Arizona Latino Population Growth (1990–2010)

Arizona experienced one of the fastest Latino population growth rates in the U.S. over just two decades.

1990 → 2000

Latino population nearly doubled

 Increase: ~88–90%

1990: ~688,000

2000: ~1.3 million

2000 → 2010

Growth continued strong (though slightly slower)

 Increase: ~46–50%

2010: ~1.9 million

 Overall Change (1990–2010)

Latino population nearly tripled in 20 years

 Net increase: ~175–180%

By 2010, Latinos made up ~30% of Arizona's total population

Today: Latinos are by far the largest demographic group in Arizona.


 What contributed to this growth?

Immigration from Mexico

Higher birth rates compared to non-Hispanic whites

Economic demand (construction, agriculture, service industries)

Federal immigration policy shifts in the 1980s–1990s, and 2010 forward (including family reunification)

 Current estimates suggest ~250,000–307,000+ undocumented immigrants live in Arizona, based on recent analyses.

Personal Reflection:

These trends will continue. While we have been very welcoming, it is also very sad for Americans who feel they are losing their homes to those who refuse to truly integrate into our culture. Still waving Mexican flags, still racism against Whites persists, to the stage of discrimination ~ in some businesses, not one White hired.

75 years ago, 91.5% of Arizona population was White, and American. Please do not gaslight US. There is a difference between a native American who supports American culture, and one who seeks to replace it with a foreign one.
