“Continent Strategic Wartime Positioning”

From our understanding, there exists a coordinated global effort among competing powers to expand influence and establish control across continents. Within the United States, we have made meaningful progress in defining and maintaining national boundaries. However, there are growing concerns that positions of authority, once held in trust for the American people, have, in many instances (mass assembly) been displaced or reshaped by external or competing interests.

This dynamic resembles a form of “musical chairs,” observable not only within the United States, but also across Mexico and Canada, and similarly reflected in other Western nations. These patterns suggest an evolving geopolitical landscape in which both allied and adversarial powers engage in **strategic positioning**.

As citizens of the United States, we affirm our opposition to any emerging political architecture that undermines national sovereignty or the integrity of our institutions. We hold that a nation’s culture and its people are the rightful stewards of their land. Mexico belongs to the Mexican people. Canada belongs to the Canadian people. The United States belongs to the American people, just as European nations belong to their respective citizens.

While Western nations have historically demonstrated generosity, openness, and a willingness to share in community and cooperation, such values must not be exploited. If foreign adversaries seek to exert control over sovereign territory through indirect means, whether by cold war, attrition, or other strategic pressures, then it becomes necessary to establish firm boundaries and enact war time powers.

Accordingly, we affirm the importance of clearly defined borders, lawful protections, and appropriate protocols to ensure that territorial integrity remains intact and unaltered. We recognize the challenges before us, and we stand committed to safeguarding our people, our institutions, and our national identity. We call upon any foreign actors engaged in such efforts to withdraw from these positions and return to their respective homelands.
