SAINT OF THE WEEK

OUR LADY OF MT. CARMEL

Mount Carmel is the biblical site where the prophet Elias battled the 450 priests of Baal in a public spiritual contest which led to their defeat and ruin as Scriptures aptly recorded. It was also here where Elias sent his servant seven times to the mountaintop to look for rain after years of drought which ended as he proclaimed, "Behold a little cloud arose out of the sea like a man's foot."

The name "Carmel" means, in Hebrew (Hakkarmel), "the garden" or "the garden-land" because of its renowned lush and verdant beauty during ancient times.

The title of Our Lady of Carmel can be traced back to the hermits who used to live in the renowned and blessed mountain at the time of the Old Testament. There, this pious and austere community prayed in expectation of the advent of a Virgin-Mother who would bring salvation to mankind

much like the holy prophet Elias who ascended Mount Carmel to pray to God for the salvation of the Israel which was suffering a terrible drought at that time.

According to a long held and pious tradition, backed by Church Liturgy, a group of men devoted to the prophets Elias and Eliseus embraced Christianity on the day of Pentecost. They had been the disciples of St. John the Baptist, who prepared them for the coming of the Redeemer. This band of faithful left Jerusalem and settled on Mt. Carmel. There they erected a church dedicated to Our Lady on the same spot where Elias saw the little cloud which symbolized both fertility and the Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God.

It would take several centuries before historical and documental proof could be gathered as to the existence of hermits on Mount Carmel with spiritual links to the prophet Elias. The first concrete text dates back to 1177 through the writings of the Greek monk John Phocas.

The feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel was instituted by the Carmelites between 1376 and 1386 to celebrate the victory of their order over its enemies on obtaining the approbation of its name and constitution from Honorius III on 30 Jan., 1226. The feast was assigned to 16 July, because on that date in 1251, according to Carmelite traditions, the scapular was given by the Blessed Virgin to St. Simon Stock.

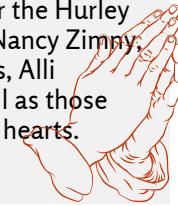

All donations are free!

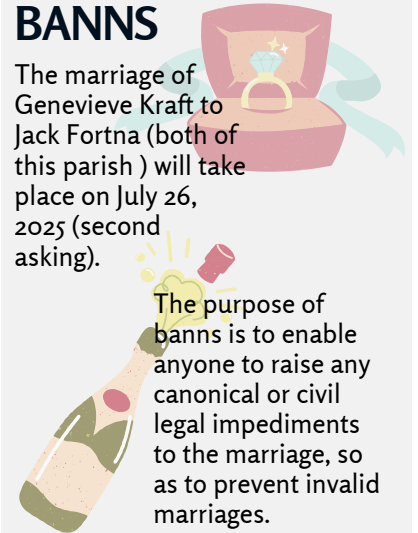
All unclaimed books must be picked up by August 3 or they will be donated.

BROWN SCAPULAR ENROLLMENT

On **Wednesday, July 16**, after the 6 pm Mass, there will be brown scapular enrollments. Brown scapulars will be provided or you can bring your own.

What is the brown scapular anyways? In the year 1251, in the town of Aylesford in England, Our Lady appeared to St. Simon Stock, a Carmelite. She handed him a brown woolen scapular and said, "This shall be a privilege for you and all Carmelites, that anyone dying in this habit shall not suffer eternal fire."

To be eligible for the scapular promise, one must be enrolled in the Brown Scapular Confraternity. Members have the added benefit of sharing in all the spiritual benefits of the Carmelite Order. The BVM assigned certain conditions which must be fulfilled: wear the Brown Scapular continuously; observe chastity according to one's state in life (married/single); recite daily the Little Office of the BVM or observe the fasts of the Church together with abstaining from meat on Wed. and Sat. or with permission of a priest, say five decades of Our Lady's Most Holy Rosary or with permission of a priest, substitute some other good work.
