

Racism, Ethnic Prejudice, Anti-Americanism

Proud of Americans. *We love our culture, we love our people.*

Racism between two people of the same “color” from different countries, ethnic groups, cultures, or regions can still be considered racism or **ethnic prejudice**, depending on the situation. Skin color is not the only factor involved in racial or discriminatory conflict.

Some related terms include:

- Ethnic discrimination — prejudice based on ethnicity, nationality, tribe, ancestry, or cultural background.
- Colorism — discrimination based on lighter or darker skin tones within the same racial group.
- Xenophobia — hostility toward foreigners or outsiders.
- Nationalism — hostility based on national identity.
- Tribalism — loyalty to one group combined with hostility toward another group.
- Regional prejudice — discrimination against people from another geographic area.
- Internalized racism — when racial stereotypes become adopted within a racial group itself.
- Cultural prejudice — hostility toward language, customs, religion, accent, or traditions.

Examples:

- A Black Haitian discriminating against a Black American because of nationality.
- A Caribbean person stereotyping an African American.
- Conflict between different African ethnic groups or tribes.
- Prejudice between lighter-skinned and darker-skinned Black communities.
- This experience also occurs frequently within White communities. For example, racism against White African immigrants by White Americans.
- Or hatred or discrimination toward White Americans by White immigrants.

In sociology and history, race, ethnicity, nationality, tribe, language, and culture often overlap, so the exact term depends on what specifically is being targeted:

- Skin color → racism/colorism
- National origin → xenophobia/national prejudice
- Ethnic group or tribe → ethnic discrimination/tribalism
- Culture or language → cultural prejudice

The general concept is usually called prejudice or discrimination against a “group.”
