds of the Lord.

2nd Reading: Philippians 2: 6-11

He humbled himself, therefore, God has highly exalted him.

Gospel: John 3: 13-17

The Son of Man must be lifted up.

Reflection: Why Exalt in the Cause of Shame?

The ancient Romans were masters of many things, including arts, poetry, architecture, oppression, covetousness, and licentiousness. They were also skilled in the art of torture, brutality, and public humiliation. Among their cruellest inventions, crucifixion was perfected as a punishment that combined physical torment with maximum societal shame.

A condemned person, already beaten beyond recognition, was forced to carry two heavy beams, usually set at right angles, over a long distance towards the city gate. Stripped naked and nailed to the cross, the criminal was left to die in agony while passers-by looked on. This was not only a warning to anyone daring to resist Roman authority, but also a lasting disgrace to the family of the crucified. Crucifixion was considered the most dreadful of deaths, the very height of evil.

Yet God allowed evil to do its worst to His Son, Jesus Christ, by allowing Jesus to be nailed on the Cross. What seemed like the final triumph of darkness was in fact the very means by which God revealed His saving power. By raising Jesus from the dead, the Father showed that the Cross was not a defeat but the moment of victory. What the world regarded as shame became the throne of glory, and what looked like failure became the source of life for all who believe.

On the Cross, Jesus bore the weight of human sin. All that is evil in us was nailed there with Him. Yet God transformed the Cross into the very instrument of salvation for the human race and all creation. Through the Cross, we who were dead in sin have been given new life in Christ. Through the Cross, we are saved from slipping into eternal loss and damnation (**Salvation**). Through the Cross, Jesus paid the price for our sins with His life (**Redemption**). On the Cross, Christ offered Himself as the sacrifice of expiation, reconciling humanity to God (**Atonement and Reconciliation**). Through the Cross, God declares sinners righteous, not by our own merit, but by faith in Christ and by the grace flowing from the sacrifice of Jesus (**Justification**). By the Cross, the chains of sin, death,

and the devil are broken, setting us free (Liberation). On the Cross, Christ triumphed over the powers of darkness and gained the ultimate Victory (**Christus Victor**). Through Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross, we are made children of God and heirs of His kingdom (**Adoption**).

As Jesus himself said: "When I am lifted up, I will draw all people to myself." Let us, then, exalt the Cross of Christ, for in it we enter into the fullness of God's mercy and saving love.
