Stroud's Run State Park



The weather couldn't have been much better – for the prehike or the hike. After weeks of snow and frigid temperatures, the prehike and hike both were made in 60-degree temperatures. A prehike date of only one week earlier was called off due to forecasts of seven-degree temperatures and 10 inches of snow the day before. Many of the 24 hikers had never hiked this section of Stroud's Run State Park, or the adjacent parcels of Strouds Ridge Preserve, Sells Park and Riddle State Nature Preserve that we crossed. The route gave hikers awesome views of caves, waterfalls and other rock formations, as well as of parking lots and tar roofs of one of Athens' commercial districts in the valley below. Following the six-mile hike, we reconvened at the nearby Bob Evans restaurant for conversation and repast.

Blendon Woods Metro Park

The winter weather relented a bit, tempting 31 hikers out of their warm homes for a five-mile tramp around Blendon Woods Metro Park. A.W. Marion State Park

In the midst of a harsh winter, the 19 hikers who headed out for the five-mile trek around Hargus Lake at A.W. Marion State Park were blessed with warm weather. However, record snowfalls and warm temperatures usually equal wet conditions, and this day in the section of Pickaway County known as "The Devils's Backbone" followed form. In fact, the waters were so high, the group was only able to hike about three-quarters of the way around the lake before being forced to return along the route by which it had arrived. The lake, still 95 percent frozen over, was showing signs of thawing under a sunny sky. After the hike, the group enjoyed some great cooking at Goodwin's Family Restaurant in Circleville.

Great Seal State Park

The bitter temperatures and recent snowfalls kept the number of hikers down to only nine, but those nine were treated with a day of spectacular winter wonderland views of Great Seal State Park. The 4-6 inches of snowcover and the trees were capped with a quarter-inch of ice, and the clear February skies allowed the sunlight to turn the forest into a sparkling chandelier. The small crew followed parts of the Mt. Ives, Lick Run, Shawnee Ridge and Bunker Hill trails, electing not to extend the hike with an additional mile or so of optional trail. The hikers headed down the steep hillside to the trailhead and then motored into Chillicothe to the Ponderosa Steakhouse for dinner.

Highbanks Metro Park

April 11-13, 2014 Dick and Jeanne Barbee, coordinators



Thanks to everyone who made this banquet another successful COHC event!



Tidbits from the Trail ...


COHC members share some memories from other days on other trails ...

Michael Bankiewicz, escaping Europe: '1943. It was a very grim period.'



At the annual Spring Banquet, COHC member Michael Bankiewicz spoke about some of his experiences escaping occupied Europe during WWII. Here are some excerpts:

STARTING POINT: Before I talk about hiking, I'll tell you about the situation. It was WWII, and the Germans were rounding up Jews and killing them. It was dangerous for me and I had to leave. I was in Eastern Poland in the region of Lithuania. Our area was occupied by Russians until 1942, when the Germans attacked the Russians in Operation Barbarosa. I volunteered to work in Germany. I picked a factory near the German border, because I planned to escape. It was a factory where we built bombers.

IN FRANCE: 1943 was a very grim period. We were worried, we were hungry, and we were shot for no reason. I was in a hotel with a half a thousand soldier types, and I was the youngest in the room. I supplied them with wine. The message came from England for the general evacuation. The Germans were rounding up the Poles.


INTO THE MOUNTAINS: We got directions to a Spanish city in the eastern foothills of the Pyrenees. We went overnight by train to Foix. Our guide spoke Catalan

and led us up to a farm and put us in a chicken coop. I was 19 then. I was rich – two loaves of French bread and a bottle of mineral water.

Our guide led us up into the mountains. I was very fit. I had spent the summer as a porter for the French underground. We walked about 50 miles from Foix to Andorra along grassy hills. In late August, we walked down into the valley to cross a stream. We were in a line about a quarter of a mile long, with the donkey in the back. The Catalan guide and the people in the mountains were there for the money.

TO SAFE HAVEN: We hiked down out of the mountains and bypassed Andorra. We met a large truck. Squished like sardines and, covered with a ground sheet, we were taken to Barcelona. Taxis took us to the British Embassy, where they told us, "You're now on British soil, and you have the protection of King George V."

EPILOGUE: From Spain, I got to England. I traveled to Canada in 1952 and spend 14 years there as a research chemist and then came here to America.
