

The Marginalization of Americans At Universities With Special Consideration of Repressed White Americans

Just **66% of the student “American” body** are long-established Americans.

~6% International Students

= **60% of the total student body.**

39–41% of total accepted enrollment are white students.

Out of **100 college students in the U.S. (approximate):**

- **39–41** → White students
- **53–55** → Other American racial or ethnic groups
- **International categories of white students are often not interpreted**

1. First-generation immigrants (foreign-born students)

About **11–12% of undergraduate students in the United States** are **first-generation immigrants** (meaning they were born outside the U.S.).

- **11.4% of all undergraduates** are first-generation immigrants.
- These students themselves were **born abroad and later immigrated to the United States.**

2. Second-generation immigrants (U.S.-born with immigrant parents)

A larger group are **U.S.-born but have at least one immigrant parent:**

- **≈22.7% of undergraduates** are second-generation immigrants.

3. Combined immigrant-origin students

If both groups are counted together:

- **≈32% of all U.S. college students** are immigrant-origin (first or second generation).

Simple breakdown

Among **college-aged students in U.S. higher education:**

- **~11%** – first-generation immigrants (foreign-born)
 - **~23%** – second-generation immigrants (U.S.-born with immigrant parents)
 - **~66%** – third-generation or longer-established Americans
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Roughly 11% of college-aged Americans enrolled in college are first-generation immigrants (foreign-born).

Summary:

→ **White American students are currently marginalized within their own country.**
