

“Reduced Room” for Americans and Opportunity in America

- **Economic Pressure & Wage Impact:** Research indicates that the influx of immigrants, particularly in specific skill sectors, creates competition that may lower wages for American-born workers, especially those without a bachelor’s degree.
- **Infrastructure & Housing Shortages:** Many U.S. cities face significant housing shortages, which can lead to overcrowded conditions, poverty, and homelessness.
- **Reduced Opportunities During Economic Downturns:** During periods of high unemployment (such as during the COVID-19 pandemic), studies found that many Americans believed the government should prioritize economic assistance for citizens over non-citizens; however, this was not always the case.
- **BRICS Nations and Economic Competition:** BRICS nations compete with the U.S. dollar globally, with some influence extending into the U.S. economy, where foreign economic interests may compete with American workers and businesses.
- **Targeting of Americans:** Some Americans, including White American families who may be perceived as “wealthy,” can be targeted by domestic and foreign criminals.

It is increasingly argued that there are fewer opportunities for Americans now than before, and questions remain as to why. The answers are clear however, as within all industries:
