Immigration and Demographic Change

The Hart Cellar Act opened the door to successive waves of immigration that fundamentally altered the demographic composition of the United States. The central consequence of the Hart Cellar Act was the removal of the national origins system and the creation of an immigration policy that permitted substantially greater immigration from regions of the world that had previously contributed comparatively fewer immigrants to the United States. Over time, this produced demographic changes that have had profound consequences for the historical American population and its cultural position within the country.

The resulting system also created a political environment in which increasingly large immigrant populations were classified as minorities and incorporated into civil rights, political, and social systems centered around minority status. White Americans, despite representing a diverse collection of European populations that contributed substantially to the founding and development of the United States, became increasingly treated as a collective majority responsible for historical grievances. The result has been a political environment in which White Americans are frequently subjected to collective historical blame while other populations are presented through systems of disadvantage, protection, and entitlement.

American Identity and Historical Population

Americans are a diverse population with many different ancestral backgrounds and cultural traditions. The people who founded and developed the United States were predominantly European and included English, Scottish, Irish, French, Acadian, Dutch, German, and other communities that gradually developed a shared American identity. Over generations, these populations blended culturally and socially, producing an American population that cannot be reduced to a single European ethnicity.

The designation White therefore encompasses numerous historical populations that participated in the development of American society. These populations established communities, institutions, traditions, and systems of government that became a part of American life over generations. Their historical contributions cannot be erased by redefining American history solely through the experiences of later immigrant populations.

Demographic Displacement

The demographic transformation occurring today is substantially different in scale and speed from the gradual cultural blending experienced by earlier generations. Communities that developed over many generations are experiencing rapid demographic changes within

relatively short periods of time. For many Americans, particularly within historically White communities, this produces an observable experience of demographic decline and displacement.

The concern is not limited to demographic statistics or population figures. It involves the disappearance or marginalization of familiar cultural practices, institutions, neighborhoods, traditions, and historical identities. Many Americans are witnessing these changes within their own communities and are experiencing the loss of cultural continuity in real time.

Cultural Dissonance

Cultural dissonance is occurring as demographic change is accompanied by political movements seeking to redefine American culture and historical identity. Natural diversity and voluntary cultural integration are not the same as rapid demographic transformation accompanied by political campaigns seeking to change established American culture. Americans who express concern about these changes are frequently characterized through racial or political narratives rather than having their concerns examined on their substance.

Collective guilt has increasingly been applied to White Americans through narratives that attribute historical wrongdoing to an entire racial population. These narratives can be used to justify contemporary political and cultural targeting of people who did not participate in the historical conduct being condemned. This creates a continuing system of racial blame in which people are held responsible for events based on their racial classification rather than their individual conduct.

Immigration, Labor Exploitation, and Modern Slavery

Serious forms of exploitation have also developed within systems involving immigration and foreign labor. Foreign laborers have experienced coercion, excessive labor demands, trafficking, exploitation, and other forms of abuse. These conditions require accountability for the organizations, political networks, employers, and advocacy structures that benefit from or facilitate such systems.

There is little justification for protecting exploitation simply because it exists within an activist or political environment. Activism does not place organizations or individuals beyond accountability for exploitation, coercion, trafficking, or other unlawful conduct. Shame campaigns, blame shifting campaigns, and racial campaigns can also be used to redirect public attention away from the people and organizations responsible for exploitation.

Political Violence and Modern Warfare

The political consequences have become increasingly serious. Activist movements have moved beyond ordinary political advocacy when they participate in intimidation, fear campaigns, political violence, property destruction, arson, or other activities directed against American communities and institutions. When political organizations or networks use coercion

or violence to advance ideological, political, or demographic objectives, the conduct moves beyond ordinary political disagreement.

It becomes political warfare when organized political activity uses intimidation, violence, destruction, or coercion against civilians and communities. Americans should not be expected to accept violence, intimidation, arson, or organized targeting simply because the people engaging in those activities identify themselves as activists. Political causes do not provide immunity from criminal accountability or responsibility for harm caused to the American people.

Anti White Targeting

The racial component of these developments cannot simply be dismissed. White Americans are experiencing substantial demographic decline in numerous communities while simultaneously being subjected to political narratives that portray their historical presence as inherently oppressive or illegitimate. When demographic decline, collective racial blame, cultural displacement, and political hostility occur simultaneously, the resulting experience is an organized attack on the identity and place of White Americans within their own country.

These developments have contributed to what many Americans are beginning to understand as Anti White American campaigns. The use of historical guilt to justify contemporary racial targeting does not create justice and instead creates another form of racial hostility. A population cannot be expected to accept collective blame, cultural displacement, or political targeting as the price of maintaining peace within its own country.

Foreign Allegiance and American Sovereignty

The present situation has produced a profound loss of trust among many Americans. Many Americans remember a period when cultural differences were less politically antagonistic and when citizenship and national allegiance were understood primarily through participation in American society. Today, the increasingly visible presence of foreign political causes, foreign flags, transnational political movements, radical activism, and violent campaigns has caused many Americans to question whether the allegiance of all participants in American political life is directed toward the United States.

Raising foreign flags on American soil in connection with political conflicts abroad is not acceptable to Americans who understand national allegiance as a fundamental obligation. American territory should not be used as a platform for foreign conflicts, demographic campaigns, or political movements directed against established American communities. National sovereignty requires that the interests and security of the American people remain central within the United States.

The Line Has Been Drawn

The cumulative effect is a growing determination among Americans to protect their communities, culture, institutions, and national identity. This is not simply a political

disagreement because many Americans recognize demographic, cultural, political, and ideological forces operating at the same time. These developments have produced consequences that can no longer be ignored.

We recognize the shared humanity of all people while also recognizing that cultural allegiance, political allegiance, and national identity have meaning. Compassion does not require the abandonment of boundaries, and respect for other cultures does not require surrendering American culture. Opposition to political violence does not require accepting movements that use violence or coercion against Americans.

For many Americans, the line has therefore been drawn. Treason is not acceptable, political warfare against the American people is not acceptable, and forced cultural transformation is not acceptable. Modern slavery, trafficking, exploitation, political violence, and organized racial targeting are not acceptable, and no political movement should receive immunity from accountability because it presents itself as activism.

What America Has Lost

The America remembered by many Americans has changed substantially. Even 2018 represents a different social and political environment from the one Americans experience today, and many people are mourning communities, cultural traditions, relationships, and a sense of national continuity that they feel has been lost. Americans remember earlier periods when communities developed together, cultural traditions were shared, and people had greater confidence in one another's allegiance to the country.

Today, many Americans have concluded that those assumptions can no longer be taken for granted. Foreign political causes, rapid demographic changes, cultural conflict, political activism, and violence have changed how many Americans understand their communities and their country. The resulting loss of trust is real, and dismissing it does not resolve the underlying causes.

We cannot return to an earlier period by pretending these changes did not occur. We can recognize what occurred, identify the forces responsible for it, hold individuals and organizations accountable for unlawful conduct, and establish boundaries around what is acceptable within American society. Recognition of what has been lost is necessary before Americans can determine what they intend to preserve.

Moving Forward

The American people have the right to preserve their communities, their cultural heritage, their national identity, and their constitutional system. They have the right to recognize demographic and cultural changes as real without being required to deny their own experiences or accept collective blame for actions committed centuries before them. They also have the right to demand accountability when political movements, organizations, employers, or individuals engage in unlawful conduct against Americans.

America has a long history of immigration, assimilation, cultural development, conflict, and change. This history does not require Americans to surrender their own cultural identity or accept political movements that seek to erase it. The changes that have occurred since 1965 deserve serious examination because the demographic consequences are visible, the cultural consequences are visible, and the political consequences are visible.

Today, we recognize these developments for what they are. The transformation of America has produced demographic displacement, cultural dissonance, political division, exploitation, and organized hostility toward established American communities. Where political activism becomes coercion, violence, intimidation, or warfare against the American people, it must be treated accordingly.

The objective is not to deny the humanity of others. The objective is to establish that American citizens are entitled to their own country, their own communities, their own cultural heritage, and their own national identity. Americans should not be subjected to collective racial blame, political intimidation, demographic displacement, modern slavery, exploitation, or violence within their own country.

America belongs to its people. The American people have the right to defend the constitutional, cultural, and historical foundations of their country. Today, we recognize this war for what it is.
