

Dear Family,

Hard to believe that our district meeting came so quickly this week and now it is over. It was interesting to observe our ZL's attempt to disseminate information they picked up in their Mission Leadership Council during a joint meeting prior to our regular district meetings. (Keep in mind, the MLC is the meeting they fly to in Cape Town and stay for about 1 1/2 days. An expensive meeting to say the least.) With the 12 missionaries we had there this morning, the ZL's mentioned maybe 4 things we need to be mindful of in our daily work. Those items combined might have taken a maximum of 5 to 10 minutes of time. And, they kind of stumbled through their little presentation. Bottom line: We do not think the "water is getting to the end of the row."

Mom and I need to be patient and

remember these missionaries are 19-20 years old. However, it just seems that they could be a lot better prepared and all the missionaries should be taking their callings more responsibly.

Mom had her music classes today and I was set to go out with a fellow-shipper to visit some members. On my way to pick up the fellow-shipper, I had a phone call from our missionaries in King Williams Town. One of the Elders there fainted. This is about his 5th time since he has been on his mission, roughly 3 to 4 months. He called the mission president and was advised to come into East London to see a doctor.

I cancelled my meeting with the fellow-shipper and drove to the clinic. He had a battery of tests performed and about 3 hours later we were all leaving the clinic. All his tests were normal. (However, he told me his

A1c test came up as an *8". That translates into about an average blood sugar reading of 183 for the last 3 months.) He will get a Cat Scan on Tuesday and then, back to see the doctor.

They had a ways to travel to get home so we ran them by McDonald's for a quick bite to eat. FYI, I did not eat anything there. I think their deep-fried food has a seriously bad after taste. You need an industrial strength degreaser product after eating there.

Looking over this email, it seems rather negative. I will end with a positive note. We had a very good discussion in our district meeting about using the scriptures when we teach. This is important to demonstrate credibility and to introduce the Book of Mormon as another witness of Jesus Christ.

7. If I were you(Advice to grand kids): If I were you, I would read all of the conference talks when they become available in the Ensign. Try it. I think you will like it.


8. What I learned: 20 % of the missionaries create 80% of the problems with which a mission president must deal. (My qualitative observation.)

Immediately after the funeral and all had left the chapel and cultural hall, a group of about 10 boys came in with blue latex gloves and a vacuum cleaner. While two vacuumed the chapel the other boys jumped right

in and started putting away all the chairs.

Dear Ones,

It is raining again today. I love it since we are home and it cools things down abit.

We are now down to 2 months before we leave East London, but who is counting. Actually I am counting because I am trying to finish up some things and trying to figure out how to get it done as our time winds down. We have started to give away a few things and are deciding what we need to do at our house to have it scrubbed and ready for the next tenant whoever that is and whenever they come. It does not matter how thoroughly I clean each week when I scrub floors and dust and wipe down the baseboards etc the next week there are spider webs and small spiders. They do not bother us other than they are there. They look like small daddy-long-legs with white bodies. Friday as I cleaned the kitchen floor I wiped under the counters because whether I see a spiderweb or not I always see a few spiders escaping my cleaning. Too bad for them 4 at least met there demise. The wind blows in dust

each day so if the new resident does not come the day we leave they will think we have not cleaned for a week or so. They will learn about that after they have been here for a while. Maybe it is that way everywhere that dust and dirt just accumulates on horizontal surfaces. Probably so. Sister Faku gave the opening prayer in our Sacrament meeting today and one of the things she said was "we pray that the things we hear today will stay in our ears." I will miss hearing such prayers. They are simple and meaningful. Chris has or will mention in the update that we went to a funeral yesterday. We were told by the family that the funeral would begin at 10:00, Bishop Jada told the family the day before that "our funerals begin at 9:00". We were not able to get to the church until 9:15 and we were one of the first to arrive. Bishop Lalendle was at the building and had started to set up chairs in the overflow area so we helped with that and then the mourners began to arrive. At about 10:00 Bishop Jada asked if I would please help with the music. So he gave me the songs he wanted to sing. I looked at the program but it was written in Xhosa and I could not de-

cipher that any songs were apart of the program. I was able to find a YSA women who would be willing to lead the songs. She did her best but I could not follow her beat. She left the funeral before it was over and one of the missionaries stepped up and did the leading about halfway through the first verse of the last song. People were walking in and out throughout the service. A couple of women at different times started to sing a song and expected that others would join in, The first one was shushed before she got on more than a line or two. A bit later another woman in the overflow started singing and many of the congregation would parrot what she sang. It was beautiful but again it was in Xhosa so I did not understand the words. She stood up and started clapping and really getting into it and a few others stood and a lady behind her started waving her hands over her head and it looked like the singing was going to hijack the service. Bishop Jada stood at the microphone and after a couple of minutes it quieted down and we think he explained that in our church services that was not acceptable and to

please follow along with the program. (we are making an assumption at that because he spoke in Xhosa only) The church policy is that if the funeral is in the chapel that it is to be conducted in the respectful, reverent way that any church meeting is held. Very different than the way most of the churches conduct their services in the township. Our mission President calls them the "happy, clappy" churches. As I was scanning the congregation for a physical reaction it seemed by some faces that they might be offended or could not un-

derstand why they could not do what they are used to doing. Bishop Jada told the congregation that he would be happy to speak with any one after the meeting and explain more about church doctrine. I do wish that after two years I understood more of the language but I have to admit that I have not made a good study of it. I am able to pronounce a few names better now that I was when we first came but many are still very difficult for me. Most of the church members that attended the funeral sat on the stand in the choir seats and I wondered if the congregation

thought they were the only ones who were supposed to sing the songs because it did not look like many if any were using the hymn books. We have attended many funerals since we have been here. It seems like there are one or two each month or more. I am sure I have shared that thought before but that is what we do at our age. That was a much longer version than what Dad would write. I kind of like the details but I know too much detail can also bore some people. Hope you all have a lovely week of spring.

As we drove this morning, Mom was reading from "The Covenant" on her Kindle. It was telling the story of some of the early settlers in and around Grahamstown and the incredibly bloody wars they experienced with the indigenous Xhosa tribes. The time period was around 1836 and the native tribes were referred to as the Kaffir..

William Holmes Walker appeared in Grahamstown around 1854. It was a time when there was a large population of British immigrants and soldiers. The Dutch, who originally established the area, were pretty much pushed out by the British and moved North. It was in and around Grahamstown that WHW had some

moderate success.

WHW baptized Brother and Sister Green whose ancestor was our Home Teacher in Huntsville, Glen Deem. He also baptized Brother and Sister Roper. They had a lot of land, cattle, sheep and buildings. When the sea captains banded together and denied any "Mormons" passage on their ships to migrate to Utah, it was Brother Roper who sold all of his belongings, purchased a ship and hired a captain and crew to sail all the saints to England and then, to Utah.

I also find it interesting that WHW travelled all over the Eastern Cape and never made mention of the abundant wild life - lions, snakes, boars, etc. He did share his experience of once exploring a cave and then, upon exiting the cave was surrounded by 60+ "sassy" baboons. Fortunately, he made it to his horse

and escaped without incident. Also, even though he talked about going into Kaffir land, he never mentioned any kind of problems with the Xhosa natives.

I continued my project of fixing one of our dining room chairs. As with so many things in life, as you get into the task, you see that there are other things you can do and better ways to work toward a successful end. That's okay. I think part of our life is to learn just like that. We watch, observe, ponder, and eventually act on how we think we should do some-

thing. Then, we learn even more because we have actually acted.

President Lebethoa teaches the missionaries about the learning cycle. First we learn through study, then we act, then we share. When we can effectively share the information and experience, we have truly learned. (I call it "LDS" - learn, do, share.)

I met with our auto body friends this morning. They are good people and very helpful. I have spoken with the mission president and our mission fleet manager about how to run work through their business even when the amount is a little higher than the amount where it should go to the AIG Insurance. Basically, we can average the cost of repairs over various cars to always remain under \$500 USD. This way we get our cars repaired quickly, at a fair price and with quality workmanship. The auto body shop ends up with a steady

customer and the wages they need to make the profit they need. This will greatly help us.

Anything major, serious vehicle damage, we would send to AIG.

The map project is underway. We should have about 10 - 12 large maps printed off and in color by tomorrow afternoon. We will then cut and paste them onto poster board for each companionship. Then, they will be laminated. We should have them ready for wall hanging for each companionship by Wednesday of next

week.

Next week we start reading again with the Phakamile students. We are looking forward to being with them again.

Today, one of our missionaries came





I had to drive our ZL's and meet four other missionaries at the airport to hand out their passports.. I had to meet two other missionaries that were having some car issues. I needed to go to our work area to check on a house being repaired. I was terrified that Mom would go into the store and be there the whole day. Fortunately, she was in and out within 30 minutes! I was able to

meet all my appointments on time.

I took Mom home because she is not feeling well today - maybe a 24 hour bug of some sort. I say not enough chocolate in the diet.

The home that is getting repaired has two sets of windows and a bent door frame and door coming out. I had asked Sister George if I could have those old pieces of her house. I wanted to take them to Brother Shakes who is trying to build a shack behind their house for a place for him to live. Presently, it is him and four or five women in their two bedroom home.

To make a long story short, I was able to get some of the door and frame in the boot (trunk) of the car. I drove about two miles that way and everything stayed put. Shakes was very happy. Once we unloaded, we went to a "bottle store" and bought

some drinks, fat cakes and paloney (like bologna) for him, Phumlani and the three workers at the house. We dropped off the fat cakes and picked up the old front window and somehow got it in the boot of the car. Shakes is going to take one of the windows and Phumlani the other for his house.

That is all the good news. The bad news is that I had my white shirt missionary clothes on. Well, off came the tie and it was all elbows and back pockets from that point on. When I got home, my clothes were filthy, my

slacks had a small tear, I had cuts from the rusty metal, and, I had toe fungus.

This last Sunday, Mom met with a sister and after listening to what she had to say, was able to pass along some very good advice. Today I took some time to meet with a brother who has stopped coming to church. We hope these good people listen to what we have to say and feel of our testimonies. The Lord loves them and wants them back on the covenant path.

Late this afternoon, I took Mom to the Booi home. Mom is teaching Sister Booi how to knit. I took brother Booi to go run some errands. While we were driving down a road in the outskirts of NU 1, a lady was standing in the middle of the road holding her arm. As we approached, we could see that she was bleeding badly. I

rolled down the window, "Mama, are you okay?"

She said she had been cut by another lady who was up by the front of a house with some other people. The top of her right forearm looked as if it had been filleted. We had no idea what had transpired. I knew the local police station was just around a corner or two. We told her we would go notify the police. We found one lady police officer at the station. After explaining the situation, you would think they would dispatch a police car immediately. Folks, this is the South African Police we are talking about.

The police women was not too interested because she thought the scene was part of another station's area. She said we should go there. Unbelievable! We explained this lady was bleeding and needed medical attention right away. Still, not too quick to

become involved. I think it was quitting time or time for a change of the shift. We finally got her to call the other police station and attempt to send out someone. We also stressed the need for medical care. I would not want to bet any amount of money that the police or medical people came to the assistance of this lady.

Brother Booi talked to me about the inefficiencies and lack of help the police are. He had a brother that was falsely thought to have stolen from another local person. Someone said that there was a guy (Brother Booi's

brother) that looked like the robber and lived 1 to 2 kilometers away. The victim went to that location, found his brother, and, shot his brother point blank in the chest, killing him. He went to trial and was proven innocent.

Most people ignore the police and look to "street justice" as the best tool to punish offenders. Some times these street-court incidences result in deaths. Brother Booi mentioned that a community can be very brutal and harsh. He said they like to take immediate corrective action and ask

I am sure there are things we could have done to diffuse the problem.





And, she usually does not go to that work station where we met

her. She usually is buried in a storage room/office. She just happened to be there at the same time we showed up.

We were at the hospital for five hours as it was. The real bad news was that the doctors felt he does not need an MRI and that his situation cannot be helped. His spine is curved at such a horrific angle, the doctor was surprised he could even walk, use his legs at all, control bladder and bowel functions, etc. And, he mentioned to Shakes that things will not get better. He can expect to have more problems over the years and probably be in a wheelchair before he is 50.

We go back Monday for a second opinion with a spinal specialist.

Mom has put together a really neat recipe booklet that she will be giving out to members who want one. She

has a reputation as an expert baker/cook. We only printed up 20, but I am sure we will be handing out a lot more than that.







After multiple tries to make something to hold the bulb in place (because the original part was lost), several sleepless nights, a bleeding ulcer and spreading toe fungus due to stress, I came up with "Plan G." When all your ideas fail, resort back to supper glue and duct tape. So far, so good. I will know more tomorrow.

I had an interesting meeting with a construction company that built some pre-fab classrooms in Mdantsane. It was clear that pre-fab may not be a good approach as the municipality will only certify the classrooms for five years. Then, the re-inspect to see if they can provide another certification for an additional five years. The good news, they can also build the traditional

block classrooms. Just doing a little homework prior to returning home.

I took Brother Shakes to the doctor today. She was so crazy busy, she asked us to come back on Wednesday. Basically, at this point, Shakes needs to focus on pain management because surgery is out of the question.

Mom is staying busy with multiple requests for knitting, sewing, baking, etc. For example, the Young Women are interested in making some scripture carrying bags. Mom could probably sew up a prototype, but would not have the time to help them make 12 bags. And, of course, there are the cookie requests (one of which is from me for a doctor's office).

Here are some interesting tid bits of news from South Africa:

- The government employs ap-

proximately 2% of the population and spend 45% of collected taxes on salaries and wages. - Judge Anton Steenkamp of the Labour Court in Johannesburg was on holiday with his family in a remote part of Zambia. He was bitten by a Black Mamba and subsequently died. This is why Mom and I do not go tracting in remote jungles of South Africa. - The CEO's of the government owned airline and the government owned power company have resigned in the last two weeks. They complain of non-cooperation from the government in attempting to

turn around the financially-bleeding enterprises which have lost billions of Rand to malfeasance and mismanagement - that's with a "b" and it is plural. And we have people in the U.S. that want a socialistic government???

I had an interesting conversation with Mama Keya, an elderly lady in the MD 4th Ward. We were discussing some of the senior couples that had come through Mdantsane over the years. She said, you are all so kind, warm, loving, happy, spiritual and so on. Then, she said, "It's

A common problem in South Africa is a contractor receiving a draw for work to be done, and then, he disappears. You have to find someone with a history and good reputation. He recommended one to me that he has worked with several times and I will meet him tomorrow morning.
