US Findings

Current cases are not covering the full extent of the problem. However, today there is a much more well-rounded understanding of terrorism and related events. Sadly, terrorism and extremism have become more mainstream, though this has also led to greater public recognition and assessment of these issues. Much terrorism is driven by ideology and race-based motivations.

News bias is a problem that must be confronted, like any war propaganda, especially where power and control exist, including among those with the financial and social means to cause significant harm to society. Recent public discussions have included prominent Russian, Jewish, Muslim, Hispanic, Chinese, BLM, Antifa, and Anti-State advocates. All powers combined, terrorists are actively targeting Natives and the Native White American family. There has been a stark increase in public servant targeting, up 3000%, as experienced by many. We also see the counter to this within some spheres, such as "opposite targeting," or terrorism retaliation.

As we see the bigger picture through data collection and have experienced great shifts in reality since the pandemic, we feel that activists are targeting the United States and our public servants at the worst levels, and that this is one of the most important strategic missions for the United States moving forward. We see that terrorism has led to a Cold War. Much driven by foreigners, first and second generational activists, including modern "Bolsheviks." However, there are many spokes in the wheel supporting the terrorism carriage. Many prominent characters promoting terrorism and Cold War today are easily identified online.
