Compassion extended by Americans

Historically, Americans have extended refuge, protection, and opportunity to newcomers. Compassion becomes fragile when it is **not reciprocal**.

When dehumanizing language persists against a host population, social trust erodes, resentment grows, and extremism increases across all groups.
