

# Legal Checklist — “The Criteria”

Evaluating whether a situation could legally qualify as:

- Invasion
- Non-international armed conflict
- Guerrilla / insurgent warfare
- Hybrid warfare
- Crimes against humanity

*This is a legal analysis.*

## I. Legal Checklist — “Invasion” (International Armed Conflict)

Under the UN Charter and customary international law:

To qualify as an invasion, ALL of the following must generally be present:

- Use of armed force by one state
- Armed forces crossing an international border
- Intent to exercise control over territory
- Hostile military engagement
- Attribution to a foreign sovereign government

**What we witnessed:** Infiltration of our military and crimes by foreigners within our military; cartels, gangs, smugglers; historic espionage; blackmail; historic civilian targeting; historic slavery; historic invasion.

---

## II. Legal Checklist — Non-International Armed Conflict (Insurgency / Guerrilla War)

Under Common Article 3 of the Geneva Conventions and international humanitarian law:

- Organized armed group with identifiable command structure
- Sustained and protracted armed violence
- Ability to carry out coordinated military-style operations
- Territorial control or capacity to contest state authority
- Political or military objective beyond ordinary crime

**What we witnessed:** Organized armed groups; sustained armed violence; military-style transnational operations; territorial control in certain regions of the United States, including political influence; and objectives beyond ordinary crime. America revoked many visas.

---

### III. Legal Checklist — Asymmetrical / Hybrid Warfare

This is a national security doctrine category rather than a criminal statute, but analysts look for:

- Foreign state direction or sponsorship
- Coordinated strategy across multiple domains (cyber, economic, informational, paramilitary)
- Deliberate attempt to weaken sovereignty or governance
- Evidence of operational planning and funding channels
- Patterned activity tied to strategic objectives

**What we witnessed:** Foreign state direction and sponsorship; coordinated strategy; attempts to weaken our society, sovereignty, and governance; multiple funding channels and operational planning; and patterned or synchronized activity tied to strategic objectives.

---

### IV. Legal Checklist — Crimes Against Humanity (Rome Statute)

ALL contextual elements must be satisfied:

- Widespread OR systematic attack
- Directed against a civilian population
- Pursuant to state or organizational policy
- Perpetrator knowledge of the broader attack

PLUS at least one enumerated act:

- Murder
- Deportation or forcible transfer
- Imprisonment
- Torture
- Persecution of an identifiable group
- Enforced disappearance
- Other inhumane acts causing great suffering

**What we witnessed:** Widespread negative propaganda campaigns and hate campaigns that were systematic; targeting of white civilians and other civilians at historic and unprecedented levels; mass fraud and financial abuses; perpetrators aware of broader attacks against the American people. We witnessed murders, kidnappings, overseas imprisonment of Americans, police infiltration, political policing of Americans, disturbing levels of psychological torture in organized campaigns and by individuals, persecution of Americans and American whites, disappearances, mass suicides of Americans, and other inhumane acts that have caused great suffering.

## V. Legal Checklist — Unlawful Population Transfer

Under the Fourth Geneva Convention (during occupation):

- Military occupation exists
- Occupying power transfers its own civilian population
- Forced displacement of protected persons

Outside occupation:

- Individuals were lawfully present
- Removal occurred by force or coercion
- No genuine consent

**What we witnessed:** Foreign enemy diplomats and foreigners with allegiance to other governments occupying positions within the United States; competing immigrant populations transferring power from Americans to other immigrants; many Americans unable to afford homes while immigrants occupied free or low-cost housing; a voting majority that did not consent and, in fact, retaliated.

## VI. Important Distinction Checklist

The following may qualify as international crimes:

- Large-scale immigration
- Crime rate increases
- Political polarization
- Economic strain
- Cultural change
- Policy disagreements
- Administrative negligence

**What we witnessed:** Large-scale illegal immigration or historic invasion; rapid population shifts; substantial increases in crime rates, including daily gun violence in immigrant-majority cities; political polarization; economic strain; cultural change; policy disagreements; and administrative negligence — to put it lightly. Politicians committed acts of organ trafficking, drug trafficking, child trafficking, spying, fraud, and other crimes.

## VII. What Would Be Required for a Credible Legal Claim

To move from political claim to legal classification, you would need:

- Documented evidence
- Verified attribution
- Patterned conduct

- Intent
- Policy connection
- Judicial or tribunal findings

Have we made our determinations?
