Think of a child playing in a safe garden. Because there is a fence, the child can run freely without fear of danger. Boundaries in the church serve the same purpose: they give each of us the freedom to worship, meditate, and grow spiritually without distraction or harm. When we define what is acceptable and what is not, we create an environment where everyone's dignity is honored. This kind of freedom allows us to open our hearts more fully to God, to one another, and to the

work of peace in the world.

Boundaries Teach Compassion and Forgiveness

Setting boundaries does not mean we reject or condemn people. Quite the opposite—it means we value people enough to be honest. If someone crosses a line, we gently guide them back toward love and respect. This process requires compassion: we must see the humanity in one another, even when mistakes are made. It also requires forgiveness: none of us are perfect, and boundaries are there not to shame, but to heal. A community without boundaries may confuse permissiveness with compassion, but true compassion always seeks the good of the other—even when that means saying 'no.'

Boundaries Keep Our Mission Clear

Our mission at R & R Monastery is not to become everything to everyone. Our mission is to embody peace, freedom, compassion, love, forgiveness, and respect. Boundaries help us stay faithful to that calling.
