

For Americans and American Culture,

It's as bad as it gets. This experience is brutal. We are suppressed and told not to talk about it. We are targeted at disturbing levels, and we suffer from racism that feels like an arrow to the heart anytime we go anywhere as a minority in a Hispanic-majority culture. There is a blaming of whites, as if race replacement and modern slavery are punishment. People celebrate "our fall" and our deaths. They laugh as they call us "older" and make jokes about us "aging out," as we are targeted relentlessly in politics and even in eugenicist campaigns. Sadly, activists who campaign for whites are targeted. Charlie Kirk was slain, leaving behind his wife and children. Worse, we are victims of political trafficking, and the propaganda ensues. We are tortured as we face the reality that we are losing our country. It is very painful and it hurts.

By 2060, our population was predicted to fall below ~40–45%, and by 2100, well below 40%, around 30% or so.

By 2200, whites will no longer be the majority, as predicted. These trends nearly diversify and replace the white population with Hispanic culture and other cultures.

As the trends are today, American whites are attacked, vilified, and our culture inverted as we witness our culture being replaced in real time and foreign flags hoisted in place of American ones.

Currently, Hispanics vote both Democratic and Republican. Many support immigration, being immigrants themselves, but there are mixed feelings here as well.

I speak honestly about all the things we have witnessed in recent years. I feel that these trends of harm against White Americans will only get worse and worse as time goes on. It is a very painful realization, both lived and experienced, as well as projected.

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What a Chart Would Show

A line chart from 1950 to today (e.g., every decade) would have:
